OUR MISSION

The mission of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary is to equip leaders to fulfill the Great Commission and the Great Commandments through the local church and its ministries.

ACCREDITATION

New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary is accredited by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools in Decatur, Georgia.

The New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary - Leavell College - <u>L.S.P. Joan Horner Center Campus</u> is found within the Louisiana State Penitentiary at Angola, Louisiana. The students are offenders incarcerated in the Louisiana Department of Corrections.

EXTENSION CENTERS of NEW ORLEANS BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary began undergraduate extension center work in 1978. The Extension Center System is a vital part of the undergraduate educational program of the Seminary. They maintain seventeen undergraduate centers throughout the southeastern United States. Additionally, N.O.B.T.S., in 1995, established an extension center within the maximum security compound of the Louisiana State Penitentiary at Angola, Louisiana. The Extension Center System Office is on the seminary's campus in New Orleans, LA. The current Dean (Dr. Norris Grubbs) serves as Associate Dean of the Extension Center System.

The purpose of the extension centers is to fulfill the purpose of the Seminary by providing a program of quality theological and practical education in the extension centers.

The extension center program is organized on the semester system. Courses extend over a sixteen-week semester and carry one, two, and three semester hours of academic credit. Students may enroll at the beginning of any semester. The Louisiana State Penitentiary - Joan Horner Center offers an Associate in Christian Ministries degree and a Bachelor of Arts in Christian Ministry degree. Also, N.O.B.T.S. recognizes a one year certificate program and is being taught by the Louisiana State Penitentiary graduates under the supervision of the Joan Horner Center Director.

History and Organization of L.S.P. Extension Center

The New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary (N.O.B.T.S.) began classes on September 11, 1995, in Louisiana State Penitentiary (L.S.P.) at Angola, Louisiana. Warden Cain evaluated a prison population with 5,100 offenders; eighty-five percent of these convicted felons would die during incarceration, because the sentences were mostly life or its equivalent for the prisoners. The institution had been under federal court supervision for more than twenty years because of the attempted escapes, suicides, attempted suicides, acts of violence between offenders, and assaults upon the employees by offenders. L.S.P. had been known as the "bloodiest prison in the nation" and the reason stemmed from a lack of hope.

Warden Cain shared his evaluation and his vision with Dr. George Roundtree and Rev. T.W. Terral, Director of Missions for the Judson Baptist Association located in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. Dr. Terral contacted Dr. Landrum P. Leavell, President of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, and Dr. Jimmy Dukes, Dean of the N.O.B.T.S. Extension Center System. These Christian administrators planned and organized an extension center for N.O.B.T.S. at Angola. When Dr. Charles "Chuck" Kelley became President of N.O.B.T.S., he strongly encouraged the development of Louisiana State Penitentiary Extension Center and has remained an ardent advocate of the program. The school's first, and only Director until January 1st, 2016, Dr. John H. Robson, was hired in the first semester. In January 2010, the school began its fifteenth year.

Formal Mission Statement of L.S.P. Extension Center:

The specific purpose of the N.O.B.T.S. Extension Center at L.S.P. is to prepare offender leaders to evangelize their peers within all areas of the prison, and other institutions of the Louisiana Department of Corrections. The Seminary mission focus is not merely to get an education or to give one. It is to educate church leaders. The focus is to change the world by fulfilling the Great Commission and the Great Commandments through the local church and its ministry. The specific reason that Angola can have an extension center from N.O.B.T.S. is that of the local churches within the prison. Only because there are established offender churches within the institution was the Seminary willing to allow an extension center. Otherwise, the mission statement of N.O.B.T.S. could not be met within the prison.

N.O.B.T.S. Inmate Minister Mission Statement

The mission of an N.O.B.T.S. Inmate Minister is to win unbelievers to Jesus and to equip believers to fulfill the Great Commission and the Great Commandments through the local church and its ministry.

