11	PROVIDE FOR EDUCATION FUNDING; TO ESTABLISH
12	EDUCATIONAL ADEQUACY ACCOUNTING; TO ESTABLISH
13	MINIMUM TEACHER COMPENSATION; AND FOR OTHER
14	PURPOSES.

16	Subtitle
17	AN ACT PROVIDING EDUCATION REFORM; TO
18	PROVIDE FOR EDUCATION FUNDING; TO
19	ESTABLISH EDUCATIONAL ADEQUACY
20	ACCOUNTING; AND TO ESTABLISH MINIMUM
21	TEACHER COMPENSATION.
22	
23	
24	BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:
25	
26	SECTION 1. Arkansas Code Title 6, Chapter 20, is amended to add the
27	following new subchapter:
28	6-20-2001. Title and purpose.
29	(a) This subchapter shall be known and may be cited as the "Education
30	Funding Reform Act of 2003".
31	(b) The purpose of this subchapter is to establish adequate levels of
32	funding for public schools. This subchapter does not impose staffing
33	requirements or minimum teacher-student ratios upon public schools.
34	
35	6-20-2002. Legislative findings and intent.
36	(a) The General Assembly recognizes that intelligence and virtue are



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1	the safeguards of liberty and the bulwark of a free and good government and
2	that the Arkansas Constitution, Article 14, § 1 requires the state to ever
3	maintain a general, suitable, and efficient system of free public schools and
4	to adopt all suitable means to secure to the people the advantages and
5	opportunities of education.
6	(b) The General Assembly finds that the education of the children of
7	this state is best secured by maintaining as much local control over the day-
8	to-day management of school operations as is consistent with state
9	constitutional requirements. It is the intent of this subchapter to maintain
10	and foster local control consistent with the state's constitutional mandate
11	to assure suitability and efficiency in the public school system.
12	(c) The General Assembly finds that a suitable and efficient system of
13	public education should:
14	(1) Assure the availability of substantially equal and
15	constitutionally appropriate revenue for the education of each similarly
16	situated child in the public schools, regardless of where that child resides
17	within the state;
18	(2) Assure that each school-age child resides in a school
19	district that offers a competitive minimum salary for classroom teachers;
20	(3) Assure that there is incentive and opportunity for patrons
21	of each school district to provide a greater degree of financial support for
22	students of the school district than may be provided in other school
23	<u>districts;</u>
24	(4) Assure that:
25	(A) All students graduating from high school are able to
26	demonstrate a defined minimum level of competence in:
27	(i) English, oral communications, reading, and
28	writing;
29	(ii) Mathematics skills; and
30	(iii) Science and social studies disciplines; and
31	(B) The minimum level of competence evolves over time to
32	higher levels;
33	(5) Assure that students with disabilities have the opportunity
34 25	to graduate from high school by demonstrating alternative competencies or
35	alternative levels of competency;
36	(6) Assure that students who are not on track for high school

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1	graduation are identified at a sufficiently early date that they may be
2	provided an opportunity at a reasonable cost to achieve the minimum levels of
3	competence necessary to graduate from high school;
4	(7) Recognize that graduating from high school requires that the
5	student, as well as the parent, parents, or guardian of the student work hard
6	and assume appropriate responsibility for the student's success or failure;
7	(8) Encourage parental participation in the public schools and
8	in public school activities;
9	(9) Recognize that public schools must provide a safe,
10	disciplined, and drug-free environment for students and teachers;
11	(10) Avoid disproportionate variances among school districts in
12	the financial burden imposed on taxpayers;
13	(11) Avoid unnecessary duplication of administrative and
14	operational expenses;
15	(12) Avoid disproportionate variances among school districts in
16	the use of classroom teachers and capital resources; and
17	(13) Recognize that early attention to and correction of student
18	deficiencies are substantially less expensive and more effective than
19	remedial efforts in the later school grades.
20	(d)(1) The General Assembly acknowledges that the Arkansas
21	Constitution requires the state to provide a general, suitable, and efficient
22	system of free public schools.
23	(2) The obligation has been held by the Arkansas courts to be a
24	paramount duty of the state.
25	(e) The General Assembly recognizes that the supervision of public
26	schools and the execution of the laws regulating the schools is vested in
27	such officers as the General Assembly provides.
28	(f) The General Assembly recognizes the importance of local decision-
29	making in the education process, however, local decision-making can not be an
30	excuse for failure.
31	
32	6-20-2003. Definitions.
33	As used in this subchapter:
34	(1) "Alternative learning environment" means an intervention
35	program in compliance with §§ 6-18-508 and 6-18-509 that seeks to eliminate
36	traditional barriers to learning for students:

1	(2) "Average daily membership" means the total number of days
2	attended plus the total number of days absent by students in grades
3	kindergarten through twelve (K-12) during the first three (3) quarters of
4	each school year, divided by the number of school days actually taught in the
5	school district during that period of time rounded up to the nearest
6	hundredth. In those instances in which the average daily membership for less
7	than three (3) quarters is specified, the number of days used in the
8	calculation shall be the days in the specified period of time. As applied to
9	this subchapter, students who may be counted for average daily membership
10	are:
11	(A) Students who reside within the boundaries of the
12	school district and are enrolled within a public school operated by the
13	school district or a private school for special education students, with the
14	attendance resulting from a written tuition agreement approved by the
15	Department of Education;
16	(B) Legally transferred students living outside the
17	district but attending a public school in the school district; and
18	(C) Students who reside within the boundaries of the
19	school district and are enrolled in the Arkansas National Guard Youth
20	Challenge Program, so long as the students are participants in the program;
21	(3)(A) "Catastrophic special education" means the state program
22	that funds the costs of educating students in special education whose costs
23	exceed the amount of funding provided under the state foundation program.
24	(B) The State Board of Education shall have regulatory
25	authority to further define those costs that the state will provide under
26	this program;
27	(4) "Classroom teachers" means those certified personnel who
28	spend seventy percent (70%) of their time interacting with students in a
29	classroom setting teaching all grade level or subject matter appropriate
30	classes with the exception of physical education, art, and music;
31	(5) "English language learning students" means those students
32	who have been identified as not proficient in the English language based upon
33	a state-approved English proficiency assessment instrument;
34	(6) "Extra duty pay for teachers" means those amounts paid to
35	teachers for duties performed outside of the course and scope of their duties
36	covered by their contracts;

