The Big Investment

41% of Arkansas
General Revenue
is dedicated to
K-12 education.



Half of school district revenue comes from the state (40% generated locally, 10% federal).

Foundation funding alone (state and local share) provides \$3 billion to schools.





AR District/Charter Revenue






Types of State Funding

- Foundation funding: base education funding, distributed equally (same per-student funding rate), unrestricted use
- Categorical funding (ELL, ALE, PD, NSL/ESA): provided to address additional educational challenges, restricted use
- Other state funding (student growth, declining enrollment, isolated): provided to address operational challenges due to location or enrollment fluctuations, mostly unrestricted

Revenue Components of Foundation Funding

- Uniform Rate of Tax
- 98% Adjustment
- Miscellaneous
- State Foundation Aid

Components of Foundation Funding



The Matrix

- Formula used to set per-student foundation funding rate
- List of resources needed to run a school district of 500 students and the costs of each
- A funding model, not a spending model

Components of Matrix

- School-level Staffing: teachers, guidance counselors, principals, etc.; specifies number needed and salary of each
- School-level Resources: textbooks, computers, substitute teachers, etc.
- District-level Resources: superintendent, custodial staff, buses and drivers, utilities, etc.








NAEP % Proficient or Advanced
