Listed below are some of the major issues with Judges that are being seen in the state. This information is from the area directors themselves. If you need additional information or clarification, please contact Beki Dunagan.

Area 1

Madison and Washington county have the same judge, Zimmerman. Here are our areas concerns, this is a brief contemplation of what's occurred in the last 6 months or so

1. No cell phones, bags/purses or any personal items . Only paper and pen are allowed in the courtroom.
2. Court is 3 sometimes all days of the week. Court often runs very late and it has been into the later part of the evening on many occasions . Workers are scrambling to get child care due to it for example being 630 pm on a Friday and they are still in court. Workers are unable to work their cases because they spend the majority of their time in the courtroom.
3. The judge court orders absolutely everything . Not allowing the department to provide quality service for the families.
4. Along with court orders Washington county is often ordered to do 4 hour visits, or 1 hour visits 3 times a week, As, well as the time and date are court order . Not allowing the department to be able to manage our own schedule . Visits are also court ordered on the weekends.
5. The judge often takes children into care for not going to school. It seems as if foster care is used as a punishment.
6. The department is often ordered to pay for many many things that the parents should be paying for. Such as it was court ordered today that the department pay half of the grandmothers first three months of rent. That is 1600 in three months.
7. Recently our judge ordered more visitation instead of restricting or even keeping the visitation the same when there are two separate investigations on both parents for sex abuse.
8. There is a lack of confidentiality in Washington county. Court hearings happen when other outside people are in the court room. Such as an emergency hearing was called and the worker was not present but a supervisor happened to be in the court room and the judge called the child on the phone and discussed a suicide attempt while children from delinquency court were still in the court room. This is only one example but this has happened on multiple occasions.
9. The judge takes I would say 50 to 60 % of her own holds in Washington county and opens up numerous PS cases due to fins. Often times it is on the line of abuse or neglect . Many teenagers are coming into foster care a) they aren't going to school b) the judge feels the family can't handle the teen c) and this week a teen came into care because he was turning 18 and his family was going to ask him to move out and the judge wanted DHS to pay for an apartment . That hold was released.
- 10.. The department is often ordered to bring teens across the state for court. If we had our cell phones we could face time or Skype .
11. Lastly, the judge often goes against the recommendation of DHS. She sends children home or with family members and many times the kids come right back into care. She orders the department to do home studies on family members that can't pass the background check and sometimes test positive for drugs in court . She sometimes even orders us to place with these family members who have criminal backgrounds and failed drug test

Area 2

Sebastian County: Judge Zeucker cancels hearings at the last minute, without notice and witnesses have to come back in some cases multiple times Judge Hendricks and Judge Spears both have cattle calls which create FSWs having to sit in court for hours waiting on a 10 minute hearing Judges ordering DHS to do week-end visits for both Saturdays and

Sundays FSWs not getting court orders until the day before the next hearing (this is an OCC thing I guess) Ordering inappropriate adolescents into care for things such as educational neglect during the summer

Crawford County: Judge Medlock: Our complaints would be that the courts want to decide placement rather than us. They will place out of state with denies or no ICPC. Sometimes if we do have n approved ICPC he won't let us place. The other issue is that we are ordered through juvenile court into cases without notice. They use to notice John Selic but would never tell us what they wanted from us until the judge ordered the service. In on of our cases the judge has ordered is to provide services to a family that lives in OK

Logan, Scott, Yell: Judge Sullivan does not like us to place with provisional placement until after PC. He also wants the provisional placement at court and then he will approve. He just started ordering that the Department cannot place a child in a provisional placement unless we get approval from the AAL.

Area 5

Judge Layton orders 2-3 visits every week for 2-3 hours each on each parent. - Baxter, Boone, Newton, Marion. This is the biggest issue. Judge Braswell does it to a lesser extent in VanBuren and Searcy County but because of their caseloads they are able to handle this better.

Area 9

Cleburne County- Judge Harrod ordering families to come to DHS and open a supportive services case for random reasons through FINS. Currently have an issue with one he did this on, the juvenile needs drug treatment but the family has private insurance that will not pay and he ordered them to come to the department for the services. He has also asked supervisors in his judicial district to meet with HRA regarding their services and what they can provide to the families in FINS and report back to him. He has juvenile officers to do this but yet making our staff do it.

Cross County- Judge Hudson has continued a lot of cases for TPR for the past year, due to various reasons

White County- Judge Edwards does not allow the agency to do provisional on potential relatives, and he does not like protection plans being filed in his court. We have filed a few protection plans in his court however and he has verbalized his concerns with them but gone ahead and allowed them. He also does not like 30 day petitions or Less than Custody being filed in his court. OCC tries to make the agency do other things so these do not have to filed in his courts.

Poinsett County- FINS court- Judge Halsey ordering juveniles into custody without notice. In one day recently , 5 children were ordered into care from FINS. I am now having a worker go to FINS court to try to prevent this and offer services to families so they do not have to be removed.