1	(7) "Gifted and talented programs" means academic curriculum,
2	courses, and options designed to improve educational opportunities for gifted
3	and talented students pursuant to guidelines adopted by the State Board of
4	Education in accordance with § 6-42-106;
5	(8) "Gifted and talented students" means those students who have
6	been identified as meeting the criteria of the gifted program approval
7	standards established by the State Board of Education;
, 8	(9) "Guidance counselor" means an individual certified by the
9	State Board of Education to provide counseling services to public school
10	students;
11	(10) "Instructional facilitators" means the certified personnel
12	who coordinate the instructional programs, provide ongoing coaching and
13	mentoring of teachers to change and improve their instructional practices,
14	and serve as technology coordinators for the school;
15	(11) "Instructional materials" means those materials necessary
16	to teach a class, including, but not limited to, textbooks, trade books,
17	workbooks, activity-oriented programs that may include manipulatives, hand-
18	held calculators, or other hands-on materials, laboratory equipment, and
19	equipment necessary for vocational-technical education;
20	(12) "Librarians or media specialists" means individuals
21	certified by the State Board of Education as having the knowledge and skills
22	for operating a library or media center in a public school;
23	(13) "Miscellaneous revenues" means the lesser of either the
24	previous year or the average of the five (5) previous years of those funds
25	received by a school district from federal forest reserves, federal grazing
26	rights, federal mineral rights, federal impact aid, federal flood control,
27	wildlife refuge funds, severance taxes, funds received by the school district
28	in lieu of taxes, and local sales and use taxes dedicated to education under
29	<u>§§ 26-74-201 et seq., 26-74-301 et seq., 26-75-301 et seq., and 14-164-301 et</u>
30	seq.;
31	(14)(A) "Noninstructional and support components" means the
32	total statewide expenditures in the prior school year to support activities
33	not directly related to classroom learning divided by the previous year's
34	statewide average daily membership.
35	(B) "Noninstructional and support components" include, but
36	are not limited to, expenditures for general administration, business

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1	support, operation and maintenance services, school plant services, student
2	transportation services, extracurricular activities, capital expenditures,
3	and central support services.
4	(C) "Noninstructional and support components" does not
5	include debt service payments;
6	(15) "Previous year" means the school year immediately preceding
7	the school year in which funds are allocated;
8	(16) "Principal" means a certified individual employed by a
9	school district who has administrative responsibility and instructional
10	leadership for the planning, management, operation, and evaluation of a
11	<pre>public school;</pre>
12	(17) "Professional development" means a coordinated set of
13	planned learning activities for teachers and administrators that are
14	standards-based and contiguous. It shall result in individual, school-wide,
15	and system-wide improvement designed to ensure that all students demonstrate
16	proficiency in the state academic standards;
17	(18) "Pupil support staff" means those individuals employed to
18	provide health, safety, and social services to the students in a school;
19	(19) "School district" means a geographic area with an elected
20	board of directors which qualifies as a taxing unit for purposes of ad
21	valorem property taxes under Title 26 of the Arkansas Code and which conducts
22	the daily affairs of public schools under the supervisory authority vested in
23	them by the General Assembly;
24	(20) "School type" means the classification given to each type
25	of school, whether it be elementary, middle, or high school;
26	(21) "Specialist teachers" means those certified personnel who
27	spend seventy percent (70%) of their time interacting with students in a
28	classroom setting teaching the subjects of physical education, art, and
29	music;
30	(22) "Struggling students" means those students from low socio-
31	economic background as indicated by eligibility for the free or reduced-price
32	lunch program under the National School Lunch Act or any other act of
33	Congress;
34	(23) "Substitute teachers" means those individuals employed in
35	order to temporarily replace classroom or specialist teachers when the
36	classroom or specialist teachers are absent;

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1	(24) "Supervisory aides" means those individuals employed in
2	order to supervise students when those students are not in class. This may
3	be either before or after school, during recesses, or lunch breaks;
4	(25) "Teachers for English language learning students" means
5	those certified personnel who are primarily responsible for teaching English
6	to English language learning students;
7	(26) "Teachers for special education students" means those
8	certified personnel who are primarily responsible for teaching students
9	specified as special education under the Individuals with Disabilities Act,
10	20 U.S.C. § 1400 et seq., or who are speech pathologists as defined by the
11	state board;
12	(27) "Teachers for struggling students" means those certified
13	personnel who are primarily responsible for helping struggling students; and
14	(28) "Technology" means any equipment for instructional purposes
15	that is electronic in nature, including, but not limited to, computer
16	hardware, computer software, internet connectivity, and distance learning.
17	
18	6-20-2004. Foundational funding amount.
19	(a) Each school district shall be guaranteed a foundational funding
20	amount based upon the allocation of resources generated under this section as
21	follows:
22	(1) Personnel Resources:
23	(A) Principal.
24	(i) For every school, a school district shall be
25	apportioned funding for one (1) principal for every five hundred (500)
26	students in average daily membership rounded up to one-tenth (0.1) of a full-
27	time equivalency.
28	(ii) Each principal shall carry a resource price of
29	seventy-one thousand eight hundred thirty-seven dollars (\$71,837), or pro-
30	ration thereof rounded up to one-tenth (0.1) of a full-time equivalency.
31	(iii) Each school will be guaranteed funding for at
32	least one (1) principal, notwithstanding the calculations under this
33	subdivision (a)(1)(A);
34	(B) Instructional Facilitators. For every school, a
35	school district shall be apportioned funding for a number of instructional
36	facilitators equal to the average daily membership of that school divided by

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1	five hundred (500) times two and one-half (2.5), so long as each school has a
2	minimum of one (1) instructional facilitator. Each instructional
3	facilitator, or pro-ration thereof rounded down to the nearest one-tenth
4	(0.1) of a full-time equivalency, shall carry a resource price of forty-seven
5	thousand two hundred fifty dollars (\$47,250);
6	(C) Classroom Teachers.
7	(i) For every school, a school district shall be
8	apportioned funding for the following number of classroom teachers, based on
9	the average daily membership of that school:
10	(a) For every twenty (20) students in average
11	daily membership in kindergarten, one (1) teacher rounded down to one-tenth
12	(0.1) of a full-time equivalency;
13	(b) For every twenty-three (23) students in
14	average daily membership in grades one through three (1-3), one (1) teacher
15	rounded down to one-tenth (0.1) of a full-time equivalency; and
16	(c) For every twenty-five (25) students in
17	average daily membership in grades four through twelve (4-12), one (1)
18	teacher rounded down to one-tenth (0.1) of a full-time equivalency.
19	(ii) Each classroom teacher or pro-ration thereof
20	rounded down to the nearest to one-tenth (0.1) of a full-time equivalency,
21	shall carry a resource price of forty-seven thousand two hundred fifty
22	dollars (\$47,250) for each classroom teacher, or pro-ration thereof rounded
23	down to the nearest to one-tenth (0.1) of a full-time equivalency;
24	(D) Specialist Teachers. For every classroom teacher, a
25	school will be allocated funding for two-tenths (0.2) of a full-time
26	equivalency for specialist teachers, which shall carry a resource price of
27	forty-seven thousand two hundred fifty dollars (\$47,250) for each specialist
28	teacher, or pro-ration thereof rounded down to the nearest to one-tenth (0.1)
29	of a full-time equivalency;
30	(E) Teachers for Special Education. For every school, a
31	school district shall be apportioned funding for a number of teachers for
32	special education equal to the average daily membership of that school
33	divided by five hundred (500) times two and nine-tenths (2.9) rounded down to
34	one-tenth (0.1) of a full-time equivalency, so long as each school has a
35	minimum of one-half (0.5) teachers for special education, which shall carry a
36	resource price of forty-seven thousand two hundred fifty dollars (\$47,250)

