30	(a) The General	Assembly recognizes that:	
31	<u>(1)</u> Intell	igence and virtue are the safegua	rds of liberty and
32	the bulwark of a free a	and good government; and	
33	<u>(2)</u> The Ar	kansas Constitution, Article 14,	§ 1, requires the
34	<u>state to ever maintain</u>	a general, suitable, and efficien	<u>t system of free</u>
35	public schools and to a	adopt all suitable means to secure	to the people the
36	advantages and opportur	<u>ities of education.</u>	



1	(b) The General Assembly finds that because of the decision of the
2	Arkansas Supreme Court in November 2002 in the case of Lake View v. Huckabee,
3	et al., it is the absolute duty of the State of Arkansas to provide all
4	public school children with an opportunity for an adequate education.
5	(c) The General Assembly finds that a suitable and efficient system of
6	public education should:
7	(1) Assure the availability of substantially equal and
8	constitutionally appropriate expenditures by the state for the education of
9	each similarly situated child in the public schools, regardless of where that
10	child resides within the state;
11	(2) Assure that each school-age child resides in a school
12	district that offers a competitive minimum salary for classroom teachers;
13	(3) Assure:
14	(A) That all students graduating from high school are able
15	to demonstrate a defined adequate level of competence in:
16	(i) English, oral communications, reading, and
17	writing;
18	(ii) Mathematics skills; and
19	(iii) Science and social studies disciplines; and
20	(B) That an adequate level of competence evolves over time
21	to higher levels;
22	(4) Assure that students with disabilities have the opportunity
23	to graduate from high school by demonstrating alternative competencies or
24	alternative levels of competency;
25	(5) Assure that students who are not on track for high school
26	graduation are identified at a sufficiently early date so that they may be
27	provided an opportunity at a reasonable cost to achieve the minimum levels of
28	competence necessary to graduate from high school;
29	(6) Recognize that graduating from high school requires that the
30	student, as well as the parents or guardian of the student, work hard and
31	assume appropriate responsibility for the student's success or failure;
32	(7) Encourage parental involvement in the public schools and in
33	public school activities; and
34	(8) Recognize that early attention to and correction of student
35	deficiencies are substantially less expensive and more effective than
36	remedial efforts in the later school grades.

1 (d) The General Assembly recognizes that the supervision of public 2 schools and the execution of the laws regulating the schools shall be vested 3 in such officers as the General Assembly provides. 4 (e) It is the intent of this subchapter to provide a system of school 5 funding that provides to each public school child in the State of Arkansas an 6 opportunity for an adequate education. 7 8 6-20-2003. Definitions. 9 As used in this subchapter: 10 (1) "Additional education categories" means state funds 11 distributed to school districts for alternative learning environments, 12 English language learners, national school lunch students, professional 13 development and technology; 14 (2) "Alternative learning environment" means a student 15 intervention program in compliance with §§ 6-18-508 and 6-18-509 that seeks 16 to eliminate traditional barriers to learning for students and includes a component for the education of gifted and talented students; 17 (3)(A) "Average daily membership" means the total number of days 18 19 of school attended plus the total number of days absent by students in grades 20 kindergarten through twelve (K-12) during the first three (3) quarters of each school year divided by the number of school days actually taught in the 21 22 school district during that period of time rounded up to the nearest 23 hundredth. 24 (B) In those instances in which the average daily 25 membership for less than three (3) quarters is specified, the number of days 26 used in the calculation shall be the days in the specified period of time. 27 (C) As applied to this subchapter, students who may be 28 counted for average daily membership are: 29 (i) Students who reside within the boundaries of the 30 school district and who are enrolled in a public school operated by the school district or a private school for special education students, with 31 32 their attendance resulting from a written tuition agreement approved by the 33 Department of Education; 34 (ii) Legally transferred students living outside the 35 school district but attending a public school in the school district; and 36 (iii) Students who are eligible to attend and reside

