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ACADEMIC IMPROVEMENT TRAINING

Funds totaling \$500,000 were distributed between North Little Rock School District and three (3) education cooperatives for the purpose of providing research based materials and professional development to Arkansas teachers and administrators in their efforts to develop, initiate and evaluate student academic improvement plans. These funds focused on providing teachers with reading/writing, math, science and leadership training strategies for struggling students and developing a comprehensive literacy model. In addition, teachers and administrators were provided training on curriculum alignment and lesson planning.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT INCENTIVE

The Advanced Placement Incentive program was appropriated \$675,000 for the 2006–2007 school year. This program provided support to establish Advanced Placement courses (AP) that are easily accessible and would prepare students for admission to, and success in, a postsecondary educational environment. Advanced Placement courses and exams provide high school students the opportunity to earn college credit at most colleges and universities. The program paid \$171,450 (\$25 per exam) to schools for each score of 3 or better on advanced placement exams and \$502,750 for professional development support for AP and Pre-AP teachers.

Beginning with the 2007-2008 school year, the program will be appropriated \$825,000 due to a reinstatement of \$150,000 that will be used to restore the Equipment and Materials Grants for one-time only grants for AP courses. These grants will be for \$1,000 each thus allowing for 150 courses to be awarded the Equipment and Materials Grants.

ALTERNATIVE LEARNING

School districts were required to provide an alternative learning environment (ALE) for students who demonstrated an inability to function in the standard learning environment. The ALE program provided educational programs to eligible students in alternative classroom settings, as well as additional services to meet the needs of this group of at-risk students. The Department of Education calculated ALE funds in the 2006-2007 school year by multiplying \$3,250 by the number of identified ALE students enrolled during the previous school year, pursuant to Arkansas law and Arkansas Department of Education Rules. In 2007-2008, the ALE rate will increase to \$4,063 per student.

ARKANSAS EASTER SEALS

This program funded the cost of educational services provided by the Easter Seal Society to children ages 3 to 21 who have orthopedic and/or communicative disorders. This funding reduced the amount that local school districts had to pay for these educational services and also qualifies the facility as “state supported” so that federal funds were available to further reduce the cost to local school districts. Easter Seals of Arkansas program was appropriated \$193,113 for the 2006-2007 school year, and the total amount was paid in monthly installments of \$16,093.

ARKANSAS LEADERSHIP ACADEMY AND MASTER PRINCIPAL

Created by the State Legislature in 1991, the Arkansas Leadership Academy (ALA) was formed in order to provide leadership for education reform in Arkansas. The Academy brings together partners from business, higher education, professional associations, educational cooperatives and governmental agencies. It provides a variety of leadership development programs for principals, teachers, partners and other leaders including year-long residential programs. The Arkansas Leadership Academy program was appropriated \$1,400,000 for the 2006-2007 school year. Distributions totaling \$1,100,000 were made to the University of Arkansas from the Public School Fund (JAA) for the master school principal program (\$500,000) and general operations (\$600,000). Additionally, \$300,000 was paid from the Department of Education Fund (EGA) for the Arkansas Leadership Academy School Support Program through which the Arkansas Leadership Academy, in collaboration with the Department of Education, provided support to schools or school districts designated as being in school improvement.

ASSESSMENT/END OF LEVEL TESTING

This program provided for standards-based testing at the primary, intermediate and middle grade levels, which was administered at grades 3–8. It also required end-of-course testing for Algebra, Geometry and Literacy in 11th grade. A total of \$300,311 was paid to Dawson Educational Service Cooperative for development and delivery of the annual School Performance Report for the 2006–2007 school year, and \$29,536 was paid to the Arch Ford Education Service Cooperative for Home School testing.

AT RISK

At Risk refers to students who are at-risk of failing or are not performing at their academic/grade level and/or developmental age level. Factors for being at-risk can include socio-economic factors, disciplinary concerns, low academic performance, high absenteeism and Limited English Proficiency. Local school districts, education service cooperatives and other service providers, as identified by the Arkansas Department of Education (ADE), were eligible to receive funding through a grant process that addressed academic achievement of students at-risk. The total amount of funds distributed was determined by the ADE State Board. For the 2006–2007 school year, \$901,770 was paid to various local school districts, education service cooperatives and institutions of higher education. These funds were for the College Preparatory Enrichment Program (CPEP), which was a summer college preparatory enrichment program for students who scored less than the minimum score of 19 on the ACT test as set by the State Board of Higher Education.

BETTER CHANCE GRANTS

Arkansas Better Chance Grants were administered by the Division of Child Care and Early Childhood Education of the Department of Health and Human Services for the purpose of serving educationally deprived children birth through 5 years old, excluding kindergarten. Within the Arkansas Better Chance Program, is the Arkansas Better Chance for School Success (ABCSS) Program that funds innovative and developmentally appropriate early childhood programs for educationally deprived children ages 3 and 4. The distribution of funds was based on \$4,400 per child for the 2006–2007 school year for classroom-based programs and \$1,557 per child for home-visiting programs. Total appropriation in fiscal year 2007 was \$71,166,500 of which \$66,079,897 was distributed to school districts, cooperatives, institutions of higher education, and other organizations. The program served a total of 18,731 children in Arkansas in 2006-2007.

In fiscal year 2008, total appropriation will be \$111,000,000. Funding per child will be increased to \$4,630 for classroom-based programs and \$1,667 for home-visiting programs. It is anticipated that approximately 25,000 children will be served.