Goals and Objectives:

Specific goals and objectives include developing an Inmate Ministry Program that can supplement the Chaplain's Department by providing additional discipleship training, new church starts, one on one ministry, counseling, and Christian growth within the prison environment that will nurture hope and cultivate peace in all areas of the institution. Additionally, our graduates are to nurture healthy churches for the offender population.

Measurement of Success:

The Inmate Ministry Program has spread out over the 18,000 acres of Angola, with interns being mentored by the graduates. Their duties include assistance with delivering death messages to the offender population, counseling their peers who have received notice of the death of a loved one, one on one witnessing to their peers in cells, dorms, recreation yards, treatment center, and every other area of the prison from minimum to maximum security offender living quarters. The Inmate Ministers are allowed to teach, preach, administer the church ordinances of baptism and The Lord's Supper, conduct worship services, prayer meetings, Bible studies, help with offender funerals when the offender is buried on L.S.P. property, do clerk work and other duties of the Chaplain's Department under the supervision of a chaplain, participate in choirs, and organize their own churches under the guidelines and regulations of the Department of Corrections.

The Louisiana Department of Corrections has implemented a missionary program designed to take Louisiana State Penitentiary Extension Center graduates and use them in DOC prison facilities throughout the state. These inmate missionaries work under the direction and supervision of the chaplains in each facility to enhance the religious programs for the offender population. The graduates develop and facilitate faith-based discipleship training courses and assist the chaplains with worship services, prayer meetings, Bible studies, one on one ministry visitations, and other duties designated by supervising chaplains.

The program addresses specific offender problems and needs while operating within the American Correctional Association (A.C.A.) policies, principles, and the departmental regulations, rules, guidelines, and directives. They live under the same conditions and supervision as those peers to whom they minister on a daily basis. Most important is the fact that they are accepted and recognized by their peers as religious leaders who can provide spiritual needs and instill the hope required to maintain peace and tranquility within the prison environment.

Other measures of success include a noticeable increase in church attendance and church activities, Bible studies, baptisms by inmate ministers, while there is a significant decrease in offender complaints, grievances, confrontations, attempted suicides and escapes, violence, disciplinary problems, and moral problems. The Louisiana State Penitentiary has been released from federal court supervision after maintaining accreditation from the A.C.A. for several years.

Financial Success:

The entire program has been sponsored and financed by the Greater Baton Rouge Baptist Association, the Louisiana Baptist Convention, the New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, with donations from the offender students and various offender organizations and clubs. The institution has only provided classroom space for the students and maintained security supervision of the program.

Program Impact:

While evaluating is in the early stages of the impact the program can have on reducing the offender rate of return, faith-based programs in other states have proven to reduce the recidivism rate significantly. Louisiana has established legislation to monitor faith-based programs and they are now compiling statistics to study this and other programs for their impact on recidivism. The impact on prison violence and conduct of the offenders has been notable with prison violence reduced 74%. Disciplinary actions are significantly reduced and attendance for religious functions has greatly increased.

The program definitely increases the offenders' educational levels by providing college degrees to the offenders who enroll in the program. This is an ongoing program with continuous participation opportunities as graduation and completion by the current students provide openings.

While the mission of the program is to educate and prepare the participants to evangelize their peers within the prison environment, it certainly does increase the marketability for employment of offenders once released. It provides a college degree which can be used in various employment opportunities, including pastoring, counseling, teaching, or other job skills.

Participants in the program will increase their cognitive and life skills. They can use the education to change their own moral and spiritual values. It will increase their ability to make positive decisions in negative situations. It will certainly enhance their chances of remaining law abiding citizens in society.

Family members have been integrated into the program by invitation to the graduation ceremonies, attendance in worship services and faith-based programs, and through individual visitation, correspondence, and other means of communication with the participants. Family members have experienced the changes the program has made in their loved one. Families have been reconciled with their offender members through the results seen in the individual changes caused by the program.
