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- SECTION 17. TEMPORARY LANGUAGE. NOT TO BE CODIFIED. GENERAL REVENUE FUND TRANSFERS.
- 6 (a)(1) Beginning July 1, 2017, and each month thereafter, the Chief 7 Fiscal Officer of the State shall transfer on his or her books and those of 8 the State Treasurer and the Auditor of the State the amount listed under 9 "Monthly Deduction" in the Institutions General Revenue Deduction Schedule in 10 subsection (b) of this section from the total monthly allocation of general 11 revenue authorized for distribution in the Revenue Stabilization Act for the 12 four-year institutions of higher education, two-year institutions of higher education, and technical colleges that are listed in the schedule in 13
- (2) The total amount transferred under subdivision (a)(1) of
  this section shall not exceed the amount listed in "Total Annual Deductions"
  in the Institutions General Revenue Deduction Schedule in subsection (b) of

(c) One-third (1/3) of the monthly deduction authorized in subsection (a)(1) of this section shall be transferred monthly until the total annual transfer deposit is equal to two million three hundred ninety-four thousand dollars (\$2,394,000) for the following:

(1)s Nine percent (9%) shall be transferred monthly to the State

Highway and Transportation Department Fund for the Arkansas State Highway and

Transportation Department to provide bonus payments of up to two thousand

- dollars (\$2,000) for each highway police officer who completes certified law
- 2 enforcement training as determined by the Arkansas State Highway and
- 3 Transportation Department;
- 4 (2) Forty-five percent (45%) shall be transferred monthly to the
- 5 Department of Arkansas State Police Fund to provide bonus payments of up to
- 6 two thousand dollars (\$2,000) for each law enforcement officer who completes
- 7 certified law enforcement training as determined by the Department of
- 8 Arkansas State Police;
- 9 (3) Forty-four percent (44%) shall be transferred monthly to the
- 10 Department of Community Correction Fund Account for the Department of
- 11 Community Correction to provide bonus payments of up to two thousand dollars
- 12 (\$2,000) for each parole officers who completes certified law enforcement
- 13 training as determined by the Department of Community Correction; and
- 14 (4) Two percent (2%) shall be transferred monthly to the State
- 15 <u>Central Services Fund to provide bonus payments of up to two thousand dollar</u>
- 16 (\$2,000) for each Secretary of State police officer who completes certified
- 17 law enforcement training as determined by the Secretary of State.
- 18 (d) One-third (1/3) of the monthly deduction authorized in subsection
- 19 (a) of this section shall be transferred monthly to the Merit Adjustment Fund
- 20 until the total annual deposit is equal to four million seven hundred ninety-

- 34 (g) When subsections (c) and (d) of this section are fully funded, the
- 35 total monthly transfers authorized in subsection (a) of this section shall be
- 36 <u>transferred as authorized in subsection (e) of this section until subsection</u>

1	(e) of this section is fully funded.
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3	SECTION 18. EMERGENCY CLAUSE. It is found and determined by the
4	General Assembly of the State of Arkansas that state funds used for
5	remediation activities at institutions of higher education could be better
6	used elsewhere; that other areas of state government are in need of state
7	funding; and that this act is immediately necessary to provide funding for
8	the 2018 fiscal year to ensure the proper administration of important state
9	functions. Therefore, an emergency is declared to exist, and this act being
10	immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, and
11	safety shall become effective on:
12	(1) The date of its approval by the Governor;
13	(2) If the bill is neither approved nor vetoed by the Governor,
14	the expiration of the period of time during which the Governor may veto the
15	bill; or
16	(3) If the bill is vetoed by the Governor and the veto is
17	overridden, the date the last house overrides the veto.
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