35	recent tax ordinance approved by the county quorum court under the authority

1	(12) "Miscellaneous funds" means those average funds collected
2	in the previous five (5) school years or previous school year, whichever is
3	less, from funds received by a school district from federal forest reserves,
4	federal grazing rights, federal mineral rights, federal impact aid, federal
5	flood control, wildlife refuge funds, severance taxes, funds received by the
6	school district in lieu of taxes, and local sales and use taxes dedicated to
7	education pursuant to §§ 26-74-201 et seq., 26-74-301 et seq., 26-75-301 et
8	seq., and 14-164-301 et seq.;
9	(13) "National school lunch students" means those students from
10	low socio-economic backgrounds as indicated by eligibility for free or
11	reduced-priced meals under the National School Lunch Act as calculated on
12	October 1 of each year and submitted to the department in the Arkansas Public
13	School Computer Network Cycle 2 report;
14	(14) "Previous year" means the school year immediately preceding
15	the school year in which funds are allocated;
16	(15)(A) "Professional development" means a coordinated set of
17	planned learning activities for teachers and administrators that are
18	standards-based.

21	6-20-2004. Miscellaneous.
22	The State Board of Education shall have authority, acting pursuant to
23	its rule-making powers, to adopt regulations for the implementation of the
24	provisions of this subchapter.
25	
26	6-20-2005. School funding.
27	(a)(l) For each school year, a school district shall receive state
28	foundation funding aid computed as the difference between the foundation
29	funding amount pursuant to subdivision (a)(2) of this section and the sum of
30	ninety-eight percent (98%) of the uniform rate of tax times the property
31	assessment of the school district plus seventy-five percent (75%) of
32	miscellaneous funds of the school district.
33	(2) For the 2004-2005 school year, the foundation funding amount
34	is equal to five thousand dollars (\$5,000) times the average daily
35	membership.
36	(b)(l) In addition to state foundation funding aid, each school

1 district shall receive funding for additional education categories as 2 provided in subdivisions (b)(2) through (b)(6) of this section. 3 (2)(A) For the 2004-2005 school year, alternative learning 4 environment funding shall be three thousand one hundred seventy-five dollars 5 (\$3,175) for each identified alternative learning environment student. 6 (B) Funding for students in alternative learning 7 environments shall be distributed based on rules promulgated by the State 8 Board of Education. 9 (3)(A) For the 2004-2005 school year the English language 10 learners funding shall be four hundred sixty dollars (\$460) for each 11 identified English language learner. 12 (B) Funding for English language learner students shall be 13 distributed to school districts for students who have been identified as not 14 proficient in the English language based upon a state-approved English 15 proficiency assessment instrument. 16 (C) Funds allocated for English language learners to 17 school districts under this subchapter shall be expended only for eligible 18 activities as identified in current rules promulgated by the state board. 19 (4)(A) For the 2004-2005 school year, national school lunch 20 student funding for each identified national school lunch student shall be as 21 follows: 22 (i) For school districts in which eighty percent 23 (80%) or greater of the enrol<u>led students are national school lunch students</u>, 24 funding shall be nine hundred dollars (\$900). 25 (ii) For school districts in which at least sixty 26 percent (60%) but less than eighty percent (80%) of the enrolled students are 27 national school lunch students, funding shall be seven hundred dollars 28 (\$700). 29 (iii) For school districts in which less than sixty 30 percent (60%) of the enrolled students are national school lunch students, 31 funding shall be four hundred twenty-five dollars (\$425). 32 (B) Funding for national school lunch students shall be 33 based on the number of students eligible for free or reduced-price lunch 34 program under the National School Lunch Act identified on the Arkansas public 35 school computer network cycle two report. 36 (5)(A) Professional development funding for the 2004-2005 school

1	year shall be equal to fifty dollars (\$50.00) times the school district's
2	prior school year average daily membership.
3	(B) Funding for professional development for teachers in
4	Arkansas public schools may be used for professional development training
5	conferences, materials, and other professional development activities as
6	outlined in rules promulgated by the state board.
7	(6)(A) Technology support funding for the 2004-2005 school year
8	shall be equal to one hundred seventy-five dollars (\$175) times the school
9	district's prior school year average daily membership.
10	(B) Funding for technology may include, but is not limited
11	to, purchases of hardware, software, technology training, technology
12	infrastructure, electronic learning devices, training materials, technology
13	textbooks, and courses.
14	(C) Unexpended technology funds may be carried forward for
15	up to two (2) school years based on needs identified in the school district's
16	technology plan.
17	(c)(1) General facilities funding, debt service funding, isolated
18	funding under § 6-20-601, student growth funding and special education-
19	catastrophic occurrences funding shall be allocated and funded to school
20	districts from available funds in a line item appropriation within the Public
21	School Fund pursuant to law and rules promulgated by the State Board of
22	Education.
23	(2) A school district shall only use general facilities funding
24	<u>for:</u>
25	(A) The purchase of school buses, furniture, equipment,
26	and computer software;
27	(B) The renovation or repairs of existing facilities; or
28	(C) The repayment of commercial bonds or revolving loans.
29	(d) The sum of subsections (a)(c) of this section shall be the total
30	state aid allocated and funded to school districts.
31	(e) Funds distributed to school districts under subsection (b) of this
32	section shall be expended only for students in those categories under rules
33	promulgated by the state board.
34	
35	<u>6-20-2006. Department of Education to provide funding Adjustments</u>
36	for overpayments.

