Dolly Parton's Imagination Library

- Dolly Parton's Imagination Library (DPIL) is the world's preeminent early childhood bookgifting program.
- DPIL mails free books to children from birth to age five in participating communities within the United States, United Kingdom, Canada, Australia and Republic of Ireland.
- DPIL delivers 1.4 million books each month to children participating in the program.

Arkansas Imagination Library (ARIL)

- A state 501(c)(3) partner to DPIL formed in July 2017 to support Arkansas children and provide resources to ARIL affiliates across Arkansas.
- Arkansas is one of four states with a state-wide organization.
 - Arkansas (Gov. Hutchinson provided initial funds to start program)
 - North Carolina (2017-2019 state budget \$7 million)
 - <u>Tennessee</u> (Senate Bill 2275 of 2006 Established Governor Books from Birth Fund)
 - Ohio (2019-2021 state budget- \$5 million)

•	Approximately, 39,000 books are delivered each month to Arkansas children enrolled in the program, at no cost to families.


1. Brain Research


- Brain Development 85 percent of the brain is developed between the ages of 3-5.
- Brain Pruning We lose what we don't use.



Three Types of Cultural Capital

Cultural capital exists in three states:

- 1. <u>Embodied</u> (linguistic competence, mannerisms, and cultural knowledge)
- 2. Objectified (cultural goods, paintings, and books)
- 3. Institutionalized (educational credentials)


Books in the Home


- What does the research say about having books in the home?
 - Exposure to books provides significant academic advantages.
 - But the reasons for this are disputed.
- <u>Elite closure</u> theory posits that culture merely signals children's elite status to gatekeepers (schools) who then grant them unfair advantages.
- Scholarly culture theory believes that certain cultural practices provide cognitive skills that improve academic performance, which schools justly reward.




Research

- Evans, Kelley, & Sikora. (2014). Scholarly Culture and Academic Performance in 42 Nations.
- Analyzed both theories using data on academic performance from 42 national samples with 200,144 cases from OECD's PISA.
 - OECD- Organization for Education and Co-operation Development
 - PISA-Program for International Student Assessment
- Found that an essential component of scholarly culture is the number of books in the family home (regardless of the nation's ideology, political history, or country's level of development).
