Pursuant to Section 37 of Act 199 of 2022, the University of Arkansas at Little Rock respectfully requests review of the appropriation from the American Rescue Plan Act. UA Little Rock has received a notice of award from the US Small Business Administration to conduct a project under the Community Navigator Pilot Program which is funded through the American Rescue Plan Act.

The overall goal of the project is to ensure Arkansas small business owners have access to technical assistance and business advisory services. The project places a special focus on businesses and individuals that have had difficulty accessing the federal, state, local, and private COVID-19 relief programs. Specifically, the program will target underserved populations (rural, minority, women, veterans, etc.).

The conduct of the project will include the hiring of five additional staff to oversee and implement the project. The project will include six sub awardees: Arkansas State Chamber of Commerce; East Arkansas Enterprise Community; Phoenix Youth and Family Services; Arkansas Human Development Corporation; Central Arkansas Library System; and UA Cooperative Extension. The appropriation request includes amounts in Grants and Aid for the sub award agreements.

UA Little Rock will provide support and structure for the program including providing subject matter expertise, access to tools and resources, as well as administration, outreach, and reporting. The appropriation request includes amounts in Professional Services, Regular Salaries, and Personal Services Matching.

The appropriation request will also require additional operating and travel expenses necessary to conduct required oversight and administration of the project.

The University of Arkansas Community College at Hope-Texarkana (UACCHT) respectfully requests review of appropriation from the American Rescue Plan Act authorized in Section 37 of Act 199 of 2022 to (1) provide direct grants to students of emergency relief under the provisions provided by the U.S. Department of Education, (2) reimburse for lost revenues in auxiliary services and tuition and fees, (3) pay for technology-related expenses as they are incurred, (4) complete HVAC upgrades to improve air quality in buildings, and (5) provide additional grants to students who choose to return to UACCHT, obtain transcripts, or transfer to another institution of higher education.

University of Arkansas Community College at Batesville (UACCB) has been provided a great opportunity to support our students during the COVID-19 period through the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), authorized in Section 38 of Act 997 of 2021. UACCB submits a supplemental appropriation request for the student and institutional portions of these funds for use in FY2023.

UACCB has \$1,816,781 of funding available to be utilized through the Education Stabilization Fund (American Rescue Plan Act). In this request we are consolidating the remaining HEERF III ARP funds of \$1,540,011 with the HEERF SIP ARP Funds of \$276,770 to provide amounts for additional projects and relief funding:

As a rural college, our students rely on our IT resources and upgrades are needed to improve services.

UACCB is requesting for an additional \$250,000 to distribute grants to our students enrolled Fall 2021. These funds will be distributed to students with the greatest financial need and will be formulated using a per-hour calculation.

UACCB is asking for \$250,000 in appropriation for lost revenue to supplement continuing operations as student enrollments recover during the post pandemic environment. This will allow the College to continue offerings and services within our existing programs.

Phillips Community College has been fortunate to benefit from funding through the American Rescue Plan Act authorized in Section 38 of Act 997 of 2021 and hereby submits a supplemental appropriation request and detail plan for expenditure of both the student and institutional portion of these funds during FY2023.

Phillips Community College of the University of Arkansas respectfully requests review of appropriation from the American Rescue Plan Act to (1) provide direct grants to students for emergency relief under the provisions provided by the US Department of Education, (2) reimburse PCCUA for payroll related COVID-19 related expenses, and (3) for other COVID-19 related expenses for PPE, student aid, and technology-related expenses as allowed for by federal regulations.

#### Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students

PCCUA intends to distribute emergency grants to students during the fall, spring, and summer semesters of the 22-23 academic year from American Rescue Plan Act of 2021. During each semester, students with PELL grant eligibility will be granted priority and will be awarded a higher grant amount than those that are non-pell eligible. Maximum grant awards provided during the fall and spring semesters at this time are as follows:

\$1,250 for Pell eligible full-time students	\$1,000 for Pell eligible part-time students
\$1,000 for non-pell eligible full-time students	\$750 for non-pell eligible part-time students

Maximum grant awards provided during the summer semester are as follows:

\$600 for Pell eligible full-time students	\$400 for Pell eligible part-time students
\$400 for non-pell eligible full-time students	\$200 for non-pell eligible part-time students

Students will be required to complete an online certification of COVID need to receive an award.

Total funding for emergency grants to students totals \$1,135,659.00.

#### Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund Formula Grants – Institutional Funds

For the institutional portion, PCCUA intends to use the funds for purposes outlined in the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021. The following table outlines the intended purposes for the use of grant funds consistent with the requirements of the grant. The guidance accompanying the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 states that institutions must use a portion of their funds to implement evidence-based practices to monitor and suppress coronavirus in accordance with public health guidelines and conduct direct outreach to financial aid applicants about the opportunity to receive a financial aid adjustment due to the recent unemployment of a family member or independent student, or other circumstances. Through the following plan, PCCUA intends to accomplish both of these directives.

#### **Salaries and Fringe Benefits**

- Continuing student services to assist with online learning such as zoom license, online assistant/chat box, and other services.
- Installing touchless water fountains to help curb the spread of viruses
- Installing touchless toilet flushers to help curb the spread of viruses
- Installing touchless soap/paper towel dispensers to help curb the spread of viruses
- Installing touchless hand faucets to help curb the spread of viruses
- Purchasing and installing other features to enhance a clean and sanitary environment for faculty, staff, and students.
- Surge protection/power restoration for main servers/administration building
- Expanding classroom and laboratory zoom and online learning capabilities (smartboards, webcams, computers, etc.)
- Expanding server capabilities to handle online learning
- Installing additional wireless access points and expanding wireless access to students
- Purchasing additional software license to accommodate expanding online learning capabilities

- Purchasing additional faculty and staff material and supplies to accommodate online learning and meeting. Examples include desktop computers, laptop computers, webcams, etc.
- Purchasing additional education equipment to enhance social distancing and student success. Also purchase additional equipment and systems to enhance virtual learning and other current methods that promote less personal contact.
- Travel expenses related to student success to enhance enrollment, retention, and graduation rates. Travel to include state, regional, or national conferences related to these areas for employees directly involved with these initiatives.

UAFS has been granted \$8.682 million dollars in direct student aid under HEERF III. UAFS requests \$2,811,445 of the HEERF III Direct Student Aid Funds for FY 2023. The final category reflects our disbursements to students based on ascending EFC, to whom we award until the funds run out. If our enrollment is up, then there will be less allocated through the 'Low EFC' category. If additional changes are needed (and they have not been to date with HEERF funds), we will lower the awards across categories rather than leave out eligible students.

UAFS uses the following eligibility categories in its distribution plans:

- Full-time students (12-UG; 9-Graduate)
- Part-time students
- Residential students
- UG Full Pell eligible (0 EFC [Estimated Family Contribution)
- UG Partial Pell eligible (1-5711 EFC)
- UG Low-EFC (those not Pell eligible but among the closest as determined by Federal need formulas)

Our categories are not exclusive. For example, a full-time, non-residential student who has a full Pell award will receive in fall 2022 \$200 (full-time) + \$600 (Full-Pell/0 EFC) for a total of \$800. This tiering approach matches the Federal emphasis on prioritizing high need. Only small numbers of special population students are not eligible.

Summer 2022 distribution will take place in July 2022 Fall 2022 distribution will take place in early October 2022

Further detail of the planned usage of funds is described below.

#### Capital Outlay:

- Improve ventilation and air circulation with an upgrade to the Chemical Hood System used in school laboratories. This will enhance air quality while reducing energy and maintenance/operational costs.
- Upgrade ventilation and grinding capacity in the Welding lab, which will also assist in becoming an AWS certified test facility, a safer and more efficient learning environment and increased enrollment to help remediate the shortage of qualified welders as a result of Covid-19 disruptions.

#### System Upgrades:

- Transition to a new campus wide payment and electronic commerce solution that is more flexible and responsive for students.
- Upgrade conference rooms on campus to make them Zoom ready for hybrid teaching, learning, and meetings.
- Upgrade backup system for servers to ensure data restores and protect against ransomware.
- Migrate the Password/Single Sign-On Solution from on premise servers to the cloud to establish better reliability, security, and timeliness for users.

- Upgrade AV (electronic media devices & equipment that include both and audio and visual component) across campus buildings.
- Establish internet redundancy to reduce potential disruption for remote workers and learners.
- Migrate Banner system to Oracle cloud for better service & reliability.

