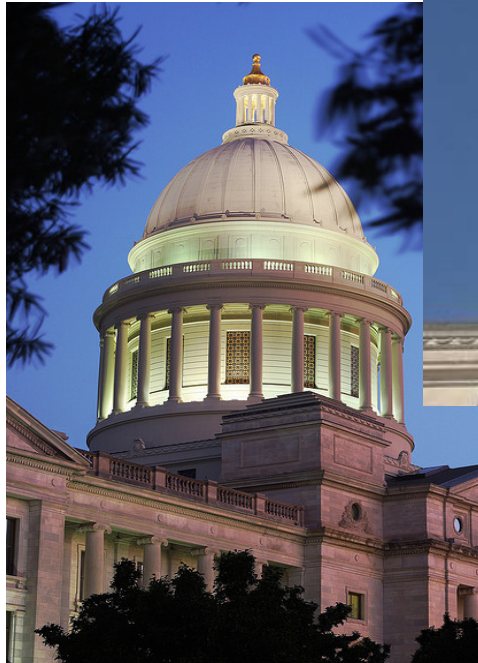

 For the Year Ended June 30, 2015

This report is issued under the authority of Ark. Code Ann. §10-3-2102(f)(1). Specifically, the report has been prepared from data contained in the Arkansas Administrative Statewide Information System (AASIS) and provides an overview of education grant funds disbursed to school districts and others. The information contained in the report has not been audited. The methodology used in summarizing this report was uniquely developed to provide the required report to the Arkansas General Assembly and, therefore, is more limited in scope than an audit or attestation engagement performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

The attachments in this report provide listings of the recipients of the various programs funded through the Arkansas Department of Education (ADE) during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2015. Attachments are organized by classification of recipient (school district, charter school, etc.). Within each attachment, funding is further identified by program. Also included in this report are brief descriptions of programs and resources used to fund education in Arkansas. Grants disbursed from ADE for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2015, are summarized below.

#### **ADDITIONAL PUBLIC SCHOOL EMPLOYEE HEALTH INSURANCE**

This appropriation allowed the Department of Education (ADE) to pay up to \$15 million in additional health insurance contributions for eligible employees electing to participate in the public school employees' health insurance program administered by the State and Public School Life and Health Insurance Board. ADE is authorized to make these payments if 98% of the uniform rate of tax used in the calculation of State Foundation Funding Aid exceeds \$920,731,819.

#### **ADVANCED PLACEMENT INCENTIVE**

The Advanced Placement (AP) Incentive program provided support to establish AP courses that are easily accessible and prepare students for admission to and success in a postsecondary educational environment. AP courses and exams provide high school students the opportunity to earn credit at most colleges and universities. The program paid for professional development support for AP and Pre-AP teachers. AP courses were awarded one-time only grants of up to \$1,000 for equipment and materials.

#### **ALTERNATIVE LEARNING**

School districts were required to provide an alternative learning environment (ALE) for students who demonstrated an inability to function in the standard learning environment. The ALE program provided educational programs to eligible students in alternative classroom settings, as well as additional services to meet the needs of this group of at-risk students. The Department of Education (ADE) calculated ALE funds in the 2014-2015 school year by multiplying \$4,383 by the number of identified ALE students enrolled during the previous school year, pursuant to Arkansas law and ADE rules.

#### **ARKANSAS LEADERSHIP ACADEMY AND MASTER PRINCIPAL BONUS**

The Arkansas Leadership Academy was formed in 1991 to provide leadership for education reform in Arkansas. The Academy brings together partners from businesses, institutions of higher education, professional associations, educational cooperatives, and governmental agencies. It provided a variety of leadership development programs for principals, teachers, partners, and other leaders, including year-long residential programs.

Principals who achieve Master Principal status through the Arkansas Leadership Academy are eligible for incentive bonuses. Pursuant to Ark. Code Ann. § 6-17-1603, a \$9,000 bonus is paid annually for five years to principals who serve as a full-time principal in an Arkansas public school district. An annual bonus of \$25,000 is calculated and distributed to full-time principals who serve at a "high-need" public school district, as allowed by Ark. Code Ann. § 6-17-1604.

#### **ASSESSMENT/END OF LEVEL TESTING**

This program funded grants to develop and implement alternative assessments required by No Child Left Behind, End-of-Course Exams, and Augmented Benchmark Exams. It also paid the College Entrance Examination Board for the cost of Advanced Placement exams, and provided school districts with \$50 per score as incentive money for Advanced Placement test scores of 3 or above. It also provided a grant to the University of Arkansas for research in innovative education, educator evaluation, student assessment, and public school accountability.