CONSOLIDATION ASSISTANCE

These funds were paid to each school district that was administratively consolidated or annexed by the State Board of Education pursuant to ACA 6-11-105 and 6-13-1401.

For those school districts **not required** to be consolidated/annexed in the current school year funding was, if two (2) districts consolidated or one (1) district was annexed into another district, the **prior year** Average Daily Membership (ADM) of the smaller district was multiplied by the foundation funding amount per student of \$5,662, where the minimum ADM applicable was one hundred (100) and the maximum ADM applicable was three hundred (300).

For those districts **required** to be consolidated/annexed in the current school year funding was, if two (2) districts consolidated or one (1) district was annexed to another school district, the **current year** ADM of the smaller district was multiplied by the foundation funding amount per student of \$5,662, where the minimum ADM applicable was one hundred (100) and the maximum ADM applicable was three hundred (300). In fiscal year 2007, there were six (6) new consolidations.

COOPERATIVE EDUCATION TECHNICAL CENTERS OPERATIONS

Technology Coordinators in the Education Service Cooperatives assisted local school districts by providing technology training, advising school districts in software/hardware purchases and overseeing technology laboratories. The maximum amount of funds available to each of the State's fifteen (15) education service cooperatives was set by the State Board of Education. For the 2006–2007 school year, the maximum amount was \$50,000. The maximum will be \$75,000 beginning with the 2007-2008 school year.

COURT ORDERED DESEGREGATION

Funds were disbursed by the Department of Education for desegregation expenses as required by court ordered settlement agreements. The amount appropriated for the 2006–2007 school year was \$65,610,828. The disbursements were based on a series of formulas. Payments for the 2006-2007 school year were \$36,363,141 to Little Rock School District, \$7,339,131 to the North Little Rock School District, \$20,130,280 to the Pulaski County Special School District and \$578,666 to the Camden-Fairview School District.

DEBT SERVICE FUNDING SUPPLEMENT

This aid was provided to school districts to offset some of the existing debt burdens that a district had incurred and increased the amount of local revenue available for the maintenance and operation of schools. Those districts that qualified for Debt Service Funding Supplements received funding based upon the amount of required debt payment, number of students and wealth. Debt Service Supplement Funds were to be used solely for the payment of bonded debt.

Pursuant to Act 2206 of the 85th General Assembly and ACA 6-20-2503, the following calculation was used to determine the Debt Service Funding Supplement. The calculation was based on the Principal and Interest Payment Schedule in effect and on file with the Department of Education on January 1, 2005. This amount was reduced by 10% for purposes of calculating debt service funding supplement. The remaining 90% of the principal and interest payment will be divided by the total assessed value of the district, multiplied by 1,000 to calculate the required debt service mills. This product is multiplied by the State Wealth Index, multiplied by the prior year's three quarter Average Daily Membership (ADM), and multiplied by a funding factor of \$18.

These funds were paid on or before August 1 and February 1 of each year. If a district qualified for Debt Service Funding Supplement, the amount of aid was not reduced as a result of refunding bonds outstanding in effect and on file with the Department of Education on January 1, 2005.

DECLINING ENROLLMENT

This program provided additional funding to school districts with an Average Daily Membership (ADM) that was less than the ADM of the previous year. Funding was equal to the difference between the average of the ADM for the two (2) immediately preceding years and the ADM for the previous school year multiplied by \$5,620. Additionally, any appropriated and available funds for declining enrollment funding that remained after the initial distributions were prorated and distributed equally at a rate of \$9,291 per lost student to school districts that qualified for both declining enrollment funding and special needs isolated funding.

DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION SCHOOL DISTRICT

ACA 12-29-304 provided that the cost of running the Department of Correction School District be borne by the Department of Correction and the Department of Education. Act 2131 of 2005 appropriated \$4,547,675 for the Arkansas Department of Correction School District and \$4,547,675 was disbursed during the 2006-2007 school year.

DISTANCE LEARNING

Distance Learning was the technology and the educational process used to provide instruction when the student and primary instructor was not physically present at the same time and/or place. Grants were provided for acquiring and leasing equipment and telecommunications services, as well as expanding distance learning opportunities, to school districts needing advanced level courses or courses for which a district could not justify a full time teacher for the number of students in the course. The Strategic Plan for the Department of Education included making all 38 academic units required available through distance learning.

Funds were distributed in the 2006-2007 school year to schools, which submitted grant applications through the educational service cooperatives, to the Department of Information Services for line charges billed to the Department of Education and to individual service providers, which received approximately \$500 per child served (e.g. the Arkansas School for Mathematics, Sciences and the Arts). This program also provided \$100,000 for a Distance Learning Coordinator for each educational service cooperative.

EARLY CHILDHOOD SPECIAL EDUCATION

This program provided special education services through 17 school districts, 1 school district consortium and 15 education service cooperatives for an estimated 6,000 three to five year old preschool children with disabilities. This program also served as state Medicaid match for physical, occupational and speech therapy services. A portion of the appropriation was used to provide for partial reimbursement of 16 Early Childhood Coordinators and certain other program coordination costs. Funds were distributed to subrecipients in the 2006-2007 school year based on headcounts at \$1,000 per child.

ECONOMIC EDUCATION

The objective of this program is to increase the economic literacy of K-12 students by providing economic and personal finance education and training to teachers and administrators in Arkansas. The appropriation of \$300,000 was distributed in the 2006-2007 school year to the Arkansas Council on Economic Education, a private, non-profit organization that provides professional development for K-12 teachers.