#### Equipment:

- Purchase new Windows workstations and laptops in preparation for the phase out of support for Windows 10. These will replace existing workstations and laptops that cannot be upgraded to Windows 11 due to inadequate CPU's.
- Purchase intraoral cameras, sleeves, and wall mounts; the use of these cameras is becoming the standard of care in the assessment of dental patients. They are critical as part of the "teledentistry" movement to facilitate dental treatment, guidance, and education. The Covid-19 pandemic has prompted the potential for increased demand and usage of these technology resources.
- Install floor covering in the Recreation and Wellness Center (RAWC) to increase safety for student-oriented events that need to be held in a large indoor venue due to weather considerations.
- Purchase tents and mister fans to allow the University to host large outdoor events in the summer. Outdoor gatherings are better for reducing Covid transmission; however, there is a need for shade and fans in the Arkansas weather.
- Remodel of a classroom into a multi-media production studio to allow delivery of information in a virtual setting. This is essential to allow timely communication of social distancing and health safety efforts.
- Equipment & licensing for a photo booth which will allow professional headshots while respecting the need for social distancing with contactless delivery of imagery.

Technology & licenses to improve remote access, work and learn from home capability, and improve stability and reliability of the network:

- Software program that uses artificial intelligence technology to simulate a discussion with users via messaging, websites, mobile apps, etc.
- Platform to provide technology to move information to a digital format for Academic Catalogs, Handbooks, and Guides.

#### **UAFS**

- Online test proctoring software platform which assists in ensuring that academic integrity is maintained for online testing.
- Video Conferencing platform (Zoom) renewal for continued ability to manage online meeting, teaching, and learning.
- Contract with a content management service to ensure the security and accessibility of information.
- Integrate the campus map into the website and improve functionality on all mobile devices.

#### Reimbursement of Lost Revenue

- Recovery of uncollected revenue that resulted from enrollment decline and cancellation of on-campus operations and activities as a result of COVID-19.

#### ADE Division of Elementary and Secondary Education American Rescue Plan - Elementary and Secondary Schools Emergency Relief Fund (ARP – ESSER)

- The purpose of the ARP ESSER funding is to assist state education agencies and local school districts to safely reopen and sustain safe operations of schools and to address the academic, social, emotional, and mental health impacts of the coronavirus pandemic on the nation's students.
- Arkansas will receive \$1.27 billion with 90% of funds go to local districts.

All ASD students are deaf or hard of hearing and each one is on an Individualized Education Program (IEP). The district will utilize pre and post assessment data to monitor the effectiveness of each intervention. Assessments will be conducted on an ongoing basis to check each student's understanding of a skill or standard. These assessments will be used to identify further interventions when needed. Results from the common formative assessments will be analyzed to indicate potential gaps that may occur.

2.B. **Process for Evaluating Implementation:** Please describe how the LEA will <u>evaluate</u> the effectiveness of these interventions.

Evaluation: The Arkansas School for the Deaf Educational Leadership Team (ELT) implements and oversees evaluations of intervention strategies. The ELT's members include the Superintendent, Elementary and Secondary principals, the Director of Instruction, Curriculum and Innovation, and the schools' lead teachers. Common assessments will be conducted on an ongoing basis and the results are reviewed by the ELT and teachers. Assessments include, but are not limited to: IXL, Accelerated Reader, DRA. Changes to student IEPs will be implemented based on evaluations and meeting with the individual teacher, the student, and the parents to ensure interventions are successfully meeting the needs of the student.

The Expanding the Public Health Workforce grant from ACL is intended to support the cost of wages and benefits for public health professionals, directly or through contract. Ideally it will fund at least one Full Time Equivalent (FTE) to engage in activities to advance public health opportunities for Arkansans with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD). While the initial intent behind the funding was COVID focused, it can be used towards any activities focused on improving public health access and services to the IDD community.

At this time GCDD is leaning towards a partnership with the Arkansas Minority Health Commission. While the AMHC focuses primarily on ethnic and racial minorities, IDD cuts across both of those demographics. Adding a staff member who has a specific focus on disabilities could enhance their mission to assure all minority Arkansans equitable access to preventive health care and to seek ways to promote health and prevent diseases and conditions that are prevalent among minority populations.

A second option, should things not work out with AMHC, is to contract for an additional DFA/GCDD staff position to study the quality of healthcare access and services for Arkansans with IDD.

GCDD believes the funds could be used most effectively by partnering with an expect organization already working to advance public health opportunities for vulnerable populations.

#### Background

The effects of the COVID-19 pandemic have brought additional challenges to families with young children, especially in low-income and at-risk communities. HRSA is issuing American Rescue Plan (ARP) awards to current MIECHV grant recipients to support home visiting activities that address needs of parents, children, and families related to the COVID-19 public health emergency. Needs identified for Arkansas home visiting programs include:

• expansion of the Arkansas Home Visiting Network to include an additional 160 families

The effective period of the award is December 1, 2021 – September 30, 2024.