#### **AT RISK**

The College and Career Readiness Planning Program (CCRPP) is funded from the At Risk appropriation. The program provided remedial instruction during the summer for students entering grades 11 and 12 whose scores on the American College Test (ACT) were below 19 in the areas of reading and/or mathematics. The students were provided 75 hours of instruction over a minimum of 20 days. At the conclusion of the program, students were given the opportunity to take the ACT, and the test cost was covered by the program. This was a special administration of the ACT for students who have successfully completed the CCRPP program.

#### **BETTER CHANCE GRANTS**

Better Chance Grants were administered by the Division of Child Care and Early Childhood Education of the Department of Human Services to serve educationally-deprived children ages birth through 5 years, excluding those enrolled in kindergarten. Within the Arkansas Better Chance Program is the Arkansas Better Chance for School Success Program, which funds innovative and developmentally-appropriate early childhood programs for educationally-deprived children ages 3 and 4. For the 2014-2015 school year, the distribution of funds was based on \$4,860 per child for classroom-based programs and \$1,750 per child for home-visit programs.

### **BONDED DEBT ASSISTANCE**

This aid, formerly known as Debt Service Funding Supplement, was provided to school districts to offset a portion of the existing debt burden incurred and to increase the amount of local revenue available for the maintenance and operation of schools. Bonded Debt Assistance funds are to be used for the payment of bonded debt.

Pursuant to Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-2503, the following calculation, which was based on a school district's Principal and Interest Payment Schedule in effect and on file with the Department of Education (ADE) on January 1, 2005, was used to determine Bonded Debt Assistance. Each eligible district's annual debt service payment was reduced by 10%. If a district demonstrated to the Commission for Arkansas Public School Academic Facilities and Transportation (Commission) that all or a portion of the 10% reduction in its scheduled debt payment was attributable to the support of academic facilities, the Commission reversed all or a portion of the 10% reduction by a percentage proportionate to the amount attributable to academic facilities. The remaining 90% (or greater if a percentage was reversed) of the principal and interest payment was divided by the total assessed value of the district and multiplied by 1,000 to calculate the required debt service mills. This product was multiplied by the State Wealth Index, multiplied by the prior-year three-quarter Average Daily Membership, and multiplied by a funding factor of \$18.03.

These funds were paid on or before August 1 and February 1 of each year. If a district qualified for Bonded Debt Assistance, the amount of aid was not changed as a result of refunding outstanding bonds in effect and on file with ADE on January 1, 2005. As the amount of state financial assistance decreases due to reductions in principal and interest payments, bond payoff, and increases in property assessments, the Commission distributes savings to the Educational Facilities Partnership Fund (EFP), in accordance with rules promulgated by the Commission.

### **BROADBAND FACILITIES MATCHING GRANT PROGRAM**

This program was funded by a one-time transfer from the State General Improvement Fund to the Department of Education Public School Fund. The funds were leveraged at the district level for up to an additional \$20 million in E-rate funding for local loop/WAN (Wide Area Network) connectivity.

### **CONSOLIDATION INCENTIVE**

These funds were paid to each school district that was administratively consolidated or annexed by the State Board of Education, pursuant to Ark. Code Ann. §§ 6-11-105, 6-13-1401, and applicable rules of the State Board of Education. Of the incentive allowance, 100% shall be added to the district's aid in the first year of consolidation/annexation. In the second year of consolidation/annexation, the district shall receive 50% of the consolidation/annexation incentive funding granted the previous year, in addition to other state aid.

### **CONTENT STANDARDS CURRICULUM FRAMEWORKS**

Act 1706 of 2003 grants appropriation for expenses associated with the development of a comprehensive plan to revise content standards and curriculum frameworks in the core academic areas of reading, writing, mathematics, science, history, geography, and civics.

### **CONTENT STANDARDS REVISION**

This program is for the associated cost of the periodic review and revision of Academic Content Standards as required by Ark. Code Ann. § 6-15-404(c). Academic Content Standards are documents that specify what a student enrolled in a public school should know and be able to do. The Academic Content Standards also provide the foundation for the development of the State's assessment system.

### **COOPERATIVE EDUCATION TECHNICAL CENTERS OPERATIONS**

Technology Coordinators in the education service cooperatives assisted local school districts by providing technology training, advising districts in software/hardware purchases, and overseeing technology laboratories. The maximum amount of funds available to each of the State's 15 education service cooperatives and a central Arkansas district was set by the State Board of Education. For the 2014-2015 school year, the maximum amount was \$75,000.

### **COORDINATED SCHOOL HEALTH**

The Coordinated School Health model consisted of eight interactive components to connect health and academics, based on the idea that schools by themselves cannot and should not be expected to address the nation's most serious health and social problems. This model brought together families, health care workers, media, religious organizations, community organizations that serve youth, and young people. The schools provided the crucial facility in which many agencies might work together to maintain the well-being of young people. These funds were received from the Arkansas Department of Health.

