




Mission

The mission of the Arkansas Infant and Child Death Review (ICDR) Program is to:

- improve the response to infant and child fatalities - In Order To...
- provide accurate information on how and why Arkansas' children are dying - So That We
- reduce the number of preventable infant and child deaths



Goals

- Accurate identification and uniform reporting of unexpected child deaths
- Improved child death investigation systems
- Improved services for families and communities
- Improved understanding of risk and protective factors associated with child deaths
- Improved legislation, policy and practice to prevent child deaths
- Improved () health and safety

Local ICDR Teams

Teams consist of representatives from the following core agencies and disciplines:

- Arkansas State Police: Crimes Against Children Division
- Arkansas Department of Human Services:
 Division of Children and Family Services
- Emergency Medical Services
- Law Enforcement
- Medical Examiner/Coroner
- Pediatrician/Nurse (with specialized training)
- Prosecuting Attorney
- Public Health
- Injury Prevention Specialist

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 Consist of representatives from multiple counties

Multi-County Teams

- Team members have some areas of jurisdiction or responsibility in common
- Information received from the professionals directly involved
- Allows strengthening of relationships with the various local agencies
- Team members live in the communities where these deaths occur and have a vested interest