EDUCATION RENEWAL ZONES

This initiative was designed to bridge resources available through institutes of higher learning with the needs of Arkansas' public schools. The program's purpose was to identify and implement educational and management strategies and maximize benefits and outcomes of public schooling designed to improve public school performance and student academic achievement, with special focus on the state's most academically distressed public schools; to provide collaboration among the state's smaller schools and districts to achieve advantages of economies of scale; to maximize benefits and outcomes of public schooling by concentrating and coordinating the resources of Arkansas' higher education institutions (IHE), the expertise of the regional education service cooperatives (ESC), and the technical assistance of other service providers; and to enable small schools to make the best use of the latest cost-effective distance learning technology. This program provided funding of \$1,220,782 to the Educational Renewal Zones during the 2006-2007 school year.

EDUCATION SERVICE COOPERATIVES

The 15 educational service cooperatives around the State facilitated the sharing of resources and services between local school districts. Each cooperative received four (4) quarterly payments in the 2006-2007 school year of \$82,155.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE LEARNERS

This program served school districts with students assessed as limited in English proficiency. Most of these students were at the beginning stage of acquiring English. Funding was provided to assist with securing specially-trained staff, instructional materials and/or training. School districts received grants in the 2006-2007 school year based on the district's Limited English Proficiency (LEP) headcount at \$195 per LEP student.

GENERAL FACILITIES FUNDING

These funds are distributed in accordance with ACA 6-20-2503(e). Beginning in fiscal year 2006, school districts received state financial assistance equal to the General Facilities Funding the school district received or would have received under the Supplemental School District Funding Act of 2003 (ACA 6-20-2401, et seq. [repealed]) during fiscal year 2005. After fiscal year 2006, this funding shall be phased out by reducing the amount received by a school district by one-tenth (1/10) each year over a ten-year period with the savings distributed through the Educational Facilities Partnership Fund (EFP). The amount of savings transferred in fiscal year 2007 to the Educational Facilities Partnership Fund (EFP) was \$819,683. Prior to fiscal year 2006, a school district's expenditure of General Facilities Funding was restricted to the purchase of school buses, furniture, equipment and computer software, or for the renovation or repair to existing facilities. Beginning in fiscal year 2006, the use of General Facilities Funding is unrestricted.

GIFTED AND TALENTED

This program provided a contribution to Arkansans for Gifted and Talented Education (AGATE), salary support for 15 Gifted and Talented supervisors in the Cooperatives, and the Governor's School. The appropriation of \$1,292,896 was distributed in the 2006-2007 school year as follows: Cooperatives applied for gifted and talented supervisor positions and received \$44,500 per full-time position (pro-rated if part-time position); \$756,803 paid to Hendrix College for the Governor's School, and \$3,000 paid to winners of the Outstanding Gifted and Talented Award Program.

GRANTS TO SCHOOL DISTRICTS

This payment was made for educating students in North Arkansas who could not get to their assigned district because Bull Shoals Lake separated them from their district, which would require a round trip of more than 35 miles. Act 2131 of 2005 appropriated \$50,000 to be paid in the 2006-2007 school year to the Ozark Mountain School District.

HIGH PRIORITY DISTRICT TEACHER RECRUITMENT/RETENTION

This was a program that provided teacher bonuses as incentives for recruitment and retention in high-priority districts. A high-priority district was one having at least 80% free lunches, and 1,000 or fewer students.

For all newly signed teachers to high-priority districts, a \$4,000 bonus was paid at the time a teacher signed a contract to teach in the district and \$3,000 retention bonus was paid at the beginning of each of the next two (2) subsequent years if the teacher continued teaching in the same high-priority district. For all teachers not newly signed to work in the district, a \$2,000 retention bonus was paid at the beginning of each of the next two (2) subsequent years if the teacher continued to work in a high-priority district.

Act 2151 of 2005 amended ACA 6-17-811 relating to teacher recruitment and retention bonuses for High Priority Districts. The amendment clarified the definition for "teachers" to mean those working directly with students 70% of their time in a classroom setting. The definition of "teachers" was also clarified to include guidance counselors and librarians.

Another major revision in the act was to establish that if a teacher voluntarily left the High Priority District before the end of the three-year bonus pay period, then the teacher was required to pay back the bonus received. At the end of the 2006-2007 school year, the amount due back was \$261,000. If a teacher was reassigned involuntarily to a position that was not eligible for bonus pay or was dismissed involuntarily by the district, then the teacher was not required to repay the applicable bonus received. If a teacher left the district due to serious medical emergency, then the teacher was not required to repay the bonus received provided that the teacher supplied a statement from a licensed physician verifying that the teacher was unable to work and must terminate employment.

Act 1044 of 2007 amended ACA 6-17-811 to stipulate that a teacher is eligible to receive the incentive bonus at the end of the school year.

HOME SCHOOL TESTING

This program paid for the administration of norm-referenced achievement tests for home school students as required by ACA 6-15-504. A grant of \$150,000 was made in the 2006-2007 school year to the Arch Ford Education Service Cooperative who administered the testing for the State. An additional \$100,000 was distributed for more personnel and to better the implementation of home school testing information.

INTERVENTION BLOCK GRANTS

Local school districts, education service cooperatives, institutions of higher education, and other organizations were eligible to apply for an intervention block grant. These grants were used to encourage parental involvement through the following four (4) student competitions: Arkansas Governor's Quiz Bowl Association (\$100,000), Creativity in Arkansas (\$13,500), State History Day Competition (\$5,000) and Arkansas Destination Imagination (\$13,500). For the 2006-2007 school year, \$132,000 was expended.