#### Purpose

The Arkansas Department of Health (ADH) in conjunction with the Arkansas Children's Hospital Home Visiting Network, will use the ARP funds to support home visiting activities that address the identified needs of families and staff during the COVID-19 pandemic

#### Goals

Expansion of current Arkansas Home Visiting Network to include an additional 160 families.

#### Sustainability

Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas has been fortunate to receive funding through the American Rescue Plan Act authorized in Section 38 of Act 997 of 2021 and hereby submits a supplemental appropriation request and detail plan for expenditure of both the student and institutional portion of these funds during FY2023, pending approval of any no-cost extensions submitted to the US Department of Education.

Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas respectfully requests review of appropriation from the American Rescue Plan Act to provide for COVID-19 related expenses for PPE, student aid, mental health and wellness, capital outlay and technology-related expenses as allowed by federal regulations.

The total funding to be disbursed or reimbursed from the Education Stabilization Fund (American Rescue Plan) for Cossatot Community College of the University of Arkansas is \$1,661,224. At this time, the college is seeking to obtain this funding to enact the following requests.

#### • Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students

Cossatot Community College intends to distribute emergency grants to students during the summer, fall, and spring, semesters of the 2022-2023 academic year from American Rescue Plan Act of 2021. During each semester, students with PELL grant eligibility will be granted priority and will receive a higher grant amount than those

that are non-pell eligible. Grant awards provided during the fall and spring semesters at this time are as follows:

- \$1000 for students who have exceptional need such as Pell eligible and are enrolled Full-Time.
- \$750 for students who have exceptional need such as Pell Grant funds and are enrolled Part-Time.
- \$750 for students who have need but are not eligible for Pell Grants and are enrolled Full-Time.
- \$500 for students who have need but are not eligible for Pell and are enrolled Part-Time

These guidelines will be applied to All students. Students enrolled in non-credit courses will be awarded a flat \$500 pending approval of completion of the online certification of exceptional needs.

Students will be required to complete an online certification of COVID need to receiv e an award. Total funding for emergency grants to students totals \$409,317

#### • Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund Formula Grants - Institutional Funds

For the institutional portion, CCCUA intends to use the funds for purposes outlined in the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021. The following paragraphs outline the intended purposes for the use of grant funds consistent with the requirements of the grant. The guidance accompanying the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 states that institutions must use a portion of their funds to conduct direct outreach to financial aid applicants about the opportunity to receive a financial aid adjustment due to the recent unemployment of a family member or independent student, or other circumstances. Through the following plan, CCCUA intends to accomplish this directive.

#### **Operating Expenses**

Continuing CDC protocols for disinfecting and sanitizing as necessary by purchasing hand sanitizer, antibacterial hand soap, wipes, and other necessary materials and supplies.

Purchasing additional faculty and staff materials and supplies to accommodate the increase in online learning and meetings. Examples include laptop computers, webcams, etc.

Purchasing laptops for a student computer loan program for distance learning.

Purchase AI Tracking Lecture Camera, Ring Lights for Lecture Recording, Wacom Drawing Tablets, etc. to enhance the instructors form of teaching, thus providing students with a better learning opportunity throughout the pandemic

#### **Grant Administration Plan**

#### **Project Activities, Key Tasks, Outputs, and Outcomes**

#### **Project Activity 1- Site Improvement Analysis**

**Activity Description**: As Arkansas seeks to increase the number of quality sites available for new projects, there are many sites that show great potential but need improvements that would make the site more competitive and marketable. The goal of this project is to identify sites that have strong potential, analyze the challenges of the site, and create a roadmap for improving the site to be shovel ready. This will create more opportunities for competitive projects that would bring high-wage jobs and investments to the state. To achieve this goal, the following tasks will be completed:

#### **Key Tasks**

- 1. **Identify Sites with Potential:** AEDC will work with local economic development organizations, the Planning and Development Districts, and other stakeholders to compile a list of sites that have strong potential based on location, size, and transportation access. These sites will have some, but limited, due diligence already performed, and may have various challenges or barriers to being shovel ready.
- 2. **Analyze Needed Improvements:** Once sites have been identified, they will be evaluated based on factors such as infrastructure capacity, utility availability, topographic information, and ecological impacts. AEDC will contract with a third-party site selection and/or engineering consulting firm to study each site, focusing on the site's strengths, weaknesses, and key issues that need to be addressed for the site to be competitive.
- 3. Recommend Site Improvement Roadmap: This analysis would then be used by the consultants to create an indepth report on each site that pinpoints the most significant barriers to being shovel-ready, a step-by-step plan for making the needed improvements, and the estimated cost and timeline to make those improvements. Through this report, communities would have a specific roadmap to follow to make their site more marketable and project ready.

