

Arkansas Poultry Highlights, 2010/2011

Arkansas: Cash receipts from farm marketings for livestock and livestock products, at \$4.42 billion, comprised 57% of the state's total agricultural receipts in 2010. Poultry was the largest agricultural product produced in Arkansas in terms of cash receipts, providing 47 percent of the total in 2010. Of the poultry cash receipts, broilers were the largest of the Arkansas poultry products, providing 37 percent of the state's total agricultural cash receipts and 80 percent of the total cash receipts from poultry and poultry products in Arkansas, at \$2.86 billion.

Typically, about 6 billion pounds of broiler meat (live weight) is produced in Arkansas each year. In exact terms, Arkansas producers produced 5.86 billion pounds in 2011 compared to 5.94 billion in 2010. Arkansas ranked second in the nation in broiler production, behind Georgia, with 1.03 billion birds produced. The value of production for broilers during 2011 was \$2.73 billion, down \$133 million from \$2.86 billion in 2010. Broiler chicks hatched in 2011 numbered 964 million, down 8 percent from the previous year. Arkansas ranked in the top five nationally in value of production for commercial broilers and commercial turkeys and in the top ten nationally in value of production for all eggs for the 2011 production year.

Census: According to the 2007 Census of Agriculture, a total of 6,089 farms in Arkansas produced some type of poultry in 2007. Census data showed that 3,047 farms produced layers, 530 produced turkeys, and 2,408 farms produced broilers. Washington County is the largest broiler-producing county with 20.5 million birds, followed closely by Benton County with 20.4 million birds. The other top producing counties are Yell, Hempstead, Howard, and Carroll Counties, in rank order, and all had over 8 million birds.

U.S.: The value of U.S. broilers produced during 2011 was \$23.2 billion, down 2 percent from \$23.7 billion in 2010. The total number of broilers produced in 2011 was 8.61 billion, down slightly from 2010. The total amount of live weight

broilers produced in 2011 was 49.7 billion pounds, up 1 percent from 2010. Broiler-type chicks hatched during 2011 totaled 9.06 billion, down 2 percent from 2010. Leading U.S. breeders had intended placements of 82.8 million broiler-type pullet chicks for future domestic hatchery supply flocks during 2011, down 3 percent from 2010.






Value of Production: National Rank by Pounds Produced and Value of Commercial Broilers, 2011








Cash Receipts from Arkansas Farm Marketings: Livestock Items, Arkansas, 2010, Percent of Total (Total = \$4,415,935,000)




Value of Livestock Production: Major Livestock Items, Arkansas, 2010-2011, Million Dollars (\$1,000,000)




Value of Production: Broilers, Eggs, Turkeys, Chickens And Total, United States, 2002-2011, Billion Dollars (\$1,000,000,000)