1	for each teacher for special education, or pro-ration thereof rounded down to
2	the nearest to one-tenth (0.1) of a full-time equivalency;
3	(F) Guidance Counselors.
4	(i) For every school, a school district shall be
5	apportioned funding for guidance counselors as follows:
6	(a) If the school type is middle school, one
7	(1) guidance counselor for every five hundred (500) students in average daily
8	membership rounded down to one-tenth (0.1) of a full-time equivalency; and
9	(b) If the school type is high school, two (2)
10	guidance counselors for every five hundred (500) students in average daily
11	membership rounded down to one-tenth (0.1) of a full-time equivalency.
12	(ii) Each guidance counselor shall carry a resource
13	price of forty-seven thousand two hundred fifty dollars (\$47,250), or pro-
14	ration thereof rounded down to the nearest to one-tenth (0.1) of a full-time
15	equivalency;
16	(G) Librarians or Media Specialists.
17	(i) For every school, a school district shall be
18	apportioned funding for librarians or media specialists as follows:
19	(a) If the school type is middle school, for
20	one (1) librarian or media specialist for every five hundred (500) students
21	in average daily membership rounded down to one-tenth (0.1) of a full-time
22	equivalency;
23	(b) If the school type is high school, for one
24	and one-half (1.5) librarians or media specialists for every five hundred
25	(500) students in average daily membership rounded down to one-tenth (0.1) of
26	a full-time equivalency; and
27	(c) Each middle or high school will be
28	guaranteed funding for at least one-half (0.5) librarian or media specialist,
29	notwithstanding the calculations under this subdivision $(a)(1)(G)$.
30	<u>(ii) Each librarian or media specialist shall carry</u>
31	a resource price of forty-seven thousand two hundred fifty dollars (\$47,250),
32	or pro-ration thereof rounded down to the nearest to one-tenth (0.1) of a
33	full-time equivalency; and
34	(H) Substitutes. For every classroom or specialist
35	teacher allocated under this section, each school district shall be
36	apportioned funding for ten (10) days for substitutes, which shall carry a

1	resource price of one hundred twenty-one dollars (\$121) per day and;
2	(I) Pupil Support Staff for Struggling Students.
3	(i) For every school, a school district shall be
4	apportioned funding for one (1) struggling student support staff person for
5	every one hundred (100) struggling students rounded down to one-tenth (0.1)
6	<u>of a full-time equivalency.</u>
7	(ii) Each eligible school will be guaranteed funding
8	for at least one (1) pupil support staff for struggling students,
9	notwithstanding the calculations under subdivision (a)(l)(D)(i) of this
10	section.
11	(iii) Struggling student support staff person shall
12	carry a resource price of forty-eight thousand seven hundred fifty dollars
13	(\$48,750), or pro-ration thereof rounded down to the nearest to one-tenth
14	(0.1) of a full-time equivalency; and
15	(2) Per-pupil Resources:
16	(A) Instructional Materials.
17	(i) For every school, a school district shall be
18	apportioned funding for instructional materials in the amount of two hundred
19	fifty dollars ($\$250$) for each student of average daily membership in that
20	school.
21	(ii) The amount provided for instructional materials
22	under this subdivision (2)(A) includes expenditures for classroom supplies
23	<u>under § 6-21-303;</u>
24	(B) Extra Duty Funds. For every school, a school district
25	shall be apportioned funding for extra duty as follows:
26	(i) If the school type is middle school, then sixty
27	dollars (\$60.00) for each student of average daily membership in that school;
28	and
29	(ii) If the school type is high school, then one
30	hundred twenty dollars (\$120) for each student in average daily membership in
31	that school; and
32	(C) Supervisory Aides. For every school, a school
33	district shall be apportioned funding for supervisory aides in the amount of
34	thirty-five dollars (\$35.00) for each student of average daily membership in
35	that school; and
36	(D) Gifted and talented program. A school district shall

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1	be apportioned an amount equal to eight hundred ten dollars (\$810) times five
2	percent (5%) of the school district's average daily membership. The funds
3	shall be expended in accordance with rules promulgated by the State Board of
4	<u>Education;</u>
5	(3) Noninstructional and Support Components. For every school,
6	a school district shall be apportioned one thousand one hundred fifty-two
7	dollars (\$1,152) for each student of average daily membership in that school;
8	and
9	(4) Technology.
10	(A) For every school, a school district shall be
11	apportioned funding for technology in the amount of two hundred fifty dollars
12	(\$250) for each student of average daily membership in that school.
13	(B) To the extent that a school district receives funds
14	from sources other than funding under this subdivision (a)(4)(A) of this
15	section and the funds are used for expenditures for technology, the school
16	district may use an equal amount of funds received pursuant to this section
17	for expenditures for technology-related expenditures for personnel,
18	instructional material, internet course delivery, and distance learning
19	courses.
20	(C) In order to provide flexibility within the school
21	district and the schools in the school district, funds for technology under
22	this subdivision (a)(4)(A) of this section may be expended for other
23	categories in this section or § 6-20-2005, if the schools in the school
24	district meet standards for technology established by the state board.
25	(5) Professional Development. For every school, a school
26	district shall be apportioned funding for professional development in the
27	amount of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for each student of average daily membership
28	<u>in that school.</u>
29	(b)(1) In order to provide flexibility within the school district and
30	the schools in the school district, funds received pursuant to this section,
31	other than funds for technology, may be expended for any category in this
32	<u>section or § 6-20-2005.</u>
33	(2) Funds received under this section may be retained for future
34	<u>school years.</u>
35	
36	6-20-2005. Needs-based funding amount.

