11	6-5-1102. Council on Postsecondary Education and Career Readiness		
12	established - Membership - Meetings.		
13	(a) This subchapter establishes the Council on Postsecondary Education		
14	and Career Readiness to facilitate the collaboration of kindergarten,		
15	elementary, secondary, and postsecondary educational institutions in Arkansas		
16	in developing college and career readiness standards that align school		
17	curriculum and graduation standards with postsecondary education requirements		
18	and business community expectations for employability.		
19	(b) The council shall consist of twelve (12) members as follows:		
20	(1) The Commissioner of Education or his or her designee;		
21	(2) The Director of the Department of Higher Education or his or		
22	her designee;		
23	(3) The Director of the Department of Career Education or his or		
24	her designee;		
25	(4) The Director of the Arkansas Economic Development Commission		
26	or his or her designee;		
27	(5) The President of the Arkansas Science and Technology		
28	Authority or his or her designee;		
29	(6) The Director of the Department of Workforce Services or his		
30	or her designee;		
31	(7) A president or chancellor of an Arkansas four-year		
32	institution of higher education or his or her designee, appointed annually by		
33	the Director of the Department of Higher Education;		
34	(8) The Executive Director of the Arkansas Association of

8	(c)(l) The Commissioner of Education or his or her designee shall call
9	the first meeting of the council and serve as chair for the first meeting.
10	(2) The first meeting shall occur within thirty (30) days of the
11	effective date of this subchapter.
12	(d) At the first meeting of the council and annually thereafter, the
13	voting members of the council shall elect one (1) member to serve as chair
14	for one (1) year.
15	(e)(1) All members are voting members except the chair, who may vote
16	only to break a tie vote.
17	(2) A majority of the members shall constitute a quorum for the
18	transaction of business.
19	(f) The council shall meet at least three (3) times in a calendar
20	<u>year.</u>
21	(g) The Department of Education, Department of Higher Education, and
22	Department of Career Education shall, alternating each year, provide meeting
23	space and staff for the council.
24	(h) Council members shall serve without pay and shall not receive
25	expense reimbursement except from the agency or institution employing the

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28	6-5-1103. Powers and duties.
29	(a) The Council on Postsecondary Education and Career Readiness shall:
30	(1) Develop a unified strategy to:
31	(A) Reduce remediation rates among high school graduates
32	entering postsecondary education by at least fifty percent (50%) by the year
33	2020; and
34	(B) Increase postsecondary graduation and completion
35	rates;
36	(2)(A) Support college and career readiness standards that:

1	(i) Require higher performance levels than those
2	currently required for high school graduation; and
3	(ii) Promote accelerated learning opportunities,
4	including without limitation Advanced Placement courses, concurrent credit
5	opportunities, and other accelerated opportunities with college or
6	vocational-technical school assistance to ensure that all students have the
7	skills to be successful in either employment or postsecondary education.
8	(B) College and career readiness standards shall be
9	implemented with the understanding that until July 1, 2022, interim high
10	school graduation standards may be used until the high school graduation
11	standards adopted by the State Board of Education are equal to the college
12	and career readiness standards;
13	(3) Develop a successful transition-to-work matrix that schools
14	and students may use to help students develop employment skills;
15	(4) Develop guidelines for secondary school intervention
16	programs and transitional courses;
17	(5) Develop guidelines for professional development for teachers
18	of transitional courses and opportunities for collaboration among high
19	school, vocational-technical school, and college faculty to ensure that
20	transitional courses target gaps in students' college and career readiness
21	skills; and
22	(6) Provide the reports required under this subchapter.
23	(b)(1) The council shall establish working groups of its members, or
24	staff of the agencies or institutions employing the members, to direct the
25	planning process and strategic implementation of its plans.
26	(2) The working groups shall:
27	(A) Develop goals and action plans;
28	(B) Identify resources; and
29	(C) Determine expected outcomes to measure for each
30	strategy promoting college and career readiness and postsecondary completion.
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32	6-5-1104. Reporting requirements.
33	(a) By June 30, 2014, the Council on Postsecondary Education and
34	<u>Career Readiness shall:</u>
35	(1) Develop a written plan to reduce remediation rates and
36	increase postsecondary graduation rates, including without limitation:

1	(A) Annual goals;
2	(B) Action strategies;
3	(C) Assigned responsibilities for implementing strategies;
4	(D) Timelines; and
5	(E) Reporting mechanisms;
6	(2) Provide the written plan to:
7	(A) The House Committee on Education and the Senate

9	(B) The board of directors of each school district and

18	(b) By June 30, 2015, and annually thereafter, the council shall
19	report to the House Committee on Education and the Senate Committee on
20	Education:
21	(1) The progress of the council's work for the year; and
22	(2) Its recommendations, which may include without limitation
23	proposals for legislative action.
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25	SECTION 2. Arkansas Code Title 6, Chapter 15, Subchapter 20, is
26	amended to add an additional section to read as follows:
27	6-15-2012. College and career readiness assessments - Secondary
28	intervention programs - Transitional courses.
29	(a) Before a student's graduation from high school, a high school
30	shall assess the student's college readiness based on the statewide college
31	and career readiness standards determined and implemented by the State Board
32	<u>of Education.</u>
33	(b) A high school shall provide for each student who does not meet the
34	college and career standards under the assessment:
35	(1) One (1) or more transitional courses designed to help the
36	ctudent reach college and career readiness standards, and

1	(2) Related strategies to allow for accelerated skill and
2	knowledge development consistent with the college and career readiness
3	standards.
4	(c) A transitional course:
5	(1) Is based on the college and career readiness standards; and
6	(2) May be composed of digital transitional modules that allow a
7	student to progress at his or her own pace in the specific area of
8	intervention needed.
9	(d) The Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board shall exempt from
10	the placement exam under § 6-61-110 a first-time entering freshman at a
11	state-supported institution of higher education who meets the college and
12	career readiness standards.
13	(e) A high school shall award the same credit for a full mathematics
14	transitional course as it does for a fourth-year mathematics course.
15	(f) The State Board of Education may promulgate rules to implement
16	this section.
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