1 (a) If the Department of Education determines that an overpayment has 2 been made to a school district under any appropriation authorized by this 3 subchapter, the department is authorized to: 4 (1) Withhold the overpayment from subsequent state funding; 5 (2) To transfer the amount withheld for the overpayment to the 6 line item appropriation from which the overpayment was initially made; and 7 (3) To request a refund from the school district in the amount 8 of the overpayment. 9 (b) The school district shall comply as directed by the department. 10 11 6-20-2007. Monitoring of expenditures. 12 (a) The General Assembly determines that although funds may be 13 distributed to school districts under this subchapter, it is the duty and 14 responsibility of the State of Arkansas to monitor such expenditures to 15 ensure that each public school child in Arkansas is provided with an adequate 16 education. 17 (b) Each school district shall ensure that funds distributed by the 18 State of Arkansas to the district are utilized in an efficient manner in 19 order to provide an adequate education. 20 (c) Each school district shall: 21 (1) Expend sums for teacher salaries in order to meet the 22 requirements of Arkansas law; 23 (2)(A) Expend the sums allocated to the school district under 24 each category of additional educational categories solely and exclusively for 25 salaries and other instructional aid components to benefit the students in 26 the categories within the school district. 27 (B) The school district shall further ensure that those 28 sums are used to improve the educational opportunity of those children, with 29 a primary emphasis on improving each student's proficiency; 30 (3) Expend other sums as may be allocated under this subchapter and as may be required by law in order to provide an equal opportunity for an 31 32 adequate education; 33 (4) Ensure that sums appropriated by law and allocated to the 34 school district are used to meet standards for accreditation and to provide 35 the required curriculum for all students in the district; and 36 (5) Ensure that sums allocated for facilities or other capital

1	needs are spent in accordance with law.
2	(d)(1) During the appropriate Arkansas public school computer network
3	reporting cycle each year, each school district shall submit appropriate data
4	to the Department of Education establishing the school district's compliance
5	with this section.
6	(2) The data shall be timely, accurate, and in the format
7	required by rules promulgated by the State Board of Education.
8	(3) The data reported shall reflect the expenditure of each
9	category of additional education categories.
10	(4) Reports for each school district shall be developed by the
11	department and transmitted to the Governor, the Senate Interim Committee on
12	Education, and the House Interim Committee on Education.

14	6-20-2008. Other requirements for state aid.
15	In order for a school district to be entitled to state aid under the
16	provisions of this subchapter, each school district shall:
17	(1) Expend in a school year no more than the legal revenues that
18	are available for the school year to the school district as determined by
19	state law or regulation of the State Board of Education;
20	(2) Maintain records and make reports concerning attendance,
21	receipts, disbursements, and any other reports required by the Department of
22	Education for the administration of this subchapter;
23	(3) Maintain proper financial records in accordance with the
24	department's school accounting manual and regulations promulgated by the
25	state board;
26	(4) Annually file with the state board a salary schedule for the
27	school district's certified employees that recognizes a minimum level of
28	training and experience. The schedule shall reflect the actual pay practices
29	of the school district. Salary increments for experience or education, or
30	both, shall be identified on the schedule; and
31	(5)(A) Maintain all pupil attendance records in their original
32	form, either on paper or in an electronic format furnished or approved by the
33	department and in accordance with law and regulations. The records shall be
34	available for monitoring purposes during any day of the school term by the

36	(B) Original attendance records shall be kept on file in

1	the office of the superintendent of the school district after the school term
2	is ended for a period of three (3) years.