1	(a) Each school district shall be guaranteed a needs-based funding
2	amount based upon the allocation of resources generated under this section as
3	follows:
4	(1) Needs-Based Personnel Resources:
5	(A) Teachers for Struggling Students. For every school, a
6	school district shall be apportioned funding for one (1) teacher for
7	struggling students for every one hundred (100) struggling students rounded
8	down to one-tenth (0.1) of a full-time equivalency, with the exception that
9	each school will be guaranteed funding for at least one (1) teacher for
10	struggling students, which shall carry a resource price of forty-six thousand
11	two hundred fifty dollars (\$46,250) for each teacher for struggling students,
12	or pro-ration thereof rounded down to the nearest to one-tenth (0.1) of a
13	full-time equivalency;
14	(B) Teachers for English Language Learning Students. For
15	every school, a school district shall be apportioned funding for four-tenths
16	(0.4) teacher for English language learning students for every one hundred
17	(100) English language learning students rounded down to one-tenth (0.1) of a
18	full-time equivalency, which shall carry a resource price of forty-six
19	thousand two hundred fifty dollars (\$46,250) for each teacher for English
20	language learning students, or pro-ration thereof rounded down to the nearest
21	to one-tenth (0.1) of a full-time equivalency;
22	(C) Teachers for Alternative Learning Environments. For
23	every school, a school district shall be apportioned funding for one (1)
24	teacher for alternative learning environments for every twenty (20) students
25	in alternative learning environments rounded down to one-tenth (0.1) of a
26	full-time equivalency, which shall carry a resource price of forty-six
27	thousand two hundred fifty dollars (\$46,250) for each teacher for alternative
28	learning environments, or pro-ration thereof rounded down to the nearest to
29	one-tenth (0.1) of a full-time equivalency; and
30	(D) Pupil Support Staff for Struggling Students.
31	(i) For every school, a school district shall be
32	apportioned funding for one (1) struggling student support staff person for
33	every one hundred (100) struggling students rounded down to one-tenth (0.1)
34	of a full-time equivalency.
35	(ii) Each eligible school will be guaranteed funding
36	for at least one (1) pupil support staff for struggling students,

1	notwithstanding the calculations under subdivision (a)(l)(D)(i) of this
2	section.
3	(iii) Struggling student support staff person shall
4	carry a resource price of forty-six thousand two hundred fifty dollars
5	(\$46,250), or pro-ration thereof rounded down to the nearest to one-tenth
6	(0.1) of a full-time equivalency; and
7	(2) Professional Development. For every school, a school
8	district shall be apportioned funding for professional development in the
9	amount of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for each student of average daily membership
10	in that school.
11	(b)(l)(A) Funds received pursuant to this section may be used
12	for any category included in this section.
13	(B) To the extent that a school district receives funds
14	from sources other than funding under this section and the funds are used for
15	expenditures under a funding category in this section, the school district
16	may use an equal amount of funds received pursuant to this section for
17	expenditures for any category included in this section.
18	(2) Funds received under this section may be retained for future
19	<u>school years.</u>
20	
21	6-20-2006. Catastrophic special education and funding for isolated
22	<u>school districts.</u>
23	Funding for catastrophic special education and for isolated school
24	districts shall be allocated and funded to school districts pursuant to law
25	and rules governing the funding and from available funds in a line item
26	appropriation within the Public School Fund.
27	
28	6-20-2007. Distribution adjustment for uniform rate of tax.
29	State funds to school districts under §§ 6-20-2004 and 6-20-2005 will
30	be an amount equal to the difference between:
31	(1) The total funding under §§ 6-20-2004 and 6-20-2005 for the
32	school district; and
33	(2) The sum of ninety-eight percent (98%) of uniform rate of
34	tax, established by Amendment 74, times the property assessment of the school
35	district plus seventy-five percent (75%) of the miscellaneous revenues of the
36	school district.

1	
2	6-20-2008. Adjustment of funding for schools with increases in
3	students.
4	(a) If a school district's enrollment increases based on subsection
5	(b) of this section, state funding provided under this subchapter shall be
6	recalculated and additional funds distributed to the school district.
7	(b) A school district's enrollment increases if the school district's
8	second quarter average of the average daily membership of the current school
9	year exceeds the school district's average daily membership for the previous
10	school year.
11	(c) No school district shall lose state funding because of any
12	adjustments under this section.
13	
14	6-20-2009. Calculation of payments and schedule of payments.
15	(a) The Department of Education shall calculate the amount of funds
16	authorized by this subchapter on at least three (3) occasions during the year
17	<u>as follows:</u>
18	(1) The first of these shall be done at the beginning of the
19	year.
20	(2) A second calculation shall occur at some point during the
21	year, making corrections for clerical errors and student growth.
22	(3) The third of these calculations shall be done at the end of
23	the year and shall settle all funding amounts due to school districts under
24	this subchapter.
25	(b) On or before July 1 of every year, the department shall set a
26	schedule of payments of funds authorized under this subchapter to school
27	districts.

30	6-20-2011. Miscellaneous provisions.
31	(a) All general provisions, terms, phrases, and expressions used in
32	this subchapter or any related provisions of the Arkansas Code shall be
33	liberally construed to effectuate their purpose.
34	(b) The State Board of Education shall have the authority, acting
35	pursuant to its rule-making powers, to adopt regulations for the
36	implementation of the provisions of this subchapter in compliance with the

1	legislative findings and intent found in § 6-20-2002.
2	(c) If the Department of Education determines that an overpayment has
3	been made to a school district in any funding category authorized by this
4	subchapter, the department is authorized to withhold the overpayment from
5	future funding of the school district and is authorized to transfer the
6	amount withheld for the overpayment to the line item appropriation from which
7	the overpayment was initially made.
8	(d) Each school district shall prepare an annual statement of the
9	financial conditions and transactions of the school district as of June 30 of
10	each year in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

14	(1) Expenditures for any fiscal year shall not exceed the legal

29	(5)(A) All pupil attendance records shall be kept in their

32	law and regulations, on paper or electronic forms either furnished or

34	(C) Original pupil attendance records shall be kept on
35	file in the office of the superintendent of schools after the school term is

13	School districts shall expend state and local funds on students in
14	gifted and talented programs in accordance with existing state law and rules
15	promulgated by the Department of Education.