### **COURT ORDERED DESEGREGATION**

Funds were disbursed by the Department of Education for desegregation expenses as required by court-ordered settlement agreements.

### **DECLINING ENROLLMENT**

This program provided additional funding to school districts with a prior-year Average Daily Membership (ADM) that was less than the ADM of the year prior to the previous year. Funding was equal to the difference between the average of the ADM for the two immediately preceding years and the ADM for the previous school year multiplied by \$6,521, the amount of foundation funding per student for 2014-2015. Districts cannot receive both declining enrollment funding and student growth funding for the same school year. Generally, districts cannot receive both declining enrollment funding and special needs isolated funding. However, any appropriated and available funds for declining enrollment that remained after the initial distributions shall be prorated and distributed equally to districts that qualified for both declining enrollment funding and special needs isolated funding. No declining enrollment funds were reallocated in 2014-2015 after the initial distributions.

### **DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION SCHOOL SYSTEM**

Ark. Code Ann. §§ 12-29-301 – 12-29-305 established the Corrections School System and provided that the cost of running the Corrections School System shall be borne by the Department of Correction, the Department of Community Correction, and the Department of Education.

### **DISTANCE LEARNING**

Distance learning is an educational process used to provide instruction to Arkansas students. The primary purpose of providing distance learning technologies is to assist school districts in offering students advanced high school courses, Advanced Placement courses, enriched course content, STEM courses, IT academies, or other academic courses not otherwise available in the district.

### **EARLY CHILDHOOD SPECIAL EDUCATION**

This program provided special education services to preschool children ages 3 to 5 with disabilities. This program also serves as state Medicaid match for physical, occupational, and speech therapy services. A portion of the appropriation was used to provide partial reimbursement for 16 Early Childhood Coordinators and certain other program coordination costs.

### **EASTER SEALS**

This program funded the cost of educational services provided by Easter Seals to children ages 3 to 21 who have orthopedic and/or communicative disorders. This funding reduced the amount that local school districts had to pay for these educational services and also qualified the facility as “state-supported” so that federal funds were available to further reduce the cost of services to local districts.

### **ECONOMIC EDUCATION**

The objective of this program was to increase the economic literacy of students in grades pre-K through 12 by providing economic and personal finance education and training to teachers. Funding was distributed to the Arkansas Council on Economic Education (now conducting business as Economics Arkansas), a private, nonprofit organization providing certified professional development for teachers of grades K through 12.

### **EDUCATION RENEWAL ZONES**

The Arkansas Education Renewal Zones (ERZ) program is a state initiative to identify and implement educational and management strategies to improve public school performance and student academic achievement. Through this initiative, regionalized ERZs facilitated collaboration among Arkansas’s schools, especially smaller schools, while helping to concentrate and coordinate resources of institutions of higher education, regional education service cooperatives, and other service providers.

### **EDUCATION SERVICE COOPERATIVES**

The 15 education service cooperatives around the State facilitated sharing of resources and services between local school districts and provided a core support system for professional development.

### **ENGLISH LANGUAGE LEARNERS**

This program served school districts with language minority students assessed as limited in their English proficiency. Most of these students were at the beginning stages of acquiring English. Funding of \$317 per identified current year ELL student was provided to assist with securing specially-trained staff, instructional materials, and/or training.

### **GENERAL FACILITIES FUNDING**

These funds were distributed in accordance with Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-2503(e), as amended by Act 1 of the First Extraordinary Session of 2013. Beginning in fiscal year 2005-2006, school districts received all or a portion of the amount of General Facilities Funding that the district received or would have received under the Supplemental School District Funding Act of 2003 in fiscal year 2004-2005. After fiscal year 2005-2006, this funding began to be phased out through a reduction of the amount a district received by one-tenth of the 2005-2006 amount each year over a 10-year period. The savings were distributed to the Employee Benefits Division of the Department of Finance and Administration for the exclusive benefit of public school employees participating in the State and Public School Life and Health Insurance Program. Fiscal year 2014-2015 was the final year for the distribution of General Facilities Funding to school districts.

**GIFTED AND TALENTED**

This program provided salary support for gifted and talented supervisors in the education service cooperatives, a contribution to Hendrix College for hosting the Arkansas Governor's School, awards for winners of the Outstanding Gifted and Talented Award Program, and other contributions.

**GRANTS TO SCHOOL DISTRICTS**

This payment was made to reimburse the Ozark Mountain School District for the cost of educating students in northern Arkansas who could not reach their assigned district because Bull Shoals Lake separated them from their district. Reaching their assigned district would require a round trip of more than 35 miles.

**HIGH PRIORITY DISTRICT TEACHER RECRUITMENT AND RETENTION**

As authorized by Ark. Code Ann. § 6-17-811, these grants provided teacher bonuses as incentives for recruitment and retention in high-priority districts. A "high-priority district" was defined as one having at least 80% of students receiving free or reduced lunches and 1,000 or fewer students. "Teachers" were defined as those working directly with students in a classroom setting 70% of the time, including guidance counselors and librarians.

