2	(a) The Child Health Advisory Committee shall meet at least once per
3	month and make recommendations to the State Board of Education and the State
4	Board of Health consistent with the intent and purpose of §§ 6-7-117 through
5	<u>6-7-119.</u>
6	(b) The Committee shall develop nutrition and physical activity
7	standards and policy recommendations with consideration of the following:
8	(1) Foods sold individually in school cafeterias but outside the
9	regulated National School Lunch Program;
10	(2) Competitive foods as defined by the United States Department
11	of Agriculture, as in existence on January 1, 2003, and offered at schools
12	typically through vending machines, student stores, school fundraisers, food
13	<pre>carts, or food concessions;</pre>
14	(3) The continuing professional development of food service
15	staff;
16	(4) The expenditure of funds derived from competitive food and
17	beverage contracts;
18	(5) Physical education and activity;

24	6-17-119. Nutrition and physical activity standards - Implementation.
25	(a) The State Board of Education, after having consulted the committee
26	and the State Board of Health, shall promulgate appropriate rules and
27	regulations to ensure that nutrition and physical activity standards are
28	implemented to provide students with the skills, opportunities, and
29	encouragement to adopt healthy lifestyles.
30	(b) Beginning with the 2003-2004 school year, the Department of
31	Health, in consultation with the Department of Education, shall:
32	(1) Employ one (1) doctoral level person to be housed within the
33	Department of Health as a community health promotion specialist to plan,
34	develop, implement, and evaluate pilot or model programs to support schools
35	and communities in nutrition and physical activity;
36	(2) Employ one (1) statewide health promotion consultant to be

1	housed within the Department of Education;
2	(3) Employ one (1) person as a community health promotion
3	specialist to support implementation of pilot or model programs in schools
4	and communities in nutrition and physical activity in several distinct
5	geographical areas of the state, if funds are available; and
6	(4) Not use more than four percent (4%) of the annual Department
7	of Health Master Settlement Agreement funds for the salaries or programs
8	created under this subsection (b).
9	(c) Beginning with the 2003-2004 school year, every school district
10	shall:
11	(1) Prohibit, for elementary school students, in-school access
12	to vending machines offering food and beverages;

14	(2) Require schools to include as part of the annual report to
15	parents and the community the amounts and specific sources of funds received
16	and expenditures made from competitive food and beverage contracts;
17	(3) Require school to include as part of the student report card to
18	parents an annual body mass index percentile by age for each student; and
19	(4) Require schools to annually provide parents with an
20	explanation of the possible health effects of body mass index, nutrition and
21	physical activity.
22	(d) Beginning with the 2004-2005 school year, the Department of
23	Education shall:
24	(1) Begin the implementation of standards developed by the
25	committee and approved by the Department of Education; and
26	(2) Annually monitor and evaluate the implementation and
27	effectiveness of the nutrition and physical education standards.
28	(e) Beginning with the 2004-2005 school year, every school district
29	shall:
30	(1) Convene a school nutrition and physical activity advisory
31	committee that shall include members from school district governing boards,
32	school administrators, food service personnel, teacher organizations,
33	parents, students, and professional groups such as nurses and community
34	members, to:
35	(A) Help raise awareness of the importance of nutrition
36	and physical activity; and

1	(B) Assist in the development of local policies that
2	address issues and goals, including, but not limited to, the following:
3	(i) Assisting with the implementation of nutrition
4	and physical activity standards developed by the committee with the approval
5	of the Department of Education and the State Board of Health;
6	(ii) Integrating nutrition and physical activity
7	into the overall curriculum;
8	(iii) Ensuring that professional development for
9	staff includes nutrition and physical activity issues;
10	(iv) Ensuring that students receive nutrition
11	education and engage in healthful levels of vigorous physical activity;
12	(v) Improving the quality of physical education
13	curricula and increasing training of physical education teachers;
14	(vi) Enforcing existing physical education
15	requirements; and
16	(vii) Pursuing contracts that both encourage healthy
17	eating by students and reduce school dependence on profits from the sale of
18	foods of minimal nutritional value;
19	(2) Begin the implementation of standards developed by the
20	committee with the approval of the Department of Education and the State
21	Board of Health; and
22	(3) Require that goals and objectives for nutrition and physical
23	activity be incorporated into the annual school planning and reporting
24	process.

26	report annually on progress in implementing nutrition and physical education
27	standards to the cochairs of the House and Senate Interim Committees on
28	Public Health, Welfare, and Labor.