ISOLATED FUNDING

Because of location or geographic barriers, some districts included an area that was not able to share resources or had unusual transportation needs. This area, with an Average Daily Membership (ADM) of less than 350, was termed "isolated school area" and received additional funding. The funding was distributed in the 2006-2007 school year based upon the prior year three (3) quarter ADM of the isolated school area multiplied by the Per Student Isolated Funding Amount of \$ for the isolated school area as prescribed by ACA 6-20-603.

NATIONAL BOARD OF PROFESSIONAL TEACHING STANDARDS

This program encouraged teachers to seek certification by the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards by competitively awarding the \$2,500 application fee and up to 3 days of substitute teacher pay. A \$5,000 initial bonus was awarded during the school year in which the individual first obtained the National Board certification and a yearly bonus of \$5,000 was awarded to certified teachers in each of years two (2) through ten (10) of the 10-year life of the certificate. Funding of \$6,000 was also distributed to designated "support sites" at various school districts or education service cooperatives to assist candidates with the National Board certification process. If a teacher does not complete their certification after 3 years, they must refund the application fee. At the end of the 2006-2007 school year, the amount due back was \$183,263.

NATIONAL SCHOOL LUNCH STUDENT FUNDING

This program was funding for those students from low socio-economic backgrounds as indicated by the eligibility for free or reduced-priced meals under the National School Lunch Act as reported on October 1 of each year and submitted to the Department of Education.

For the 2006-2007 school year, national school lunch student funding for each identified national school lunch student was as follows:

- (A) For school districts in which ninety percent (90%) or greater of the enrolled students are national school lunch students, funding was one thousand four hundred forty dollars (\$1,440);
- (B) For school districts in which at least seventy percent (70%) but less than ninety percent (90%) of the enrolled students are national school lunch students, funding was nine hundred sixty dollars (\$960); and
- (C) For school districts in which less than seventy percent (70%) of the enrolled students are national school lunch students, funding was four hundred eighty dollars (\$480).

NON-TRADITIONAL LICENSURE GRANTS

Non-Traditional Licensure Program (NTLP) is a “Teaching and Learning” Teacher Licensure program for those with a college degree in areas other than education. This program was developed by the Arkansas Legislature for the purpose of meeting teacher shortages in critical parts of the state. Recognizing that professionals' experience, knowledge, and previous career successes can positively impact the lives of students, NTLP allows mature career changers, with a variety of work experiences, to teach in public school classrooms. For the 2006-2007 school year, NTLP teachers received up to \$500 for teaching in geographic areas and/or subject areas in which there were critical teacher shortages.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT FUNDING

This program provided a coordinated set of planned learning activities for teachers and administrators that were standards-based. These programs should have resulted in individual, school-wide and system-wide improvements designed to ensure that all students demonstrate proficiency in the state academic standards. For the 2006-2007 school year, the Professional Development funding amount was up to fifty dollars (\$50) times the district's Average Daily Membership for the previous year. Special language in Act 2131 of 2005 allowed the Department of Education to use up to \$4,000,000 to develop a statewide professional development program.

PUBLIC SCHOOL EMPLOYEES INSURANCE

This program paid the health insurance contribution rate established by the State Board of Education for employees of the Education Service Cooperatives, Vocational Centers, the Model Vocational-Technical Resource Center, Arkansas Easter Seals and the school operated by the Department of Correction. For the 2006-2007 school year this rate was \$131 per month for each employee. In addition, the Department of Education paid the Employee Benefits Division of the Department of Finance and Administration \$61 per month for each eligible employee electing to participate in the public school employee health insurance program.

PYGMALION COMMISSION

This \$40,000 grant to the Fort Smith School District, fiscal agent for the Commission, was used to develop statewide alternative learning environments and provide changes in curriculum, instructional approaches, school climate and organization to improve educational outcomes for at-risk students.

RESIDENTIAL CENTERS/JUVENILE DETENTION

This was a special education program to provide reimbursements to school districts for educational costs associated with students in approved residential treatment facilities or juvenile detention centers.

By State Board regulation, community residential facilities were reimbursed through local school districts at a standard daily rate based on a multiplier of 2.10 times per student foundation aid. Detention facility reimbursement is based on a calculation of foundation aid times the number of approved program beds.

SCHOOL FOOD SERVICES

This program, combined with the Surplus Commodities program, provided the State match for the total school food program in local schools. These grants were paid to school districts at a rate based on the number of lunches served. The rate of \$0.029552577 was established by dividing the state appropriation of \$1,650,000 by the total number of lunches served during the 2005-2006 school year.

SECONDARY AREA VOCATIONAL CENTERS

This program provided funding for students in secondary technical area centers. These centers are public secondary technical institutions organized for the specific purpose of educating high school students in specific career and technical fields. A center generally serves students within a twenty-five (25) mile radius or thirty minute driving time of the center.

For the 2006-2007 school year, the minimum training fee was set at \$3,250 multiplied by the number of full time equivalent students enrolled in a secondary technical area center during the 2005-2006 school year. In fiscal year 2008 this program was transferred from the Department of Education to the Arkansas Department of Workforce Education.

SERIOUS OFFENDER PROGRAM

The Department of Education has established the Serious Offender Program (SOP) through a Memorandum of Understanding with the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS). The current program has been in effect since 1996 for the purpose of generating educational funds for the DHHS Serious Offender Programs. School districts were provided state funds based on the number of participants in their districts. The amount per student for 2006-2007 was \$5,077. School districts in turn paid the SOP providers in their districts.

