22	SECTION 1. DO NO	OT CODIFY. <u>Legislative findings</u>	and intent.
23	(a) The General	Assembly finds that:	
24	(1) Cance	r is the second leading cause of o	death in Arkansas;
25	(2) Skin	cancer, the most common form of ca	ancer in the United

27	<u>(A)</u>	Is caused by overexposure to ultr	raviolet light; and
28	<u>(B)</u>	Can be prevented by protecting sl	kin from ultraviolet

1	Arkansans are estimated to die due to cancer in 2018;		
2	(6) The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends		
3	protecting skin from ultraviolet light by:		
4	(A) Staying in the shade;		
5	(B) Wearing:		
6	(i) Clothing that covers the wearer's arms and legs;		
7	(ii) A hat with a wide brim to shade the wearer's		
8	face, head, ears, and neck; and		
9	(iii) Sunglasses that wrap around the wearer's eye		
10	area and block ultraviolet light; and		
11	(C) Using sunscreen with a sun protection factor of		
12	fifteen (SPF 15) or higher with broad spectrum protection from long-wave		
13	ultraviolet A (UVA) and short-wave ultraviolet B (UVB) rays;		
14	(7) The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention also		
15	recommends applying sunscreen with a sun protection factor of fifteen (SPF		
16	15) or higher before going outside;		
17	(8) Research presented by the Centers for Disease Control and		
18	Prevention indicates that even one (1) blistering sunburn during childhood or		
19	adolescence can increase a person's chance of developing melanoma of the		
20	<u>skin;</u>		
21	(9)(A) Sunscreen is categorized as an over-the-counter drug by		
22	the United States Food and Drug Administration.		
23	(B) Many state policies address and restrict		
24	administration and use of over-the-counter drugs at school;		
25	(10) Among high school students, only thirteen percent (13%) of		
26	girls and seven percent (7%) of boys reported in 2013 that they routinely		
27	used a sunscreen with a sun protection factor of fifteen (SPF 15) or higher		
28	when they were outside for more than one (1) hour on a sunny day;		
29	(11) Several states, including Alabama, Louisiana, Oklahoma, and		
30	Texas, have enacted legislation to address the student use of sunscreen in		
31	schools; and		
32	(12) Schools can provide additional protections to the children		
33	of this state without creating additional costs.		
34	(b) It is the intent of the General Assembly to allow the use of		
35	sunscreen in schools without a physician authorization.

1	SECTION 2. Arkansas Code Title 6, Chapter 18, Subchapter 7, is amended
2	to add an additional section to read as follows:
3	6-18-714. Use of sunscreen.
4	(a) A student may possess and use a topical sunscreen to avoid
5	overexposure to the sun without written authorization from a parent, legal
6	guardian, or healthcare professional while on school property or at a school-
7	related event or activity if the sunscreen is approved by the United States
8	Food and Drug Administration for over-the-counter use.
9	(b) A member of school personnel may assist a student in the
10	application of sunscreen.
11	(c) This section does not:
12	(1) Require a member of school personnel to assist a student in
13	the application of sunscreen; or
14	(2) Create any liability or immunity for a school or a member of
15	school personnel.