4	6-20-2009. Computation of classroom teacher salaries.
5	School districts may not include the cost of substitute teachers,
6	extended contracts for extracurricular activities, or supplementary pay for
7	extracurricular activities in meeting the expenditure requirements for

10	6-20-2010. Calculation and disbursement of funds authorized.
11	(a) On or before July 1 of every school year, the Department of

33	6-17-2402. Legislative Intent.
34	The intent of this subchapter is for the State of Arkansas to create a
35	teacher compensation system that:
36	(1) Drives improvements in student academic achievement;

1	(2) Attracts and retains the best teachers possible;
2	(3) Provides teachers with meaningful and rewarding
3	opportunities for advancement in the profession based on the acquisition of
4	skills that enhance instructional excellence and student learning, taking on
5	leadership roles, and making exceptional professional contributions;
6	(4) Motivates and provides financial incentives for teacher
7	efforts and performance that leads directly to improved student achievement;
8	(5) Encourages and rewards teachers individually for increasing
9	their knowledge, skills, and competencies, and rewards teachers collectively
10	for improving student performance;
11	(6) Promotes a sense of ownership for student results and a
12	commitment to perform in a manner that promotes student achievement;
13	(7) Promotes professional collegial cooperation;
14	(8) Causes teachers to have a keen understanding of what is
15	expected of them and the priorities of the state; and
16	(9) Will be affordable, somewhat predictable, and in keeping
17	with the state's educational and fiscal objectives.
18	
19	<u>6-17-2403. Definitions.</u>

26	(29) "Total state and local revenue per average daily

32	for maintenance and operation times ninety-eight percent (98%) of the

36	(iv) State equalization funding, student classroom

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teacher funding, student unit funding, vocational funding, general facilities 1 2 funding, and student growth funding available to the local school district; 3 and 4 (B) By dividing by the average daily membership of the 5 local school district; and 6 (30) "Uniform rate of tax" means a uniform rate of ad valorem 7 property tax of twenty-five (25) mills to be levied on the assessed value of 8 all taxable real, personal, and utility property in the state to be used 9 solely for the maintenance and operation of the schools. In calculating the uniform rate of tax imposed by Arkansas Constitution, Article 14, § 3, as 10 11 amended by Amendments 11, 40, and 74, the following categories of millage may 12 be utilized to meet the minimum millage requirement: (A) The local school district's maintenance and operation 13 14 millage; 15 (B) The dedicated maintenance and operation millage; 16 (C) Excess debt service millage; and 17 (D) The millage derived from the ratio of the debt service funding supplements divided by the total assessment. 18 19 20 6-20-304. Liberal construction. 21 All general provisions, terms, phrases, and expressions used in this 22 subchapter or any related provisions of this Code shall be liberally 23 construed so as to effectuate its purposes. 24 25 6-20-305. Miscellaneous. 26 The State Board of Education shall have authority, acting pursuant to 27 its rule making powers, to adopt regulations for the implementation of the 28 provisions of this subchapter. 29 30 6-20-306. School funding. 31 (a)(1) Beginning with the 1996-1997 school year, the Department of 32 Education shall provide from available funds the following school funding categories in the priorities listed to local school districts: 33 34 (A) Category 1. State equalization funding per student; 35 (B) Category 2. Student classroom teacher funding; (C) Category 3. Student unit funding; and 36

1	(D) Category 4. Student needs funding.
2	(2) No subsequent category of funding shall receive any funding
3	until each prior category is fully funded.
4	(b)(l) If any category of funding excluding Category 1 is only

16	funding supplement to qualifying local school districts for the purpose of
17	reducing debt service burdens issued before May 30 of each fiscal year and
18	increasing the amount of local revenue available for maintenance and
19	operations expenditures.
20	(2) The legislative intent is to continue providing a debt
21	service funding supplement to qualifying local school districts through
22	available funds in a line item appropriation within the fund.

