23	DIVISION. There is hereby appropriated, to the Department of Education,						
24	to be payable from the Public School Fund, for grants and aids to local school

SECTION 3. For the purposes of this Act, "school district" means a 2 3 school district which contracts with a school district in an adjoining state 4 for the education of some of the pupils within the Arkansas school district 5 because the portion of the school district wherein such pupils live is 6 completely separated from the remainder of the school district by a reservoir 7 covering at least 12,000 acres at normal water level, and where to attend 8 school in their own district, the pupils of said portion would be required to 9 travel or to be transported a distance (measured by the nearest highway or 10 road route) of more than 35 miles round trip and pass through another school 11 district or districts. The Department of Education shall distribute the 12 monies appropriated by Item (13) of Section 1 of this Act to such school 13 district as reimbursement for expenses incurred in educating the pupils 14 residing in the separated portion of the school district. Such school 15 district shall file a request for reimbursement with the Department of 16 Education and provide the Department of Education with such documentation as 17 is deemed necessary. 18 SECTION 4. FUNDING. Of the first monies distributed to the Public 19 20 School Fund in each fiscal year of the 1991-93 biennium, an amount equal to 21 those amounts set forth in Item (13) of Section 1 of this Act shall be set 22 aside each fiscal year in order to provide funding for the appropriation in 23 Item (13) of Section 1 of this Act. 2.4 25 SECTION 5. FUNDING PROVISION AND ADMINISTRATION. The appropriation 26 provided by the General Assembly for "Public School Employees Insurance", 27 which is made payable from the Public School Fund, shall be administered by 28 the School Insurance Section of the Department of Education - General 29 Education Division, in accordance with the provisions of Arkansas Code § 30 6-17-1101--6-17-1112, 6-17-1114, and Arkansas Code § 23-86-101--23-86-109, 31 23-86-112. In the event that there are insufficient funds or appropriation 32 available to disburse the maximum contribution for insurance premiums provided 33 for each eligible public school employee as may be set out by law, or if the 34 General Assembly fails to set a contribution level, the State Board of

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35 Education may establish a State contribution level for public school employee

1 insurance premiums within the amount of appropriation and funds available.

- 2 Provided, however, for the fiscal year 1987-88 and thereafter, monthly
- 3 contributions per employee of the Public School Employees Insurance Section
- 4 shall not exceed that amount authorized and expended in behalf of members of
- 5 the State Employees Insurance Section. In addition to those purposes, as set
- 6 out in said Arkansas Code provisions enumerated in this Section, the
- 7 appropriation for the "Public School Employees Insurance" shall be utilized
- 8 for the personal services and operating expenses as required by the Department
- 9 of Education to administer the Public School Employees Insurance Program. The
- 10 Chief Fiscal Officer of the State is hereby authorized to establish the
- 11 necessary amounts of appropriation for regular salaries, operating expenses,
- 12 and any other necessary items, by transferring such required amounts from the
- 13 appropriation made for "Public School Employees Insurance".

14

- 15 SECTION 6. ELEMENTARY AND HIGH SCHOOL TEXTBOOKS. Local school districts
- 16 are hereby authorized to transfer up to twenty percent (20%) of their
- 17 allotments for high school and elementary textbooks, as determined by the
- 18 State Board of Education, from those funds appropriated for textbook
- 19 allotments by Item (04) of Section 1 of this Act. This amount may be
- 20 transferred from the portion of textbook allotment designated for high school
- 21 textbooks to the portion of textbook allotment designated for elementary
- 22 textbooks, or vice versa, after written notification to and confirmation from
- 23 the Free Textbooks Section of the Department of Education.

24

- 25 SECTION 7. The funds appropriated in the line item "Special Education
- 26 Services" in Section 1 of this Act shall be used to provide extended year
- 27 summer programs for handicapped students in need of such services, to provide
- 28 special education services to foster children who are wards of the State, and
- 29 to provide funds for the payment of salaries of special education supervisors.
- 30 The Department of Education shall distribute such funds in the manner
- 31 necessary to carry out the intent of this Section.