SMART START/SMART STEP ASSESSMENT

The Smart Start program focused on improving the academic achievement of kindergarten through fourth grade students in the areas of reading and mathematics. Since its inception in 2000, this program has been expanded to include Smart Step and Next Step, which includes grades five through twelve. These programs were administered through a network of literacy and mathematics specialists who assisted the schools with professional development through statewide conferences, regional workshops and satellite delivered meetings. The schools were also provided a variety of resources including professional books and videos.

For the 2006-2007 school year, school districts received \$190,782 to provide professional development training in their districts, education service cooperatives received \$5,221,609 to provide professional development training in their region and institutions of higher education received \$1,066,424 to provide state-wide professional development.

SPECIAL EDUCATION - CATASTROPHIC OCCURRENCES

This program assisted districts with special education students who required extraordinary support services such as full-time registered nurses or elaborate assistance technology. The special education and related services required by these individual students were unduly expensive, extraordinary or beyond the routine costs associated with special education. Reimbursements from this program could only be sought after eligible costs for the child equaled or exceeded \$15,000, and only after Medicaid, federal Title VI-B and available third-party funding was applied to the catastrophic occurrence.

SPECIAL EDUCATION SERVICES

This program provided funding to support the provision of Extended School Year (ESY) services to eligible students with disabilities in need of such services, provided special education services to children with disabilities who were wards of the State placed by the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) in out-of-state therapeutic treatment programs and provided funds to support the payment of salaries to special education supervisors.

For the 2006-2007 school year, \$3,274,211 was paid to school districts and educational service cooperatives to support the salaries of special education supervisors, at a maximum amount of \$7 per student based on the Average Daily Membership of the first three quarters of the previous year. In addition, \$871,074 was paid to school districts and education service cooperatives for ESY services, at a rate of \$74 a day per student.

SPECIAL NEEDS ISOLATED FUNDING

During the 2006-2007 school year, this program provided additional funding of \$6,502,335 to school districts that contained isolated schools in order to offset the increased cost of operations as a result of new requirements under the Standards of Accreditation of Arkansas Public Schools adopted by the State Board of Education. Additionally, any appropriated and available funds for special needs isolated funding that remained after the initial distributions were prorated and distributed equally per average lost student to school districts that qualified for both declining enrollment funding and special needs isolated funding.

STATE FOUNDATION FUNDING AID

This was the amount of state financial aid provided to each school district for the 2006-2007 school year. It was computed as the difference between the foundation funding amount established by the General Assembly, which was \$5,662 times the school district's Average Daily Membership (ADM), and the sum of ninety-eight percent (98%) of the uniform rate of tax times the property assessment of the school district plus seventy-five percent (75%) of miscellaneous funds of the school district.

ADM is the total number of days of school attended plus the total number of days absent by students in grades kindergarten through twelve (K-12) during the first 3 quarters of each school year divided by the number of school days actually taught in the school district during that period of time rounded up to the nearest hundredth.

STUDENT GROWTH

This program provided supplemental funding to school districts that had a growth in students over the previous school year.

Student Growth was calculated as \$5,400 multiplied by the increase, if any, in the school district's two-quarter average of the average daily membership of the current school year over the school district's two-quarter average of the average daily membership for the previous school year, excluding any increase resulting solely from consolidation or annexation with another school district.

SUPPLEMENTAL MILLAGE INCENTIVE FUNDING

These funds are distributed in accordance with ACA 6-20-2503(f). Beginning in fiscal year 2006, school districts that elected to receive Supplemental Millage Incentive Funding in fiscal year 2005 would receive the amount of Supplemental Millage Incentive Funding that exceeded the amount that the school district would have received under Debt Service Funding Supplement and General Facilities Funding in fiscal year 2005. After fiscal year 2006, this funding shall be phased out by reducing the amount received by a school district by one-tenth (1/10) each year over a ten-year period with the savings distributed through the Educational Facilities Partnership Fund (EFP). The amount of savings transferred in fiscal year 2007 to the Educational Facilities Partnership Fund (EFP) was \$1,026,024.

SURPLUS COMMODITIES

The Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) administered the Surplus Commodities Program for the 2006-2007 school year. Under an agreement with DHHS, the Department of Education reimbursed transportation costs of \$630,000 for the delivery of surplus commodities to the school districts.

TEACHER LICENSURE/MENTORING

This program funded the Arkansas Teacher Induction Program, which provided Pathwise mentoring for support, retention and professional growth of new teachers. Under the Pathwise system, first-year teachers were paired with trained mentors, who helped them through their first one to three years of teaching, traditionally the most difficult years.

During the 2006-2007 school year districts received \$2,000 for each new teacher participating in the program. The school districts then distributed \$1,200 to the mentor and \$800 to the new teacher to be used for materials, supplies or professional training. Payments totaling \$379,831 were made to school districts, institutions of higher education and education service cooperatives to provide training to mentors. In addition, \$216,000 was paid to Teach for America for recruiting new out of state teachers to Arkansas.

TEACHER RETIREMENT MATCHING

These payments were the employer matching for employees of the Education Service Cooperatives, Vocational Centers, the Model Vocational-Technical Resource Center, Arkansas Easter Seals and the school operated by the Department of Correction.

For the 2006-2007 school year the matching rate was 14% of salaries for all employees except those who elected to Teacher Deferred Retirement Option Plan (T-DROP) before September 1, 2003. The matching rate for these T-DROP employees was 3%.