24	6-20-308. Department of Education to provide funding - Adjustments for
25	overpayments.
26	(a)(1) After determining the amount of state equalization funding,
27	student classroom teacher funding, student unit funding, vocational funding,
28	general facilities funding, and student growth funding available to each
29	local school district, the Department of Education shall provide any
30	additional base funding necessary to ensure that the total state and local
31	revenue per average daily membership of each local school district is no less
32	than the minimum state and local revenue per average daily membership.
33	(2) For the purposes of additional base funding, any questions
34	as to what revenue shall be included will be determined by reference to 34
35	C.F.R. § 222.63 (1994).
36	(b) A school district shall not lose any state funding as a result of

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1 debt service savings produced by refunding outstanding bonds provided that: 2 (1) The yearly savings produced by the refunding is deposited into a refunding savings building fund and is used by the district for the 3 4 building and equipping of school buildings, for major adaptations to a 5 facility, or for purchasing sites therefor; and that 6 (2) Prior to the date that the refunding bonds are sold at 7 public sale, the district submits a certificate to the Director of the 8 Department of Education certifying that the yearly debt service savings will 9 be used for the purposes described in this subsection (b). 10 (c) If the department shall determine that an overpayment has been 11 made to a local school district in any appropriation authorized by this 12 subchapter, the department is authorized to withhold the overpayment from 13 state equalization funding and is authorized to transfer the amount withheld 14 for the overpayment to the line item appropriation from which the overpayment 15 was initially made. 16 17 6-20-309. Local school districts - Restrictions on use of specific 18 funding. 19 (a) Local school districts may expend Category 1 funds for student 20 classroom teacher funding, student unit funding, and student needs funding. 21 (b) A local school district may only use general facilities funding 22 for the purchase of school buses, furniture, equipment, and computer software 23 or for the renovation or repairs of existing facilities. 24 (c) Local school districts may not use student classroom teacher 25 funding to compensate anyone other than classroom teachers. 26 27 6-20-310. Local school districts - Required expenditures. 28 (a) Local school districts shall expend state and local revenues on 29 students evaluated as special education students in accordance with existing 30 federal and state laws and Department of Education regulations. 31 (b) Local school districts shall expend state and local revenues on 32 students in alternative learning environments and in gifted and talented 33 programs in accordance with existing state laws and department regulations. 34 35 6-20-311. Local school districts. (a) Beginning with the 1995-1996 school year, each local school 36

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1 district shall prepare an annual certified audit of the financial condition 2 and transactions of the local school district as of June 30 of each year in 3 accordance with generally accepted accounting practices and containing any 4 other data as determined by the State Board of Education. 5 (b) Nothing in this legislation shall be construed to authorize, 6 permit, or require consolidation of any school district. 7 (c) [Repealed.] 8 9 6-20-319. Other requirements for state aid. In order for a district to be entitled to state aid under the 10 11 provisions of this subchapter, each district shall satisfy the following 12 requirements: 13 (1) Expenditures for any fiscal year shall not exceed the legal 14 revenues for that year; 15 (2) The district shall maintain such records and make such 16 reports relative to attendance, receipts, and disbursements and other reports 17 as required by the Department of Education for the administration of this 18 subchapter; 19 (3) The district shall maintain proper financial records in 20 accordance with the state's school accounting manual and regulations 21 promulgated by the State Board of Education; 22 (4) The district shall file with the board annually a salary 23 schedule for its certified employees which recognizes a minimum level of 24 training and experience. This schedule shall reflect the actual pay practices of the district, including all fringe benefits. Salary increments for 25 26 experience or education, or both, shall be identified on the schedule; 27 (5) All pupil attendance records shall be kept in their original 2.8 form and shall be public records. They shall be kept according to law and 29 regulations, on paper or electronic forms either furnished or approved by the 30 department. Original attendance records shall be kept on file in the office 31 of the superintendent of schools after the school term is ended for a period 32 of three (3) years, and these records shall be available for monitoring 33 purposes during any day of the school term by the teachers or other persons 34 designated to keep attendance. 35

6-20-320. Computation of classroom teacher salaries.