32

- 33 SECTION 8. The additional state financial aid for public elementary and
- 34 secondary education provided to the school districts of this State pursuant to
- 35 the provisions of this Act shall be expended to improve the quality of

1 education in the public school; therefore, no state financial aid appropriated 2 by this Act and distributed pursuant to the school aid formula shall be 3 expended for the support of extra-curricular activities or athletic programs. 5 SECTION 9. The funds appropriated in Section 2 of this Act may also be 6 used to match any available federal funds from any agency in order to provide 7 the maximum amount of money possible for the purposes enumerated in such 8 section. 9 SECTION 10. RESTRICTIONS. (A) The funds appropriated by Item (03) of 10 11 Section 2 herein, shall be administered by the Department of Education -12 Vocational and Technical Education Division and shall be used to provide 13 additional assistance to local school districts to enhance and/or upgrade 14 equipment in existing job-specific programs. Pursuant to policies and 15 regulations which include applications, disbursement procedures, and matching 16 requirements of the Vocational and Technical Division, these funds can be used 17 to purchase capital equipment to enhance or technically upgrade existing 18 job-specific vocational programs. Such funds shall be distributed to local 19 school districts in such amounts, as determined by the Department of Education 20 - Vocational and Technical Education Division. 2.1 22 SECTION 11. Of the funds appropriated and made available for Computer-23 Based Education Grants in Section 1 of this Act, an amount up to \$100,000 per 24 year may be used to contract with private providers for continuing an adult 25 literacy project. 26 27 SECTION 12. Of the monies appropriated herein, the Department of 28 Education is hereby authorized to expend up to \$50,000 during the 1991-93 29 biennium for the purpose of revising and publishing the School Laws of 30 Arkansas. 31 SECTION 13. The funds appropriated in Item (02) of Section 1 of this 32 33 Act for County General Aid shall, except in those instances where a majority 34 of the school boards in the county have voted not to retain the offices and 35 functions of the county supervisor or clerk, be disbursed to the several

1 counties as now provided by law and shall remain in the respective counties 2 and be apportioned on a pro rata basis to the schools or school districts 3 within the county. SECTION 14. SET ASIDE FUNDING. An amount of \$2,000,000 of the Public 6 School Fund shall be set aside and used exclusively to comply with Arkansas 7 Code 6-17-1113 and 6-20-313 to provide liability protection for school board 8 members, school nurses, substitute teachers, authorized volunteers, student 9 teachers, teacher aides, and each person required to be certified by the 10 Arkansas Department of Education employed by a public school district, School 11 for the Blind, School for the Deaf, Education Cooperative and County Board of 12 Education. 13 14 SECTION 15. The funds appropriated in this Act for Restructuring 15 Schools Grants shall be allocated in accordance with regulations and 16 procedures promulgated by the State Board of Education. 17 SECTION 16. The funds appropriated by Item (28) of Section 1 of this 18 19 Act for the Remediation Program shall be used for remedial/compensatory 20 programs for students who are eligible for such programs as determined by 21 regulations adopted by the State Board of Education. 22 SECTION 17. VOCATIONAL CENTER AID. The distribution of funds for 23 24 Vocational Center Aid shall be made directly to the various Vocational 25 Centers, with a notation to be included on the document which certifies state 26 aid for the Minimum Foundation Program sent to school districts that such 27 amounts have been transferred directly to the Vocational Centers. 28 amounts will be considered as current year expenses for school districts but 29 will not be a part of the net current revenue of the school districts. 30 31 SECTION 18. IMPAC TRANSFER. With the approval of the Chief Fiscal 32 Officer of the State, a portion of the funds appropriated in Item (25) of 33 Section 1 of this Act may be transferred to a non-profit agency for the sole 34 purpose of providing funds that shall be used for the improvement and

35 promotion of computer assisted instructional programs in the public schools of

1 Arkansas.

2

3 SECTION 19. Of the funds and appropriation authorized by Item (01) in 4 Section 2 of this Act for Adult Basic and General Adult Education, a sum of 5 \$1,050,000 each fiscal year shall be made available to the secondary area 6 vocational centers managed by local education agencies, in order to expand the 7 vocational education and training opportunities available to area citizens in 8 need of adult educational training or retraining due to changing technology.

