34	(D) The intent of the General Assembly mandate is to provide greater committee representation from the entire state, in particular the		
35	underserved areas of Arkansas.

- 1 reviewed for accreditation by the Liaison Committee for Medical Education,
- 2 the college is required to explain the reasons for the inclusion of
- 3 <u>nonfaculty members on the admissions committee.</u>
- 4 (F) The College of Medicine Admissions Committee is the only
- 5 <u>medical school admissions committee in the United States that includes</u>
- 6 nonfaculty members.
- 7 (2)(A) Arkansas law mandates that seventy percent (70%) of the one
- 8 hundred fifty (150) positions in the Freshman class each year be equally
- 9 distributed among the four (4) congressional districts.
- 10 (B) The seventy percent (70%) requirement increases the
- 11 geographical distribution and number of applicants from underserved areas of
- 12 the state who are accepted for admission.
- 13 (C) The University of Arkansas College of Medicine is the only
- 14 medical school in the United States that incorporates the seventy percent
- 15 (70%) rule in the admissions process.
- 16 (3)(A) Many state medical schools have programs similar to the
- 17 Arkansas program whose purpose is to increase the number of physicians
- 18 practicing in rural communities in the state.
- 19 (B) Arkansas has had a program since 1949, the Arkansas Rural
- 20 Medical Practice Student Loan and Scholarship Program, that provides
- 21 financial incentives to medical students who contract to practice medicine in
- 22 rural communities in the state.
- 23 (C) Medical students are given substantial amounts of loans
- 24 during medical school with the contractual agreement that the loans will be
- 25 <u>converted to grants or forgiven</u>, if they complete residency training and
- 26 practice medicine in an underserved rural community in the state.
- 27 (D) However, Act 114 of 1995 created a new program, the
- 28 Community Math Student Loan and Scholarship Program, which significantly
- 29 modified the existing Arkansas Rural Medical Practice Student Loan and
- 30 Scholarship Program.
- 31 (E) Act 1257 of 1995 strengthened the penalties for students who
- 32 default on their contractual obligation to practice medicine in the state.
- 33 (F) However, the unique feature of Act 1114 of 1995, a specific
- 34 provision that no other medical school in the United States has, is that if
- 35 an alternate on the waiting list contracts with a rural community to practice
- 36 primary care in that rural community, and the application is approved by the

- 1 Arkansas Rural Medical Practice Student Loan and Scholarship Board that
- 2 administers the program, the alternate is advanced to the top of the waiting
- 3 <u>list and this greatly enhances the applicant's chances of being admitted to</u>
- 4 medical school.
- 5 <u>(G) This unique feature also applies to alternates who wish to</u>
- 6 apply for the Arkansas Rural Practice Program.
- 7 (H) Alternates who contract to practice medicine in a rural
- 8 underserved community in the state, if approved by the board, are advanced on
- 9 the waiting list, just below the Community Match Alternates who are approved
- 10 <u>and advanced.</u>
- 11 (I) Since the program's inception in 1995, the University of
- 12 Arkansas College of Medicine has had approximately one hundred twenty-five
- 13 (125) physicians-in-training contract to return to underserved areas of the
- 14 state to practice full time primary care medicine.
- 15 <u>(J) Applicants from underserved areas are typically given</u>
- 16 greater considerations for participation and approval for the rural loan and
- 17 scholarship programs.

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- 19 SECTION 2. Arkansas Code § 6-64-406(b)(1), concerning proportional
- 20 medical college admissions by congressional district, is amended to read as
- 21 follows:
- 22 (b)(1)(A) The Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas shall
- 23 allocate the first seventy percent (70%) of all enrollment positions for the
- 24 freshman medical class among Arkansas congressional districts, using the
- 25 population of each congressional district as determined by the last federal
- decennial census to determine that district's proportion of the freshman
- 27 positions so allocated and shall assign those apportioned enrollment
- 28 positions for each district to those applicants who are legal residents in
- 29 that particular congressional district.
- 30 (B) The board shall give additional consideration to rural
- 31 <u>applicants from medically underserved areas in an effort to address health</u>
- 32 disparities.
- 33 (C)(i) The board shall promulgate rules and provide
- 34 resources to allow the area health education centers to offer one (1) year
- 35 programs to prepare identified medical school candidates from medically
- 36 <u>underserved areas of the state for the Medical College Admission Test.</u>

1	(ii) Preparation for the Medical College Admission		
2	Test shall include, but not be limited to:		
3	(a) Recruitment and guidance of individuals		
4	interested in health care professions;		
5	(b) Early targeting of potential candidates,		
6	including junior high school, high school, two-year college, and four-year		
7	college undergraduate students;		
8	(c) Use of community colleges throughout the		
9	state to offer Med Prep and other targeted studies with the aid of video and		
10	distance learning tools; and		
11	(d) Ensuring that everyone interested in a		
12	medical profession receives an equal opportunity for success.		
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