**Expected Outputs**: As mentioned, this project is expected to result in a final report for each site presented by the consultants that will include each sites' strengths, weaknesses, and a roadmap to improve the site. By having an actionable plan to take their sites to the next level, communities would be able to focus their efforts on making those specific changes to enhance their site and increase their chances of landing a competitive project. This is expected to lead to an increased number of site visits and to decrease the time that sites remain on the market before being occupied by companies that will create jobs for Arkansans.

**Expected Outcome:** The final deliverable will be a detailed analysis of promising sites with accompanying data on site improvements needed for a project. This plan will inform future investment efforts and help unify recruitment efforts across the state by providing a single, stakeholder driven, analysis of current economic development assets. This site improvement data will help identify state assets and economic resources that will guide our efforts to make Arkansas' economy more competitive in the regional and global marketplace.

**Proposed Schedule**: We expect to submit an RFP to consulting firms and to have a final selection and defined scope of work finalized by March 30, 2022. All project work and deliverables should be complete by December 31, 2022.





#### **Project Activity 2- Site Economic Impact Analysis**

**Activity Description:** Using census data, labor statistics, and GIS mapping, a projection of the potential economic impact of a business locating to a site can be produced. This projection accounts for economic leakage, worker mobility, and economic factors such as pay rate and regional cost of living. Using this projection, a quantitative measure of the cost/benefit analysis for each site's potential investment found from the previous Site Improvement Analysis can be reviewed.

#### **Key Tasks**

- 1. **Site Identification and Data Collection:** Working from the information gathered in the Site Improvement Analysis, a list of promising sites will be identified. From there, data collection for the region can proceed.
- 2. **Economic Impact Analysis and GIS Mapping:** Once the data is collected, the economic impact analysis can be conducted using a set of statistical formulas and GIS mapping tools.

**Expected Output:** A detailed analysis showing the regional economic impact for specific sites and identifying new or existing regional industry clusters.

**Expected Outcome:** This analysis will support this project's other activities by providing a framework to prioritize site improvement efforts based on quantitative data to maximize the economic impact of any site investment.

**Proposed Schedule**: We expect to submit an RFP to third-party firms and to have a final selection and defined scope of work finalized by March 30, 2022. All project work and deliverables should be complete by December 31<sup>st</sup>, 2022.

#### **Project Activity 3- Manufacturing Workforce Needs Assessment**

**Activity Description**: In alignment with the primary focus of this grant, Site Analysis and Target Industry Clusters, AEDC will conduct a Manufacturing Workforce Needs Assessment. Utilizing a third-party vendor, in partnership with the State Division of Workforce Services, Department of Education, Department of Commerce, community-based organizations, and other Workforce Development groups as needed, the following tasks will be conducted to collect data and information required for implementation of improvements:

#### **Key Tasks**

- 1. **Statewide Market Analysis**: Identify opportunities for employment in various clusters throughout the state, wage comparison, employer competition, etc.
- 2. **Skills Gap Analysis**: Survey of state-wide manufacturers to determine needed skills in various manufacturing occupations.
- 3. **Desired Employer Study**: Survey of the potential workforce to understand the top needs to remain with an employer (i.e., pay, flexible schedule, culture, etc.).
- 4. **Pipeline Modeling Study**: Research all current and potential workforce pipeline models (i.e., high school, CTE, youth apprenticeship, etc.) and where shortfalls or opportunity may exist.
- 5. **Educational Alignment and Articulation Study**: Crosswalk of current educational programs in the state mapped against the knowledge and skill requirements needed by manufacturing, where gaps are identified. Articulation includes the current modes of learning and how they compare with modern learning techniques (i.e., eLearning, virtual learning, virtual reality, augment reality, mixed reality, etc.).





**Expected Outputs**: Qualitative and quantitative data will be collected through online surveying and regional onsite focus groups. The data will be utilized to structure a planned response to the identified needs of workforce development and guide activity based on gaps identified in workforce skills, educational opportunities, and delivery modes. Follow-up with primary industries will be utilized to assess progress in closing gaps in workforce development and educational issues related to improving the local, regional, and statewide economy.

**Expected Outcome:** This statewide workforce assessment and analysis will prepare AEDC and partners to better provide workforce development and training that meets the needs of regional employers and unifies the efforts of key workforce development stakeholders.

**Proposed Schedule**: We expect to submit an RFP to third-party firms and to have a final selection and defined scope of work finalized by March 30, 2022. All project work and deliverables should be complete by December 31<sup>st</sup>, 2022.