9 The secondary area vocational centers which elect to provide enhanced 10 education/training employment or retraining services appropriate to area 11 industry/business needs, may request from the State Board of Vocational

12 Education to be designated as a Community Based Education Center.

13

14 SECTION 20. Section 3 of Act 10 of 1991 is hereby amended to add a new 15 subsection to read as follows:

"(d) As used in this section 'current certified personnel positions'
shall mean the number of certified employees, excluding the superintendent and
assistant superintendents, employed by a school district on February 1, 1991."

19

SECTION 21. (A) For the fiscal year ending June 30, 1992, the
Department of Education shall from time to time as needed, certify to the
State Treasurer and the Chief Fiscal Officer of the State, the amount of funds
disbursed for desegregation expenses under the "Pulaski County School
Desegregation Settlement Agreement." Upon the receipt of such certification,
the State Treasurer, after making those deductions as set out in Arkansas Code
19-5-202(b)(2)(B), shall also deduct up to, but not to exceed in total for
FY92, the sum of \$31,614,070 from the net general revenues and transfer this
amount to the Public School Fund.

(B) For the fiscal year ending June 30, 1993, the Department of
30 Education shall from time to time as needed, certify to the State Treasurer
31 and the Chief Fiscal Officer of the State, the amount of funds disbursed for
32 desegregation expenses under the "Pulaski County School Desegregation
33 Settlement Agreement." Upon the receipt of such certification, the State
34 Treasurer, after making those deductions as set out in Arkansas Code 19-535 202(b)(2)(B), shall also deduct up to, but not to exceed in total for FY93,

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1 the sum of \$25,905,129 from the net general revenues and transfer this amount 2 to the Public School Fund. 3 SECTION 22. An amount of funds equal to the average raise provided for 5 certified public school employees each fiscal year by Act 10 of 1991 shall be 6 provided to the certified personnel employed by the North Central Vocational 7 Center from the appropriation and funds authorized herein for Cooperative 8 Education Services Areas. 9 SECTION 23. COMPLIANCE WITH OTHER LAWS. Disbursement of funds 10 11 authorized by this Act shall be limited to the appropriation for such agency 12 and funds made available by law for the support of such appropriations; and 13 the restrictions of the State Purchasing Law, the General Accounting and 14 Budgetary Procedures Law, the Revenue Stabilization Law, the Regular Salary 15 Procedures and Restrictions Act, or their successors, and other fiscal control 16 laws of this State, where applicable, and regulations promulgated by the 17 Department of Finance and Administration, as authorized by law, shall be 18 strictly complied with in disbursement of said funds. 19 20 SECTION 24. LEGISLATIVE INTENT. It is the intent of the General 21 Assembly that any funds disbursed under the authority of the appropriations 22 contained in this Act shall be in compliance with the stated reasons for which 23 this Act was adopted, as evidenced by the Agency Requests, Executive 24 Recommendations and Legislative Recommendations contained in the budget 25 manuals prepared by the Department of Finance and Administration, letters, or 26 summarized oral testimony in the official minutes of the Arkansas Legislative 27 Council or Joint Budget Committee which relate to its passage and adoption. 28 SECTION 25. CODE. All provisions of this Act of a general and 29 30 permanent nature are amendatory to the Arkansas Code of 1987 Annotated and 31 the Arkansas Code Revision Commission shall incorporate the same in the Code. 32 33 SECTION 26. SEVERABILITY. If any provision of this Act or the 34 application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, such

35 invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of the Act which

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1 can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this
 2 end the provisions of this Act are declared to be severable.
 3
         SECTION 27. GENERAL REPEALER. All laws and parts of laws in conflict
 5 with this Act are hereby repealed.
         SECTION 28. EMERGENCY CLAUSE. It is hereby found and determined by the
 8 Seventy-Eighth General Assembly, that the Constitution of the State of
 9 Arkansas prohibits the appropriation of funds for more than a two (2) year
10 period; that the effectiveness of this Act on July 1, 1991 is essential to the
11 operation of the agency for which the appropriations in this Act are provided,
12 and that in the event of an extension of the Regular Session, the delay in the
13 effective date of this Act beyond July 1, 1991 could work irreparable harm
14 upon the proper administration and provision of essential governmental
15 programs. Therefore, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this Act
16 being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and
17 safety shall be in full force and effect from and after July 1, 1991.