19	district in the manner and on the forms as may be specified by rules of the
20	state board and the School Audit Section of the Division of Legislative
21	Audit. An annual record shall be filed by August 15 of each year with the

23	(2) If the auditors of the financial accountability office of
24	the department or the School Audit Section of the Division of Legislative
25	Audit determine that the financial records of any school district are not

14	6-20-2203 Uniform budget and accounting system required.
15	(a) The State Board of Education shall adopt by rule a uniform budget
16	and accounting system consistent with the Handbook IIR2 or future revisions
17	as published by the U.S. Department of Education, Office of Educational
18	Research and Improvements, for school districts, education service
19	cooperatives, and open enrollment charter schools. The rules shall be

18	submit a report to the State Board of Education, the Governor, and the Senate
19	and House Interim Committees on Education concerning public school and public
20	school district expenditures as described in the Education Funding Reform Act
21	<u>of 2003, § 6-20-2001 et seq.</u>
22	(f) All rules, regulations, and revisions adopted under this
23	subchapter shall be adopted and published prior to the start of any fiscal
24	year for which they are applicable and shall allow for an implementation
25	schedule consistent with the method outlined in § 6-20-2206.
26	
27	6-20-2204. Required training.
28	(a)(l) Any person whose job responsibility includes preparing the
29	budget or recording expenditures of a school or school district shall obtain
30	training and instruction necessary to demonstrate basic proficiency, as
31	determined by the Department of Education, in, including, but not limited to:
32	(A) School laws of Arkansas;
33	(B) Laws and rules governing the expenditure of public
34	education funds, fiscal accountability, and school finance;
35	(C) Ethics; and
36	(D) Financial accounting and reporting of local education

1	agency expenditures.
2	(2) Each year thereafter, any person whose job responsibility

22	6-20-2206. Rule-making authority.
23	(a)(1) Before the 2004-2005 school year, the State Board of Education
24	shall promulgate rules governing and providing compliance with an established
25	uniform chart of accounts for budgeting of school and school district
26	revenues and expenditures and financial reporting in order for school
27	districts to comply with § 6-22-2202.
28	(2) These rules shall be applied to all school districts on a

28	(6) Promotes a sense of ownership for student results and a
29	commitment to perform in a manner that promotes student achievement;
30	(7) Promotes professional collegial cooperation;
31	(8) Causes teachers to have a keen understanding of what is
32	expected of them and the priorities of the state; and
33	(9) Will be affordable, somewhat predictable, and in keeping
34	with the state's educational and fiscal objectives.

36	<u>6-17-2403. Definitions.</u>

34	6-17-2407. Future adjustments of the compensation system.
35	Each biennium, the House Interim Committee on Education and the Senate
36	Interim Committee on Education shall analyze the compensation levels provided

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1	in this subchapter, review relevant data, and make recommendations to the
2	General Assembly for any adjustments to the compensation levels as needed to

22	(3) Funding for an open-enrollment charter school shall be paid in

24	(b) Except for state transportation aid funds, an open-enrollment
25	charter school may receive other state and federal aids, grants, and revenue
26	as may be provided by law.
27	(c) Open-enrollment charter schools may receive gifts and grants from
28	private sources in whatever manner is available to public school districts.

30	SECTION 5. Arkansas Code § 6-15-2101, as added by Section 9 of Act 35

32	6-15-2101. Best financial management practices for school districts—
33	Standards — Reviews — Designation of school districts.
34	(a) The purpose of best financial management practices reviews are to
35	improve Arkansas school district management's use of resources and to

11	practices adopted by the state board and reviewed by the Legislative Council.
12	Revised best financial management practices adopted by the state board shall
13	be used in the next scheduled school district reviews conducted according to
14	this section. The best financial management practices, at a minimum, shall
15	be designed to instill public confidence by addressing the school district's
16	use of resources, identifying ways that the district could save funds, and
17	improving districts' performance accountability systems, including public
18	accountability. To achieve these objectives, best practices shall be
19	developed for, but need not be limited to, the following areas:
20	(1) Management structures;
21	(2) Performance accountability;
22	(3) Efficient delivery of educational services, including
23	instructional materials;
24	(4) Administrative and instructional technology;
25	(5) Personnel systems and benefits management;
26	(6) Facilities construction;
27	(7) Facilities maintenance;
28	(8) Student transportation;
29	(9) Food service operations;
30	(10) Cost control systems, including asset management, risk
31	management, financial management, purchasing, internal auditing, and
32	financial auditing;
33	(11) Athletics; and
34	(12) Other extra-curricular activities.
35	(c) The department shall conduct the reviews or contract with a
36	private firm selected through a formal request for proposal process to

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1	perform the review. At least one (1) member of the private firm review team
2	shall have expertise in school district finance. The scope of the review
3	shall focus on the best practices adopted by the state board pursuant to
4	subsection (b) of this section.
5	(d) The state board shall consult with the department throughout the
6	best practices review process to ensure that the technical expertise of the
7	department benefits the review process and supports the school districts
8	before, during, and after the review.
9	(c)(l) Each school district shall be subject to a best financial
10	management practices review. The General Assembly also intends that all
11	school districts shall be reviewed biennially by on-site visits and shall be
12	given one of the following designations;
13	(A) "A", schools comprehensively complying with best
14	financial practices;
15	(B) "B", schools complying with best financial practices
16	at significant levels;
17	(C) "C", schools adequately complying with best financial
18	practices;
19	(D) "D", schools less than adequately complying with best
20	financial practices; or
21	(E) "F", schools failing to comply with best financial
22	practices.
23	(2) The department shall prepare annual reports of the results
24	of the best financial management practices reviews and shall post to its
25	website the school and the district financial grades. The report, which
26	shall be part of the overall school and district report card requirement
27	pursuant to \$ 6-15-1806, shall include both revenue sources and
28	expenditures. The reporting of expenditures shall include breakdowns of
29	administrative, instructional, support, and operations expenditures, as well
30	as any other financial commitments of the school and district.

Funds may be used for the cost of reviews by the division and 3 private consultants contracted by the state board. Costs may include 4 professional services, travel expenses of the department and of the staff of 5 the division, and any other necessary expenses incurred as part of a best 6 financial management practices review and as preapproved by the department. 7 (i) Districts shall complete a self-assessment instrument provided by 8 the department that indicates the school district's evaluation of its 9 performance on each best practice. The district shall begin the self-10 assessment no later than sixty (60) days prior to the commencement of the 11 review. The completed self-assessment instrument and supporting 12 documentation shall be submitted to the department no later than the date of 13 commencement of the review as notified by the department. The best practices 14 review team will use this self-assessment information during their review of 15 the district. 16 (i) During the review, the department or the consultant conducting the 17 review, if any, shall hold at least one (1) advertised public forum as part of the review in order to explain the best financial management practices 18 19 review process and obtain input from students, parents or guardians, the 20 business community, and other district residents regarding their concerns 21 about the operations and management of the school district. 22 (k) District reviews conducted under this section shall be completed 23 within six (6) months after commencement. The department shall issue a final 24 report to the Legislative Council regarding the district's use of best 25 financial management practices and cost savings recommendations within sixty 26 (60) days after completing the reviews. Copies of the final report shall be 27 provided to the Governor, the state board, the district superintendent, and the districts' school board members. The district superintendent shall 28 29 notify the press that the final report has been delivered. The notification 30 shall state the department's website address at which an electronic copy of 31 the report is available. 32 (1)(1) If the district is found not to conform to best financial 33 management practices, the report shall contain an action plan, taking public 34 input into consideration, detailing how the district could meet the best 35 practices within two (2) years. The district school board shall develop and approve the implementation schedule within sixty (60) days after receipt of 36