1 Local school districts may not include the cost of substitute teachers, 2 extended contracts for extracurricular activities, or supplementary pay for extracurricular activities in meeting the expenditures requirement for 3 4 student classroom teacher salaries. 5 6 6-20-323. Special needs students. 7 (a) The Department of Education shall provide special assistance for 8 students with special needs to local school districts from available revenues 9 from line item appropriations in the Public School Fund. 10 (b) Funding for students with limited English proficiency shall be 11 based upon actual students who have been identified based on the use of an English proficiency assessment instrument. These funds shall be distributed 12 13 pro rata based upon the number of students identified as limited English 14 proficient. 15 (c) Funding for special education - catastrophic occurrences shall be 16 based upon those individual cases where special education and related 17 services required by the individualized education program of a particular student with disabilities are unduly expensive, extraordinary, or beyond the 18 19 routine and normal costs associated with special education and related 20 services provided by a local school district. 21 (d)(1) Funding for students with low socioeconomic status shall be 22 based on students in kindergarten through grade one (K-1) living in areas 23 with high concentrations of low income families or from low income families 24 as indicated by eligibility for the free or reduced price lunch program under 25 the National School Lunch Act or any other act of Congress. These funds shall 26 be used only for early intervention strategies sanctioned by the department 27 in reading and writing literacy or mathematics for students in pre-2.8 kindergarten through grade one (preK-1). 29 (2) Funding for students with low socioeconomic status shall 30 only be funded through June 30, 2005. 31 (e) Funding for students in alternative learning environments shall be 32 distributed either through grants, competitive or otherwise, or pro rata 33 based upon the number of full-time-equivalent students participating in a 34 nontraditional or flexible instructional program designed to improve student 35 achievement in the core academic subjects which the students could not 36 achieve in a regular classroom environment.

1	(f) The State Board of Education shall promulgate rules and
2	regulations for the disbursement of available funds for special needs
3	students explicated in this section.
4	
5	6-20-324. Incentive revenues to encourage local millage.
6	After the calculation and provision of additional base funding, the
7	Department of Education shall provide incentive funding to local school
8	districts below the district at the ninety-fifth percentile in order to
9	reward local school districts for levying additional mills available for
10	maintenance and operations and in order to remove the potential disincentive
11	for a local school district to reduce its additional mills available for
12	maintenance and operations in order to receive additional base funding or in
13	order to receive an increase in additional base funding.
14	
15	6-20-325. State equalization funding for natural disaster areas.
16	(a) When any county in the State of Arkansas is declared a disaster
17	area by the Federal Emergency Management Administration, the school districts
18	that experienced loss of students due to the disaster and that are located
19	within that county shall receive funding.
20	(b)(1) The school district shall be responsible for requesting these
21	funds and for providing documentation required by the Department of
22	Education.
23	(2) The school district is required to document the loss in
24	enrollment specifically due to the disaster.
25	(c)(l) Funding shall be provided for two (2) years, based on the loss
26	in revenues from the loss in average daily membership in the first year
27	subsequent to the natural disaster as compared to the year in which the
28	natural disaster occurred.
29	(2) Funding shall be calculated each fiscal year, with each
30	qualifying school district receiving either full reimbursement or a pro rata
31	share of the total funds available.
32	(d) A school district may not receive funds both for a loss in
33	students due to a natural disaster and for a loss in revenues due to a loss
34	in students.
35	(e) These funds shall be distributed in accordance with rules and
36	regulations promulgated by the department.

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2	6-20-326. Districts losing revenues.
3	(a) The Department of Education shall provide funding to local school
4	districts from available funds to aid local school districts which have
5	suffered a significant loss of revenues. The loss of revenues considered
6	under this section shall have occurred in a one-year period. Funding under
7	this section shall only be for one (1) year and shall be considered
8	nonrestricted revenues included in the calculation of total state and local
9	funding per average daily membership.
10	(b) Under no circumstances may a school district receive both student
11	growth funding and loss funding authorized by this section. If a school
12	district qualifies for both student growth funding and loss funding, then the
13	school district shall receive the greater of the two (2) amounts.
14	(c) The State Board of Education shall promulgate rules and
15	regulations for the disbursement of available funds for local school
16	districts' lost revenues.
17	
18	6-20-327. Calculation and disbursement of funds authorized.
19	(a) The Department of Education shall calculate the amount of funds
20	authorized by this subchapter on three (3) occasions during the year. The
21	first of these shall be done at the beginning of the year. A second
22	calculation shall occur at some point during the year, making corrections for
23	clerical errors and student growth. The third of these calculations shall be
24	done at the end of the year and shall settle all funding amounts due to
25	school districts under this subchapter.
26	(b) On or before July 1 of every year, the department shall set a
27	schedule of payments of funds authorized under this subchapter to school
28	districts.
29	(c) If statistical data required in this subchapter are not available
30	at the time they are required for calculations or if the school program is
31	disrupted for any cause not controlled by the local board of education, the
32	State Board of Education shall cause procedures to be developed which will
33	ensure that the provisions of this subchapter are properly enforced.
34
