1	SECTION 2. (a) There is created on the books of the Treasurer of		
2	State, the Auditor of State, and the Chief Fiscal Officer of the State a		
3	special revenue fund to be known as the "Arkansas Rainy Day Fund."		
4	(b)(1) The fund shall consist of such moneys as are provided under		
5	this subsection (b) and shall be used for the purposes set out in this act.		
6	(2) All general revenues available to be distributed in a fiscal		
7	year in excess of an amount equal to the amount of general revenue		
8	distributed by the state in the previous fiscal year, adjusted by the		
9	percentage change in the consumer price index of the previous four (4)		
10	available quarters, shall instead be transferred by the State Treasurer into		
11	the Arkansas Rainy Day Fund.		
12	(c)(1)(A) If the Chief Fiscal Officer of the State determines that		
13	projected general revenue distributions will not equal the amount of general		
14	revenues distributed by the state in the previous fiscal year, adjusted by		
15	the percentage change in the consumer price index of the previous four (4)		
16	available quarters, then the Governor may cause the transfer from the		
17	Arkansas Rainy Day Fund to the General Revenue Fund Account as "general		
18	revenues available for distribution" in an amount not to exceed the projecte		
19	shortfall. No more money shall be transferred than is required to meet the		
20	actual shortfall.		
21	(B) Prior to causing the transfer, the Governor shall		
22	submit the proposal to the Legislative Council for its review.		
23	(2)(A) There is created on the books of the Treasurer of State,		
24	the Auditor of State, and the Chief Fiscal Officer of the State a special		
25	revenue fund to be known as the "Arkansas Tax Relief Fund."		
26	(B) If the Rainy Day Fund exceeds an amount equal to ten		
27	percent (10%) of general revenues distributed in the previous fiscal year,		
28	then any excess above that amount shall be transferred to the Arkansas Tax		
29	Relief Fund and shall be used only for the purpose of providing tax relief as		
30	may be appropriated by the General Assembly.		
31			
32	SECTION 3. EMERGENCY CLAUSE. It is found and determined by the		
33	General Assembly that the general revenues of the State of Arkansas have		
34	significantly decreased as a result of distressed economic conditions; that a		
35	contingency fund should be created and funded for the purpose of adequately		
36	maintaining necessary state programs and services; and that this act is		

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1	immediately necessary in order to adequately fund the Arkansas Rainy Day
2	Fund. Therefore, an emergency is declared to exist and this act being
3	immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, and
4	safety shall become effective on the date of its approval by the Governor.
5	If the bill is neither approved nor vetoed by the Governor, it shall become
6	effective on the expiration of the period of time during which the Governor
7	may veto the bill. If the bill is vetoed by the Governor and the veto is
8	overridden, it shall become effective on the date the last house overrides
9	the veto.
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