TECHNOLOGY GRANTS

This program provided technology grants to school districts for programs such as the EAST Initiative and Explor-Net. The EAST program gave students the experience of using technology to solve real-life school or community problems. A National Training Center was established in Little Rock for training facilitators from other states as well as Arkansas teachers and students. Explor-Net taught students computer repair in a hands-on environment and teams, teachers and administrative personnel technology integration.

During the 2006-2007 school year grants totaling \$1,415,083 were paid to school districts, the Arkansas Association of Educational Administration and Environmental and Spatial Technology, Inc. for training and support of the EAST Initiative in over 150 participating schools. Explor-Net also received funding of \$187,575 for training and support. The legislature appropriated an additional \$2,000,000 for technology grants beginning with the 2007-2008 school year.

YOUTH SHELTERS

This program partially reimbursed school districts for additional costs of providing educational services to students who were placed in youth shelters by the Department of Health and Human Services. Funds were distributed to school districts using a per student reimbursement rate of \$521. This rate was calculated by dividing the appropriation amount (\$165,000) by the number of available beds in youth shelters.

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ACADEMIC FACILITIES IMMEDIATE REPAIR

Act 2206 of 2005 created the Academic Facilities Immediate Repair Program to address immediate school facilities repairs. The Division of Public School Academic Facilities and Transportation (the "Division") provided school districts with state financial aid for eligible repair projects based on the academic facilities wealth index.

To be eligible for funding the school district must have met the following criteria:

- (1) An application must have been received by July 1, 2005;
- (2) The condition for which the repair was needed was in existence on January 1, 2005; and
- (3) The building's facility condition index (FCI) was less than 65%. The FCI was a methodology established by the Division for comparing the cost of repairing the condition of a public school academic facility to the cost of replacing the facility with the same amount of square footage.

Funding for this program may be carried forward to subsequent years until such time as the program is complete. Act 989 of 2007 established that all projects funded under this program must be verified as completed no later than January 1, 2008.

ACADEMIC FACILITIES TRANSITIONAL REPAIR

The Academic Facilities Transitional Repair program was promulgated pursuant to Acts 1426 and 2206 of 2005. This program provided state financial aid based on an eligible school district's academic facilities wealth index in the form of reimbursement to a school district for eligible new construction projects for which the debt was incurred or funds were spent after January 1, 2005, and on or before June 30, 2006.

Funding for this program may be carried forward to subsequent years until such time as the program is complete. Act 989 of 2007 established that all projects funded under this program must be verified as completed no later than July 1, 2009.

ACADEMIC FACILITIES PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM

The Academic Facilities Partnership program was promulgated pursuant to Acts 1426 and 2206 of 2005. This program provided state financial assistance in the form of cash payments to school districts for eligible new construction projects. A new construction included any improvement to an academic facility and, if necessary, related areas such as the physical plant and grounds that brought the state of condition or efficiency of the academic facility to a state of condition or efficiency better than the facility's original condition of completeness or efficiency. New construction included additions to existing academic facilities and construction of new academic facilities. Funding for this program may be carried forward each fiscal year until project completion.

ACADEMIC FACILITIES SAFETY

During the 2006-2007 school year, the Safety Training program was funded \$96,950, which paid \$350 for each bus mechanic to attend an annual workshop.

ARKANSAS LEADERSHIP ACADEMY AND MASTER PRINCIPAL

(See narrative on Attachment 16.)

READING RECOVERY/ EARLY LITERACY

Reading Recovery, a research-based approach to reading intervention, in connection with the University of Arkansas at Little Rock (UALR), has been implemented in elementary schools across the state. The Arkansas Department of Education (ADE) provided schools the opportunity to train Reading Recovery teachers and/or to train a school-based employee to become a Reading Recovery Teacher Leader. Training expenses were funded by ADE through the training center at UALR in the amount of \$100,000 for the 2006-2007 school year. Grant funds provide training and support materials.

SCHOOL DISTRICT MILLAGE ROLLBACK COMPENSATION

These funds were paid to school districts to compensate for loss of revenues resulting from Amendment 79 of the Constitution which equalized school district real and personal property millage rates.

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ADVANCED PLACEMENT PROGRAM (CFDA# 84.330)

The Department of Education, in conjunction with the University of Arkansas at Little Rock (UALR), was awarded a grant to improve and increase access to College Board Advanced Placement classes for low-income students and to cover part or all of the cost of advanced placement tests fees for low-income students enrolled in advanced placement courses.

BYRD HONORS SCHOLARSHIPS (CFDA# 84.185)

This program provided a \$1,500 postsecondary education scholarship to outstanding high school seniors who show promise of continued academic achievement in an effort to recognize and promote student excellence. These scholarships were awarded for a maximum of 4 years and can be used at any eligible institution of higher education.

CENTERS FOR DISEASE CONTROL AND PREVENTION - INVESTIGATIONS AND TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE (CFDA# 93.283)

This program assisted state and local health authorities, as well as public schools, in controlling communicable diseases, chronic diseases and disorders and other preventable health conditions. These objectives were carried out by providing epidemic aid, surveillance, technical assistance, consultation, program support and leadership.

CHARTER SCHOOLS (CFDA# 84.282)

These funds were used to support the planning, development and initial implementation of charter schools.

COMPREHENSIVE SCHOOL REFORM DEMONSTRATION (CFDA# 84.332)

This program provided financial incentives to schools that needed to substantially improve student achievement. This was accomplished through implementing comprehensive school reform programs that were based on reliable research and effective practices, including an emphasis on basic academics and parental involvement.

