27	district report on the expenditure of national school lunch state categorical
28	funds, is amended to read as follows:
29	(D)(i) By the end of each school year, each school
30	district shall submit to the Department of Education a report listing that:
31	(a) Lists each program upon which funds
32	allocated under this subdivision (b)(4) were expended $\frac{1}{5}$
33	(b) Identifies the amount expended, for each
34	program;
35	(c) Documents the specific benefit of the
36	program to the academic progress of low-income students; and