1	the final report. If a district fails to vote on the action plan within
2	sixty (60) days, the district superintendent and school board members shall
3	be required to appear and present testimony before the state board and the

5	(2) Within sixty (60) days after the receipt of the final
6	report, the district school board shall notify the state board and the
7	department in writing of the implementation schedule for the action plan.
8	The department shall contact the school district, assess the situation, and
9	offer technical assistance, if needed.
10	(m) After a district school board votes to implement the action plan:
11	(1) No later than six (6) months after receipt of the final best
12	financial practices report, the district school board shall submit an initial
13	status report to the Governor, the state board, the division, the department
14	and the Legislative Council on progress made toward implementing the action
15	plan and whether changes have occurred in other areas of operation that would
16	affect compliance with the best practices; and
17	(2)(A) A second status report shall be submitted by the school
18	district to the Governor, the state board, the division, the department, and
19	the Legislative Council no later than six (6) months after submission of the
20	initial report, and every six (6) months thereafter, until status reports are
21	not required.
22	(B) Status reports are not required once the state board
23	concludes that the district is using best financial management practices and

25	(n) School districts that are determined in their review to be using
26	the best practices and are graded a category "A" pursuant to subsection (e)
27	of this section, shall receive a "Seal of Best Financial Management". The

33	practices review shall maintain records that will enable independent

15	6-20-302. Legislative findings.
16	(a) The General Assembly recognizes that intelligence and virtue are

18	that the Arkansas Constitution, Article 14, § 1 requires the state to ever

20	to adopt all suitable means to secure to the people the advantages and

35	(2) Assure that each school-age child resides in a school
36	district that offers a competitive minimum salary for classroom teachers;

1	(3) Assure that there is incentive and opportunity for patrons
2	of each school district to provide a greater degree of financial support for
3	students of the district than may be provided in other districts;
4	(4) Assure that:
5	(A) All students graduating from high school are able to
6	demonstrate a defined minimum level of competence in:
7	(i) English communications, oral, reading, and
8	writing;
9	(ii) Mathematics skills; and
10	(iii) Science and social studies disciplines; and
11	(B) Such minimum level of competence evolves over time to
12	higher-levels;
13	(5) Assure that students with disabilities have the opportunity
14	to graduate from high school by demonstrating alternative competencies or
15	alternative levels of competency;
16	(6) Assure that students who are not on track for high school
17	graduation are identified at a sufficiently early date that they may be
18	provided an opportunity at a reasonable cost to achieve the minimum levels of
19	competence necessary to graduate from high school;
20	(7) Recognize that graduating from high school requires that the
21	student, as well as the parent, parents, or guardian of the student, work
22	hard and assume appropriate responsibility for the student's success or
23	failure;
24	(8) Encourage parental involvement in the public schools and
25	public school activities;
26	(9) Recognize that public schools must provide a safe,
27	disciplined, and drug-free environment for students and teachers;
28	(10) Avoid disproportionate variances among school districts in
29	the financial support burden imposed on taxpayers;
30	(11) Avoid unnecessary duplication of administrative and
31	operational expenses;
32	(12) Avoid disproportionate variances among school districts in
33	the use of classroom teachers and capital resources; and
34	(13) Recognize that early attention to and correction of student
35	deficiencies are substantially less expensive and more effective than
36	remedial efforts in the later school grades.

1	(d)(l) The General Assembly acknowledges that the Arkansas
2	Constitution requires the state to provide a general, suitable, and efficient
3	system of free public schools.
4	(2) Such obligation has been held by the Arkansas courts to be a
5	paramount duty of the state.
6	(e) The General Assembly recognizes that the supervision of public
7	schools and the execution of the laws regulating the schools shall be vested

9	(f) The state has a limited pool of resources to provide a general,
10	suitable, and efficient system of free public schools.
11	(g) The state recognizes the importance of local decision-making in

14	6-20-303. Definitions.

35	students who may be counted for average daily membership are:
36	(A) Students who reside within the boundaries of the

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1	school district and who are enrolled in a public school operated by the
2	district or a private school for special education students, with their
3	attendance resulting from a written tuition agreement approved by the

6	district but attending a public school in the district; and

8	school district and who are enrolled in the Arkansas National Guard Youth
9	Challenge Program, so long as the students are participants in the program;
10	(5) "Base local revenue per student" means:
11	(Λ) If Category 1 is fully funded, the local revenue per
12	student in the local school district with the highest amount of local revenue
13	per student; or
14	(B) If Category 1 is not fully funded, the revenue per
15	student to which the state equalizes, which is calculated by:
16	(i) Taking the sum of:
17	(a) The total available state aid for state
18	equalization funding per student;
19	(b) Ninety-eight percent (98%) of the uniform
20	rate of tax times the total state-assessed valuation; and
21	(c) Seventy-five percent (75%) of the average
22	miscellaneous funds collected in the previous five (5) years or previous

27	of three (3) years, and these records shall be available for monitoring
28	purposes during any day of the school term by the teachers or other persons
29	designated to keep attendance.

31	6-20-320. Computation of classroom teacher salaries.
32	Local school districts may not include the cost of substitute teachers,
33	extended contracts for extracurricular activities, or supplementary pay for
34	extracurricular activities in meeting the expenditures requirement for
35	student classroom teacher salaries.

6-20-323. Special needs students.

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2	(a) The Department of Education shall provide special assistance for
3	students with special needs to local school districts from available revenues
4	from line item appropriations in the Public School Fund.
5	(b) Funding for students with limited English proficiency shall be
6	based upon actual students who have been identified based on the use of an
7	English proficiency assessment instrument. These funds shall be distributed

16	(d)(1) Funding for students with low socioeconomic status shall be
17	based on students in kindergarten through grade one (K-1) living in areas
18	with high concentrations of low income families or from low income families
19	as indicated by eligibility for the free or reduced price lunch program under
20	the National School Lunch Act or any other act of Congress. These funds shall
21	be used only for early intervention strategies sanctioned by the department
22	in reading and writing literacy or mathematics for students in pre-
23	kindergarten through grade one (preK-1).
24	(2) Funding for students with low socioeconomic status shall
25	only be funded through June 30, 2005.
26	(e) Funding for students in alternative learning environments shall be
27	distributed either through grants, competitive or otherwise, or pro rata
28	based upon the number of full-time-equivalent students participating in a
29	nontraditional or flexible instructional program designed to improve student
30	achievement in the core academic subjects which the students could not
31	achieve in a regular classroom environment.
32	(f) The State Board of Education shall promulgate rules and
33	regulations for the disbursement of available funds for special needs
34	students explicated in this section.
35	
36	6-20-324. Incentive revenues to encourage local millage.