EDUCATION FOR HOMELESS CHILDREN AND YOUTH (CFDA# 84.196)

This program provided funds to schools for supportive services and activities that facilitate the educational success of homeless children and youth.

EDUCATION TECHNOLOGY STATE GRANTS (CFDA# 84.318)

This program provided funds for schools through competitive grants to improve student academic achievement through the use of technology and to assist students in becoming technologically literate.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE ACQUISITION GRANTS (CFDA# 84.365)

This program provided grants to schools to ensure that limited English proficient children and youth, including immigrant children and youth, obtain English proficiency and meet state academic standards.

EVEN START - STATE EDUCATIONAL AGENCIES (CFDA# 84.213)

This is a Family Literacy program that provided grants to schools for programs designed to improve the educational opportunities of low-income families.

FUND FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF EDUCATION (CFDA# 84.215)

This program provided funds to conduct school-based mental health integration activities to ensure improvement in the quality of education for all students.

HURRICANE EDUCATION RECOVERY (CFDA# 84.938)

This program assisted in meeting the educational needs of individuals and educational institutions affected by hurricanes in the Gulf of Mexico for the calendar year 2005.

IMPROVING TEACHER QUALITY STATE GRANTS (CFDA# 84.367)

This program provided grants to school districts to assist schools with effectively recruiting and retaining highly qualified teachers and to provide professional development activities.

JAVITS GIFTED AND TALENTED STUDENTS EDUCATION PROGRAM (CFDA#84.206)

The Javits program supported the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 by carrying out a coordinated program designed to enhance the ability of elementary and secondary schools nationwide to meet the special educational needs of gifted and talented students, particularly those from disadvantaged or underrepresented groups.

**LEARN AND SERVE AMERICA - SCHOOL AND COMMUNITY BASED PROGRAMS
(CFDA# 94.004)**

This program provided grants to schools to offer service-learning opportunities for school-age youth, educate teachers about service-learning and incorporate service-learning opportunities into classrooms.

MATHEMATICS AND SCIENCE PARTNERSHIPS (CFDA# 84.366)

These funds were distributed to various local education agencies, including various school districts and Education Service Cooperatives, and to institutions of higher education. The purpose of the grants was to improve the academic achievement of students in mathematics and science through projects that promoted strong teaching skills for elementary and secondary school teachers and integrated teaching methods based on scientifically based research and technology.

MIGRANT EDUCATION – COORDINATION PROGRAM (CFDA# 84.144)

The purpose of the Migrant Education Program Consortium Incentive Grants program was to provide incentive grants to state educational agencies that participated in high-quality consortia with another state educational agency or other appropriate entity to improve the delivery of services to migrant children whose education was interrupted by addressing key needs of migratory children.

MIGRANT EDUCATION - STATE GRANT PROGRAM (CFDA# 84.011)

These funds supported high quality education programs for migratory children and helped ensure that migratory children who moved among the states were not penalized in any manner by disparities among states in curriculum, graduation requirements, state academic content and/or student academic achievement standards. Funds also ensured that migratory children not only were provided with appropriate education services (including supportive services) that addressed their special needs but also that such children received full and appropriate opportunities to meet the same challenging state academic content and student academic achievement standards that all children were expected to meet.

NATIONAL SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM (CFDA# 10.555)

This program assisted schools in making school lunches available to all school children and to encourage the domestic consumption of nutritious agricultural commodities.

**REVENUE SHARING AND PAYMENTS IN LIEU OF TAXES
(CFDA# 10.665, 12.112 and 15.227)**

The objectives of these federal programs were to share revenues derived from the use of public lands with state, county and local governments and compensate local taxing units for the loss of taxes generated from federally owned lands. Most of these funds were used for the benefit of public schools and public roads in the county in which the federally owned lands were located. Distributions were made in accordance with applicable sections of ACA 19-7-402 through ACA 19-7-802.

READING FIRST STATE GRANTS (CFDA# 84.357)

Reading First was a federal initiative authorized under Title I, Part B, Subpart 1 of the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001. The U.S. Department of Education provided Reading First Grants to States, which, in turn, awarded subgrants to eligible school districts that submitted approved proposals for how they would apply scientifically based reading research to improve reading and student achievement. Arkansas was awarded approximately \$64,000,000 across six years to improve reading achievement for the neediest students through the Reading First Program. The purpose of Reading First was to ensure that every student could read at grade level or above no later than the end of grade 3.

RURAL EDUCATION (CFDA# 84.358)

This program provided grants to rural schools to help improve the quality of teaching and learning in those schools.

**SAFE AND DRUG-FREE SCHOOLS AND COMMUNITIES – STATE GRANTS
(CFDA# 84.186)**

This program funded projects that support drug and violence prevention and education activities in schools.

SPECIAL EDUCATION - GRANTS TO STATES (CFDA# 84.027)

This program provided grants to school districts to assist in providing a free public education to all eligible children with disabilities.

SPECIAL EDUCATION - PRESCHOOL GRANTS (CFDA# 84.173)

This program provided supplemental grants to school districts and education service cooperatives to assist in providing a free public education to children with disabilities ages 3 through 5 years.

SPECIAL EDUCATION – STATE PERSONNEL DEVELOPMENT (CFDA# 84.323)

This program assisted state educational agencies in reforming and improving their systems for personnel preparation and professional development of individuals providing early intervention, educational and transition services, to improve results for children with disabilities.

