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30	SECTION 1. Arkansas Code Title 5, Chapter 13, Subchapter 1, is amended
31	to add an additional section to read as follows:
32	<u>5-13-101. Definition.</u>
33	As used in this chapter, "first responder" means a law enforcement
34	officer, firefighter, emergency medical provider, or emergency management
35	official, who is acting within the scope or course of his or her employment.

           (a) A person commits aggravated assault against a first responder if:

     responder by spitting, throwing, or otherwise transferring bodily fluids,
     pathogens, or human waste onto the person of the first responder or by

     throwing an object such as a brick, rock, bottle, projectile, firework,

     chemical agent, or explosive device that a reasonable person knows or should

     know could cause physical injury if the object struck the first responder;

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I	(A) Results in serious physical injury to the first

3	(B) Involves the use of a deadly weapon;

8	(b) Aggravated assault against a first responder is a Class C felony
9	with a mandatory fine of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) and a mandatory
10	minimum sentence of at least ninety (90) days' imprisonment for which the
11	defendant is required to serve at least ninety (90) days before being
12	released from imprisonment.

14	SECTION 4. Arkansas Code § 5-38-203 is amended to read as follows:
15	5-38-203. Criminal mischief in the first degree.
16	(a) A person commits the offense of criminal mischief in the first
17	degree if he or she purposely and without legal justification destroys or
18	causes damage to any:
19	(1) Property of another <u>person</u> ; or
20	(2) Property, whether his or her own or \underline{the} property of another
21	person, for the purpose of collecting any insurance for the property.
22	(b) Criminal mischief in the first degree is a:
23	(1) Class A misdemeanor if the amount of actual damage is one
24	thousand dollars (\$1,000) or less;
25	(2) Class D felony if the amount of actual damage is more than
26	one thousand dollars (\$1,000) but five thousand dollars (\$5,000) or less;
27	(3) Class C felony if the amount of actual damage is more than
28	five thousand dollars (\$5,000) but less than twenty-five thousand dollars
29	(\$25,000); or
30	(4) Class B felony if the amount of actual damage is twenty-five
31	thousand dollars (\$25,000) or more.
32	(c) In an action under this section involving cutting and removing
33	timber from the property of another person:
34	(1) The following create a presumption of a purpose to commit
35	the offense of criminal mischief in the first degree:
36	(A) The failure to obtain the survey as required by § 15-

4	(a) A person commits the offense of riot if, with two (2) or more
5	other persons, he or she knowingly engages in tumultuous or violent conduct
6	that creates a substantial risk of:
7	(1) Causing public alarm;
8	(2) Disrupting the performance of a governmental function; or
9	(3) Damaging or injuring property or a person.
10	(b)(1) Riot is a Class A misdemeanor.
11	(2) A person convicted of riot shall be sentenced to a minimum
12	of thirty (30) days of imprisonment for which the defendant is required to
13	serve at least thirty (30) days before being released from imprisonment and
14	shall be ordered to pay restitution for any physical injury, damage, or loss
15	incurred as a result of the offense.
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17	SECTION 8. Arkansas Code § 5-71-202 is amended to read as follows:
18	5-71-202. Aggravated riot.
19	(a) A person commits the offense of aggravated riot if he or she
20	commits the offense of riot when:
21	(1) The person knowingly possesses a deadly weapon; or
22	(2) The person knows that another person with whom he or she is
23	acting possesses a deadly weapon.
24	(b)(1) Aggravated riot is a Class D felony.
25	(2) A person convicted of aggravated riot shall be sentenced to
26	a minimum of forty-five (45) days' imprisonment and shall be ordered to pay
27	restitution for any physical injury, damage, or loss incurred as a result of
28	the offense.
29	
30	SECTION 9. Arkansas Code § 5-71-203 is amended to read as follows:
31	5-71-203. Inciting riot.
32	(a) A person commits the offense of inciting riot if he or she
33	knowingly:
34	(1) By speech or conduct urges others to participate in a riot
35	under circumstances that produce a clear and present danger that they will
36	participate in a riot: or

1	(2) Gives commands, instructions, or signals to others in
2	furtherance of a riot.
3	
4	(b)(l) Inciting riot is a Class D felony if physical injury to a
5	person or damage to property results from the offense.
6	(2)(A) Otherwise, inciting riot is a Class A misdemeanor.
7	(B) In addition to any other sentence imposed under this
8	section, a person convicted of inciting riot shall be ordered to pay
9	restitution for any physical injury, damage, or loss incurred as a result of
10	the offense.
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12	SECTION 10. Arkansas Code § 5-71-214 is amended to read as follows:
13	5-71-214. Obstructing a highway or other public passage.
14	(a) A person commits the offense of obstructing a highway or other
15	public passage if, having no legal privilege to do so and acting alone or
16	with another person, he or she renders any highway or other public passage
17	impassable to pedestrian or vehicular traffic.
18	(b) It is a defense to a prosecution under this section that:
19	(1) The highway or other public passage was rendered impassable
20	solely because of a gathering of persons to hear the defendant speak or
21	otherwise communicate;
22	(2) The defendant was a member of a gathering contemplated by
23	subdivision (b)(l) of this section; or
24	(3) The highway or public passage obstructed has not been
25	established as a city street, county road, or state or federal highway under
26	the laws of this state and no civil court has established a right of passage
27	by prescription for the highway or public passage.
28	(c) Obstructing a highway or other public passage is a Class $rac{G}{A}$
29	misdemeanor.
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31	SECTION 11. Arkansas Code Title 12, Chapter 12, Subchapter 1, is
32	amended to add an additional section to read as follows:
33	12-12-111. Investigation by Attorney General.
34	(a) The Attorney General may conduct an investigation when the
35	Attorney General receives information sufficient to constitute probable cause
36	to investigate one (1) or more of the following offenses:
