2	As used in this subchapter:
3	(1)(A) "Emergency contraception" means a drug approved by the
4	federal Food and Drug Administration that prevents pregnancy after sexual
5	intercourse, including without limitation oral contraceptive pills.
6	(B) "Emergency contraception" does not include RU-486,
7	mifepristone, or any other drug or device that induces a medical abortion;
8	<u>and</u>
9	(2) "Sexual assault survivor" means a female who:
10	(A) Alleges or is alleged to have been the victim of
11	sexual assault or to have been raped; and
12	(B) Presents as a patient for treatment with regard to the
13	sexual assault or rape.

15	20-13-1403. Emergency contraception information required.
16	(a) All health care facilities that are licensed in this state and
17	provide emergency care to sexual assault survivors shall amend their
18	evidence-collection protocols for the treatment of sexual assault survivors
19	to include informing the survivor in a timely manner of the availability of
20	emergency contraception as a means of pregnancy prophylaxis and educating the
21	sexual assault survivor on the proper use of emergency contraception and the
22	appropriate follow-up care.
23	(b) This section does not require:
24	(1) A health care professional who is employed by a health
25	care facility that provides emergency care to a sexual assault survivor to
26	inform the sexual assault survivor of the availability of emergency
27	contraception if the health care professional refuses to provide the
28	information on the basis of religious or moral beliefs; or
29	(2) A health care facility to provide emergency contraception to
30	a sexual assault survivor who is not at risk of becoming pregnant as a result

2	contraception to prevent an unintended pregnancy resulting from the assault		
3	instead of or before seeking hospital treatment, it is critical that a sexual		
4	assault survivor has accurate information about the availability and use of		
5	emergency contraception.		
6	(2) Therefore, the General Assembly encourages:		
7	(A) An entity offering victim assistance or counseling and		
8	rape crisis hotlines to include information concerning the availability and		
9	use of emergency contraception; and		
10	(B) A licensed or registered pharmacy in the state of		
11	Arkansas to distribute information concerning the availability and use of		
12	emergency contraception.