SPECIAL EDUCATION - TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE AND DISSEMINATION TO IMPROVE SERVICES AND RESULTS FOR CHILDREN WITH DISABILITIES (CFDA# 84.326)

This grant was paid to provide technical assistance and distribution of information to improve early intervention, and educational and transitional services for preschool students with disabilities.

STATE GRANTS FOR INNOVATIVE PROGRAMS (CFDA# 84.298)

This program assisted State and local educational agencies in the reform of elementary and secondary education.

STATEWIDE DATA SYSTEMS (CFDA# 84.372)

This program enabled State educational agencies to design, develop and implement statewide, longitudinal data systems to efficiently and accurately manage, analyze, disaggregate and use individual student data, consistent with the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965. The program in Arkansas was designed to enhance the current data system by adding a unique student identifier process, an electronic transcript system and a data quality program. Arkansas received a three year grant of approximately \$3,300,000 to implement the system.

TITLE I GRANTS TO LOCAL EDUCATIONAL AGENCIES (CFDA# 84.010)

This program was designed to help schools improve the teaching and learning environment of children failing or most at-risk of failing.

TITLE I NEGLECTED AND DELINQUENT (CFDA #84.013)

The purpose of these funds were (1) to improve educational services to children in local and state institutions for neglected and delinquent children and youth so that such children and youth have the opportunity to meet the same challenging State content standards and challenging State student performance standards that all children in the state were expected to meet; (2) to provide such children and youth the services needed to make a successful transition from institutionalization to further schooling and employment; and (3) to prevent at-risk youth from dropping out of school and provide dropouts and youth returning from institutions with a support system to ensure their continued education.

TWENTY-FIRST CENTURY COMMUNITY LEARNING CENTERS (CFDA# 84.287)

This program provided grants to local educational agencies, faith-based organizations, and community-based entities to create community learning centers that provide academic enrichment opportunities for students attending high-poverty and low-performing schools.

VOLUNTARY PUBLIC SCHOOL CHOICE (CFDA# 84.361)

This grant supported the operation of the Arkansas Virtual School (ARVS), which is a statewide virtual school program offered to students enrolled in public schools in Arkansas. This grant has expired and will not function in 2007-2008.

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ARKANSAS MEDICAID ADMINISTRATION CLAIMING

In fiscal year 2007, the Arkansas Department of Education, Special Education Unit along with the Department of Health and Human Services-Division of Medical Services, received federal approval from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) to coordinate and manage a statewide Medicaid administrative claiming program referred to as Arkansas Medicaid Administrative Claiming (ARMAC). ARMAC allowed school districts the opportunity to receive reimbursement for the costs associated with certain administrative activities that directly supported the Arkansas Medicaid program. These funds were received from the Arkansas Department of Health and Human Services.

COORDINATED SCHOOL HEALTH

Coordinated School Health was a model that consisted of eight interactive components to connect health and academics. It was based on the idea that schools by themselves cannot and should not be expected to address the nation's most serious health and social problems. It brought together families, health care workers, media, religious organizations, community organizations that served youth and young people themselves. The schools provided the critical facility in which many agencies might work together to maintain the well-being of young people. Four (4) school districts received grants of \$10,000 each in the 2006-2007 school year.

COUNCIL OF CHIEF STATE SCHOOL OFFICERS

These funds were provided for the purpose of supporting State activities associated with the annual Council of Chief State School Officers (CCSSO) Policy Forum co-sponsored by the CCSSO and the Arkansas Department of Education. The CCSSO was a nonpartisan, nationwide, nonprofit organization of public officials who headed departments of elementary and secondary education in the states, the District of Columbia, the Department of Defense Education Activity, and five U.S. extra-state jurisdictions. CCSSO provided leadership, advocacy and technical assistance on major educational issues.

DEAN SYMPOSIUM

The Dean Symposium of Arkansas began in 1994 as a partnership between public schools, institutions of higher education and the Arkansas State Department of Education. The Symposium was established to form a network, based on the philosophy of inclusion, which served to continue a collaborative vision of education for all students and education settings. These Funds were received from the Arkansas Department of Health and Human Services.

FISH AND WILDLIFE CONSERVATION PROGRAM

These funds were generated from fines and fees collected by the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission arising out of convictions of persons violating state laws protecting game, fish and wildlife. The funds were distributed by the Department of Education back to the counties where the offenses occurred to provide school education programs for fish and wildlife conservation.

HONORS STATE GRANT PROGRAM

The Arkansas Department of Education (ADE) received a \$2,000,000 grant from the National Governor's Association to accomplish the following four (4) goals:

- (1) Develop college ready/workplace ready skills in mathematics and English/Language Arts,
- (2) Expand and develop end of course tests,
- (3) Expand and implement the statewide, longitudinal data tracking system (for which ADE was awarded a federal grant and this grant is serving as the state match) and
- (4) Develop an effective communication system.

TEACHER OF THE YEAR AWARD

This program distributed awards totaling \$27,000 during the 2006-2007 school year to teachers who were recognized as regional Teacher of the Year winners. These regional winners were selected at the state level from teachers who were nominated by their local school districts. One teacher was selected from each region to receive a \$1,000 cash award. The Arkansas Teacher of the Year winner received an additional \$14,000. These funds were received from the Walton Family Foundation.

WALTON TEACHER ADVANCEMENT PROGRAM (TAP) GRANT

The Walton Family Foundation funded the implementation of a pilot Teacher Advancement Program (TAP), which supports teachers in improving instruction and student achievement through the implementation of multiple career paths, ongoing applied professional growth, instructionally focused accountability and performance-based compensation.