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1	After the calculation and provision of additional base funding, the
2	Department of Education shall provide incentive funding to local school
3	districts below the district at the ninety-fifth percentile in order to
4	reward local school districts for levying additional mills available for
5	maintenance and operations and in order to remove the potential disincentive
6	for a local school district to reduce its additional mills available for
7	maintenance and operations in order to receive additional base funding or in
8	order to receive an increase in additional base funding.
9	
10	6-20-325. State equalization funding for natural disaster areas.
11	(a) When any county in the State of Arkansas is declared a disaster
12	area by the Federal Emergency Management Administration, the school districts
13	that experienced loss of students due to the disaster and that are located
14	within that county shall receive funding.
15	(b)(1) The school district shall be responsible for requesting these
16	funds and for providing documentation required by the Department of
17	Education.
18	(2) The school district is required to document the loss in
19	enrollment specifically due to the disaster.

27	(d) A school district may not receive funds both for a loss in
28	students due to a natural disaster and for a loss in revenues due to a loss
29	in students.
30	(e) These funds shall be distributed in accordance with rules and
31	regulations promulgated by the department.
32	
33	6-20-326. Districts losing revenues.
34	(a) The Department of Education shall provide funding to local school
35	districts from available funds to aid local school districts which have
36	suffered a significant loss of revenues. The loss of revenues considered

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1	under this section shall have occurred in a one-year period. Funding under
2	this section shall only be for one (1) year and shall be considered
3	nonrestricted revenues included in the calculation of total state and local
4	funding per average daily membership.
5	(b) Under no circumstances may a school district receive both student
6	growth funding and loss funding authorized by this section. If a school
7	district qualifies for both student growth funding and loss funding, then the
8	school district shall receive the greater of the two (2) amounts.
9	(c) The State Board of Education shall promulgate rules and
10	regulations for the disbursement of available funds for local school
11	districts' lost revenues.

13	6-20-327. Calculation and disbursement of funds authorized.
14	(a) The Department of Education shall calculate the amount of funds
15	authorized by this subchapter on three (3) occasions during the year. The
16	first of these shall be done at the beginning of the year. A second
17	calculation shall occur at some point during the year, making corrections for
18	clerical errors and student growth. The third of these calculations shall be

17	(B) A guidance counselor; or
18	(C) A librarian.
19	(o) All minimum salaries set forth in this section shall be for a
20	contract number of days that is not more than the number of days in the
21	school year required by the State Board of Education's regulations for
22	accreditation for the school year in which the contract is effective.
23	(p)(l) A district that determines that it cannot meet the minimum
24	salary requirements of this section from funds available may petition the
25	Department of Education for a waiver of the requirements of this section for
26	up to three (3) school years based on regulations promulgated by the State
27	Board of Education.
28	(2) The department shall not grant a waiver to any district that
29	is not in compliance with the uniform rate of tax requirements under Arkansas
30	Constitution, Amendment 74.
31	
32	6-17-1002. Salary amount - Annual review.
33	(a) The salaries fixed herein shall be regarded as minimum salaries
34	only, and each district may supplement such salaries. No teacher shall
35	receive a reduced salary as a result of this subchapter's requirements.
36	(b) Base salary shall not be raised until all teachers within a

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1	district are paid equal to or greater than the minimum requirements
2	established herein. Each school district shall develop its own salary
3	schedule with salaries equal to or greater than the required minimums set
4	forth herein.
5	(c) The Arkansas Teachers' Salaries Study Commission shall annually
6	review the minimum base salary and make recommendations to the Department of
7	Education, the Governor, and the General Assembly for such modifications as
8	the commission shall deem appropriate.
9	
10	6-17-1003. Enforcement - Appeal - Rules and regulations.
11	(a) The State Board of Education is empowered to enforce the
12	provisions of this subchapter and is specifically authorized to order the
13	dissolution and merger of any school district which fails to comply with the
14	minimum salary requirements established by this subchapter. Any appeal from a
15	decision of the board ordering the dissolution and merger of a school
16	district for failure to comply with the provisions of this subchapter shall
17	be filed in the Circuit Court of Pulaski County and must be filed within
18	thirty (30) days of the decision of the board.
19	(b) The board shall issue rules and regulations to implement this
20	subchapter.
21	
22	6-17-1004. Salary goals.
23	(a) The personnel policies committees and negotiating teams
24	established and maintained in Arkansas public schools are encouraged to set
25	and meet five-year goals to substantially increase teacher salaries. In
26	setting realistic yet meaningful salary goals, the committees and teams shall
27	consider exceeding the state, regional Southern Regional Education Board
28	states, border states, or national average salaries for teachers.
29	(b) Within two (2), four (4), and five (5) years following the
30	adoption of this section, school districts shall report to the Arkansas
31	Teachers' Salaries Study Commission and the Department of Education the goals
	developed, adopted, and met.

1	This subchapter, § 6-5-307(a), and § 6-20-412 shall be known as "The
2	Educator Compensation Act of 2001".
3	
4	6-17-2102, Legislative findings and intent.
5	(a) The General Assembly determines that:
6	(1) Salaries of Arkansas educators have traditionally lagged
7	behind the salaries of educators in the nation and in the states that
8	surround Arkansas;
9	(2) Even though educators have achieved annual increases of
10	approximately three and two tenths percent (3.2%) in recent years, Arkansas
11	is still far behind its neighboring states;
12	(3)(A) Nationally and within Arkansas, there has developed a
13	shortage of qualified educators in certain fields of teaching.
14	(B) One of the reasons for this shortage is that Arkansas
15	educators lag behind other professionals in salary amount;
16	(4) The most important part of a student's educational
17	experience is the people who actually educate them; and
18	(5) It is necessary to attract qualified educators to the public
19	education system in order to increase the achievement of all Arkansas public
20	school students.
21	(b) It is the intent of the General Assembly that:
22	(1) This subchapter shall not supplant, but shall supplement,
23	traditional pay increases that have occurred at the local level in recent
24	years;
25	(2) School districts should not stop or alter any intentions to
26	give educators a salary increase in the current school year because of the
27	enactment of this subchapter; and
28	(3) This subchapter is the first of many steps that must be and
29	shall be taken by the General Assembly to increase the quality of the working
30	force in education over the upcoming years.
31	
32	6-17-2103. Definitions.
33	As used in this subchapter, unless the context otherwise requires:
34	(1) "Required salary increase" means:
35	(A) For fiscal year 2002, an amount no less than one
36	thousand dollars (\$1,000), excluding benefits and employer contributions to

