# **Caseload Report for County Legal Operations: Child Welfare Cases Office of Chief Counsel**

1st Quarter Report, SFY 2017-2018

#### Introduction

The Office of Chief Counsel's County Legal Operations section (CLO) represents the Arkansas Department of Human Services ("the Department") in child welfare and adult protective services cases and appeals from such cases. CLO also represents the Department in administrative hearings involving the placement of individuals on the Arkansas Child Maltreatment Central Registry and the Arkansas Adult Maltreatment Central Registry where the individual challenges the Department's true finding of maltreatment and is represented by an attorney, as well as appeals of administrative hearings to circuit courts and appellate courts.

As part of CLO's representation in child welfare cases, CLO attorneys represent the Department in dependency-neglect cases held before circuit courts across the state. CLO attorneys also provide legal services related to family-in-need-of-services cases where a circuit court orders a juvenile into the custody of the Department or otherwise orders the Department to provide services. The numbers presented in this section include dependency-neglect and family-in-need-of-services cases in which a CLO attorney is involved.

### **CLO Attorneys and Staff**

CLO employs 53 attorneys, 3 legal services specialists, and 28 legal support specialists. The attorneys consist of the Deputy Counsel who manages the CLO section, 1 Assistant Deputy Counsel, 4 attorney supervisors, 2 appellate attorneys, and 45 field attorneys. The Assistant Deputy Counsel is the operational liaison between CLO and the Department's Division of Children and Family Services and Adult Protective Services unit.

The 45 field attorneys are housed with their legal staff in 18 county offices around the state. The 45 field attorneys and their legal staff cover cases in all 75 counties.




#### **Number of Pending Child Welfare Cases**

During the 1st quarter of state fiscal year 2017-2018 (SFY18), the number of child welfare cases decreased from 3,555 to 3,526. This represents a net loss of 29 cases, or 0.81%. The loss corresponds to 549 cases opened, 581 cases closed, and a correction of 23 cases that were confirmed as closed, but not reflected in previous closed-case reports.



Since January 2009, the number of child welfare cases has increased from 3,098 at the end of January 2009 to 3,526 at the end of September 2017, which represents a net gain of 428 cases, or 13.81%. During the same period, the average number of child welfare cases was approximately 3,270. By comparison, the average number of child welfare cases open during the 1st quarter of SFY18 was approximately 3,505.


**N.B.** OCC does not have a comprehensive case management or reporting system. Consequently, OCC began an audit program in August 2016 to hand count each caseload at least once per year to ensure the accuracy of the reported caseload numbers and the consistency of those numbers month-to-month. Since August 2016, the audit reduced the number of reported cases by a net of 166 cases, which explains *Figure 2*'s bend in the number of child welfare cases during SFY17 to date relative to the number of cases opened and closed illustrated in *Figure 3* below.

#### Number of Opened and Closed Child Welfare Cases Per Month

As of the end of the 1st quarter of SFY18, the number of cases opened per month averaged 183.00 and the number of cases closed per month averaged 193.67. The 1st quarter, therefore, had a net average closure of approximately 10.67 cases per month with the number of cases opened ranging from 155 to 200 cases per month and the number of cases closed ranging from 166 to 235 cases per month.

The average number of cases opened during the 1st quarter of SFY18 was roughly consistent with the average number of cases opened from January 2009 to September 2017, but the average number of cases closed during the 1st quarter of SFY18 was substantially higher than the average number of cases closed from January 2009 to September 2017.

Specifically, the average number of cases opened during the 1st quarter of SFY18 (183.00) was 1.02% higher than than the average number of cases opened from January 2009 to September 2017 (181.16). The average number of cases closed during the 1st quarter of SFY18 (193.67) was 9.94% higher than the average number of cases closed from January 2009 to September 2017 (176.16).



Although the available data do not yet support any conclusions to explain the changes in the number of opened and closed cases from January 2009 to September 2017, the data is helpful in describing the nature of the changes in the number of child welfare cases that have occurred over time.

For example, the average numbers of opened and closed cases during the 1st quarter of SFY18 are particularly helpful when compared to the averages during two specific preceding periods: (1) the period from December 2014 to September 2016 during which CLO experienced 21 months of nearly uninterrupted growth in the total number of child welfare cases ("the sustained-growth period"), and (2) the period from October 2016 to June 2017 during which CLO experienced 9 months of nearly uninterrupted decline in the total number of child welfare cases ("the sustained-decrease decline").



Comparing the Sustained-growth and Sustained-decline Periods to the 1st Quarter of SFY18.

The average number of cases opened and closed from December 2014 to September 2016 was substantially higher than the average number of cases opened and closed during the 1st quarter of SFY18. Specifically, the average number of cases opened from December 2014 to September 2016 (208.23) was 13.79% higher than the average number of cases opened during the 1st quarter of SFY18 (183.00). Likewise, the average number of cases closed from December 2014 to September 2016 (171.27) was 11.57% lower than the average number of cases closed during the 1st quarter of SFY18 (193.67).

The average number of cases opened and closed from October 2016 to June 2017 was also higher than the average number of cases opened and closed during the 1st quarter of SFY18. Specifically, the average number of cases opened from October 2016 to June 2017 (198.67) was 8.56% higher than the average number of cases opened during the 1st quarter of SFY18 (183.00). Likewise, the average number of cases closed from October 2016 to June 2017 (203.56) was 5.11% higher than the average number of cases opened during the 1st quarter of SFY18 (193.67).



Comparing the Sustained-decline Period to the Sustained-growth Period.

The average number of cases opened from October 2016 to June 2017 was lower than the average number of cases opened from December 2014 to September 2016 while the average number of cases closed from October 2016 to June 2017 was substantially higher than the average number of cases closed from December 2014 to September 2016. Specifically, the average number of cases opened from

October 2016 to June 2017 (198.67) was 4.59% lower than the average number of cases opened from December 2014 to September 2016 (208.23). By contrast, the average number of cases closed from October 2016 to June 2017 (203.56) was 18.85% higher than the average number of cases closed from December 2014 to September 2016 (171.27).



Comparing the 1st Quarter of SFY18 to the Sustained-growth and Sustained-decline Periods.

The average number of cases opened during the 1st quarter of SFY18 was lower than the average number of cases opened from October 2016 to June 2017 and the average number of cases opened from December 2014 to September 2016. Specifically, the average number of cases opened during the 1st quarter of SFY18 (183.00) was 7.89% lower than the average number of cases opened from October 2016 to June 2017 (198.67) and 12.12% lower than the average number of cases opened from December 2014 to September 2016 (208.23).

The average number of cases closed during the 1st quarter of SFY18 was lower than the average number of cases closed from October 2016 to June 2017, but substantially higher than the average number of cases closed from December 2014 to September 2016. Specifically, the average number of cases closed during the 1st quarter of SFY18 (193.67) was 4.86% lower than the average number of cases closed from October 2016 to June 2017 (203.56) and 13.08% higher than the average number of cases closed from December 2014 to September 2016 (171.27).
