**A BILL ACT 826 OF 1991**  
**SENATE BILL 600**

**For An Act To Be Entitled**

8 "AN ACT TO PROVIDE A THREE-YEAR IMPLEMENTATION OF A SCHOOL  
9 BREAKFAST PROGRAM IN CERTAIN PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF THIS STATE;  
10 AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES."

12 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:

14 SECTION 1. (a) (1) Beginning with the 1991-92 school year, any schools  
15 located in a school district in which forty percent (40%) or more of the  
16 students enrolled *in the school* on October 1 of the preceding school year were  
17 eligible for free or reduced price meals, shall establish a school breakfast  
18 program.

19 (2) Beginning with the 1992-93 school year, any schools located  
20 in a school district in which thirty-five percent (35%) or more of the  
21 students enrolled *in the school* on October 1 of the preceding school year were  
22 eligible for free or reduced price meals, shall establish a school breakfast  
23 program.

24 (3) Beginning with the 1993-94 school year, any schools located  
25 in a school district in which twenty percent (20%) or more of the students  
26 enrolled *in the school* on October 1 of the preceding school year were eligible  
27 for free or reduced price meals, shall establish a school breakfast program.

28 (b) Nothing in this act shall be interpreted to prevent a school  
29 district not covered herein from implementing a school breakfast program or to  
30 prevent a school district from implementing a school breakfast program during  
31 an earlier year than required under this act.

32 (c) The State Department of Education may promulgate rules and  
33 regulations necessary for implementation of this act in compliance with  
34 federal guidelines.

35 (d) (1) The State Board of Education may grant a one-year waiver to the  
36 requirements of this act to a school covered by this act which lacks