1	teacher retirement and social security, over a targeted educator's salary for
2	fiscal year 2001; and
3	(B) For fiscal year 2003 an amount no less than three
4	thousand dollars (\$3,000), excluding benefits and employer contributions to
5	teacher retirement and social security, over a targeted educator's salary for
6	fiscal year 2001;
7	(2) "Targeted educator" means an individual employed by a school
8	district, and:
9	(A) Who must hold a certificate issued by the State Board
10	of Education in order to be employed in the individual's present position;
11	and
12	(B) Whose primary job responsibilities are for the
13	education of public school students in grades prekindergarten through twelve
14	(PK-12) and do not include districtwide administrative duties.
15	
16	6-17-2104. Method for implementation.
17	(a) On or before June 30 of each fiscal year, each local school
18	district shall have implemented the required salary increase or have received
19	a waiver from the Department of Education under § 6-17-2105.
20	(b) A school district shall implement the required salary increase in
21	a variety of methods, including:
22	(1) Increasing the base salaries of the targeted educators by
23	the required salary increase;
24	(2) Paying a supplement to the salaries of the targeted
25	educators at each step and each lane of the salary schedule equal to the
26	required salary increase and making the supplement an addendum to the
27	targeted educator's contract. The supplement, added to the targeted
28	educator's regular salary, shall equal the targeted educator's total salary
29	which shall be a continuing obligation; or
30	(3) A combination of subdivisions (b)(1) and (b)(2) of this
31	section.
32	(c) Any school district utilizing the method stated in subsection
33	(b)(2) of this section shall clearly mark those supplements under the title
34	"Targeted Educator Compensation Act Supplement" in order to make the method
35	easily identifiable. The "Targeted Educator Compensation Act Supplement"
36	shall be incorporated into the salary schedule in the same way as other

1	salary supplements under §§ 6-17-201 - 6-17-208.
2	(d) Notwithstanding the method used under subsection (b) of this
3	section, the required salary increase shall be a continuing salary obligation
4	of the school districts.
5	(c) Targeted educators who work on a part-time basis or individuals
6	who qualify as targeted educators on a part-time basis shall receive a pro
7	rata share of the required salary increase equal to the proportion of time
8	that they are employed.
9	(f)(l) Nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit a school
10	district from implementing the required salary increase for fiscal year 2003
11	by exceeding the required salary increase for fiscal year 2002 and paying the
12	difference between the required salary increase for fiscal year 2003 and the
13	actual amount applied to the required salary increase for fiscal year 2002.
14	(2) The legislative intent of this subchapter is that all
15	targeted educators will receive a required salary increase of three thousand
16	dollars (\$3,000) by fiscal year 2003.
17	(g)(l) Nothing in this subchapter shall be construed to allow the step
18	increases for education and experience, required under § 6-17-1001, as
19	currently established in the individual school district, to be applied to the
20	required salary increase as meeting the requirements under the provisions of
21	this subchapter.
22	(2) Nothing in this subchapter shall be construed as to allow
23	any other method than increases in the base salary to fulfill the existing
24	requirements of § 6-17-1001 pertaining to the minimum salaries of teachers.
25	(3) Nothing in this subchapter shall be construed to prohibit a
26	school district from raising its salaries in excess of the required salary
27	increase.
28	(h) Nothing in this subchapter shall be interpreted to preclude school
29	district employees other than targeted educators from receiving a similar
30	increase in salary.
31	(i) School districts are prohibited from instituting quid pro quo
32	situations in which school districts extend the length of or add additional
33	duties to the targeted educator's contract in return for the required salary
34	increase.
35	(j) The required salary increase for targeted educators who are
36	prekindergarten teachers shall only be required to be implemented if the

1	local school district has sufficient funds available to completely implement
2	the required salary increase for the given fiscal year.
3	
4	6-17-2105. Exemptions.
5	(a) Any local school district engaged in agreed-to collective
6	bargaining with its certified staff shall be exempt from the provisions of
7	this subchapter to the extent that school districts in collective bargaining
8	shall negotiate on salaries and other terms and conditions of employment.
9	This section in no way is to be interpreted as altering or replacing any
10	collective bargaining agreement in place at the time of the enactment of this
11	subchapter.
12	(b)(1) Any local school district may petition the Department of
13	Education for a waiver from the provisions of this subchapter.
14	(2) The waiver shall not be for a time greater than three (3)
15	years.
16	(3) The process for the waiver shall be the same as the process
17	for a local school district to receive a waiver under § 6-17-1001.
18	(4) Any local school district that petitions for and is granted
19	a waiver from this subchapter shall be placed in Phase I of fiscal distress
20	as defined under §§ 6-20-1601 - 6-20-1610.
21	
22	6-17-2106. Regulatory authority and enforcement.
23	(a) The State Board of Education shall have the authority, acting
24	pursuant to its rule-making power, to promulgate appropriate rules and
25	regulations for the implementation of the provisions of this subchapter.
26	(b) The provisions of this subchapter shall be audited on an annual
27	basis.
28	(c) Any school district that has been found to not be in compliance
29	with the provisions of this subchapter shall be placed on Phase I fiscal
30	distress under the provisions of § 6-20-1601 et seq.
31	
32	SECTION 11. Arkansas Code § 6-12-412 is amended to read as follows:
33	6-20-412. Nonrecurring salary payments.
34	(a) Any school district in the state may pay certified personnel a
35	nonrecurring salary payment from revenues not considered to be recurring
36	sources of revenue.

1	(b) A nonrecurring salary payment under this section shall not be
2	construed to increase the base salary of the teacher recipient for purposes
3	of calculation of future salary requirements.
4	(c) Any nonrecurring salary payment under the provisions of this
5	section shall be divided equally among certified personnel employed by the
6	district at the time of payment unless the board of directors of the district
7	and a majority of the teachers agree to a different distribution.
8	(d) A report indicating the source of the moneys and the name and
9	amount paid to each recipient shall be furnished to the Department of
10	Education and the Division of Legislative Audit by the ex officio financial
11	secretary of the school district.
12	(e) Payments to targeted educators made in the form of supplements as
13	addendums to contracts in fulfilling the provisions of this section, § 6-5-
14	307(a), and § 6-17-2101 et seq. shall not be considered a nonrecurring salary
15	payment under this section.
16	
17	SECTION 12. Effective Date.
18	This act shall become effective on July 1, 2004.
