CORRECTIONS

INMATES

Department of Correction - Funding for Additional Beds

ACT 1 (HB1001) and ACT 5 (SB1) are identical and amend the fiscal year 2015 revenue stabilization allocation in Category "A" to add an additional six million two hundred seven thousand two hundred forty-nine dollars (\$6,207,249) to the Department of Correction Inmate Care and Custody Fund Account. The Joint Budget Committee also approved a request by the Chief Fiscal Officer of the State to reduce the deduction for the State Central Services Fund by one-tenth of one percent (.1%) to fund the increased allocation for the Department of Correction without affecting other revenue stabilization allocations. The acts declare an emergency and are effective on and after July 3, 2014.

INSURANCE

COVERAGE AND BENEFITS

Public School Employees

ACT 2 (HB1003) and Act 7 (SB4) are identical and require a public school employee to perform his or her duties at least thirty (30) hours per week to be eligible for participation in the State and Public School Life and Health Insurance Program beginning in the 2015 plan year. The acts declare an emergency and are effective on and after July 3, 2014.

State and Public School Life and Health Insurance Program

ACT 3 (HB1004) and ACT 6 (SB3) are identical and (1) modify the membership of the State and Public School Life and Health Insurance Board and the board's Benefits Subcommittee and Drug Utilization and Evaluation Subcommittee; (2) require a participant in a consumer-driven health insurance plan option to establish a health savings account; (3) require verification of dependent eligibility; (4) provide for implementation of a policy to identify funds not required for federal taxes under the Federal Insurance Contributions Act and to use the funds for premium assistance; (5) remove the requirement that a school district use funds allocated for public school employee health insurance through the matrix to support public school employee health insurance premiums; (6) define "dependent" to exclude a participant's spouse if the spouse has access to healthcare coverage through the spouse's employer or if the spouses are legally separated or divorced; (7) define "participant" as an individual or an individual's dependent who is enrolled in the State and Public School Life and Health Insurance Program and who continues to be eligible to participate in the program; (8) define "rural school district"; (9) limit the annual cost of coverage for the Pilot Program for morbid obesity diagnosis and treatment to three million dollars (\$3,000,000) for each state and public school employee health benefit plan; and (10) allow the board to suspend the Pilot Program for morbid obesity diagnosis and treatment to ensure financial soundness of the State and Public School Life and Health Insurance Program.

LOTTERY

LOTTERY COMMISSION

Lottery Games – Multidraw Screen-based Games

ACT 4 (HB1005) and ACT 8 (SB5) are identical and (1) define "multidraw screen-based lottery game" and (2) restrict the lottery from implementing multidraw screen-based lottery games. The prohibition on multidraw screen-based lottery games expires on March 13, 2015. The acts declare an emergency and are effective on and after July 3, 2014.

PUBLIC FINANCE

REVENUE STABILIZATION LAW

State Central Services Fund - Reduction

ACT 1 (HB1001) and ACT 5 (SB1) are identical and amend the fiscal year 2015 revenue stabilization allocation in Category "A" to add an additional six million two hundred seven thousand two hundred forty-nine dollars (\$6,207,249) to the Department of Correction Inmate Care and Custody Fund Account. The Joint Budget Committee also approved a request by the Chief Fiscal Officer of the State to reduce the deduction for the State Central Services Fund by one-tenth of one percent (.1%) to fund the increased allocation for the Department of Correction without affecting other revenue stabilization allocations. The acts declare an emergency and are effective on and after July 3, 2014.