For all newly-signed teachers to high-priority districts, a one-time signing bonus of \$5,000 was paid at the completion of a full year of teaching, and a \$4,000 retention bonus was paid at the end of each of the next two subsequent years if the teacher continued teaching in the same high-priority district. A newly-signed teacher was also eligible for a \$3,000 retention bonus, paid at the end of the fourth and each subsequent year, if the teacher continued teaching in the same high-priority district or another high-priority district. For all teachers not newly-signed to work in the district, a \$3,000 retention bonus was paid at the end of each year if the teacher continued to work in a high-priority district.

**HOME SCHOOL TESTING**

This program paid for the administration of norm-referenced achievement tests for home school students, as required by Ark. Code Ann. § 6-15-504.

**HUMAN DEVELOPMENT CENTER EDUCATION AID**

This program provided funding for educational services for children in the State's Human Development Centers. Act 293 of 2014 appropriated \$526,150, which was fully disbursed to the Department of Human Services.

**INTERNATIONAL BACCALUREATE**

This program provided easily accessible advanced educational courses to prepare students for admission to and success in a postsecondary educational environment. A mandatory funding provision provides \$75,000 annually to school districts for the International Baccalaureate Program.

**INTERVENTION BLOCK GRANTS**

Local school districts, education service cooperatives, institutions of higher education, and other organizations were eligible to apply for an intervention block grant. These grants were used to encourage parental involvement through the following student competitions: Arkansas Governor's Quiz Bowl, State History Day Competition, Creativity in Arkansas, Destination Imagination, and regional and state science fairs.

**ISOLATED FUNDING**

Because of location, density, or geographical barriers, some school districts contain areas that are not able to share resources or have unusual transportation needs. Districts that contained such areas received additional funding. Isolated funding was provided in the 2014-2015 school year in accordance with Ark. Code Ann. §§ 6-20-601 – 6-20-603.

**NATIONAL BOARD OF PROFESSIONAL TEACHING STANDARDS**

This program encouraged teachers to seek certification by the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards by competitively awarding the \$2,500 application fee and up to three days of substitute teacher pay. A \$5,000 initial bonus was awarded during the school year in which the individual first obtained the National Board certification, and a yearly bonus of \$5,000 was awarded to certified teachers in each of years 2 through 10 of the 10-year life of the certificate. Funding was also distributed to designated candidate "support centers" at various school districts, education service cooperatives, or institutions of higher education to assist candidates with the National Board certification process. Support center location funding was based on candidate distribution throughout the State. If teachers do not achieve certification during the required three years, they must refund all state monies expended on their behalf.

#### **NATIONAL SCHOOL LUNCH STUDENT FUNDING**

This program provided state categorical funding for students from low socioeconomic backgrounds, as indicated by prior-year eligibility for free or reduced-price meals under the National School Lunch (NSL) Act, as reported on October 1 of each year and submitted to the Department of Education.

For the 2014-2015 school year, NSL funding was \$1,549 per free and reduced student for districts with free and reduced lunch percentage of 90% or greater, \$1,033 for percentages of 70% up to 89%, and \$517 for percentages below 70%. For school districts that were to receive funding based on a different per student amount than the preceding school year due to a percentage change in free and reduced lunch students, funding would be increased or decreased in each year of a three-year transition period by one-third of the difference between the amount of funding per student for the current year and the prior year, adjusted for changes in rates. A district that experienced significant growth, defined by rule as 1%, in enrolled students in each of the previous three years would receive funding for the expected increase in the number of NSL students based on the three-year average growth in enrollment multiplied by the percentage of students eligible for NSL funding multiplied by the appropriate per-student funding amount.

#### **NON-TRADITIONAL LICENSURE GRANTS**

The Non-Traditional Licensure Program (NTLP), which is now known as the Arkansas Professional Pathway to Educator Licensure (APPEL), is a “teaching and learning” teacher licensure program for those with a college degree in areas other than education. This program was developed by the General Assembly to address teacher shortages in critical parts of the State. Recognizing that professionals' experience, knowledge, and previous career successes can positively impact students' lives, APPEL allows mature career changers, with a variety of work experiences, to teach in public school classrooms. For the 2014-2015 school year, APPEL teachers received up to \$500 for teaching in geographical and/or subject areas with critical teacher shortages.

#### **PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT FUNDING**

This program provided a coordinated set of planned learning activities for teachers and administrators that were standards-based. These programs should have resulted in individual, school-wide, and system-wide improvements designed to ensure that all students demonstrate proficiency in state academic standards. For the 2014-2015 school year, Professional Development Funding for a school district was up to \$32.40 multiplied by the district's Average Daily Membership. For fiscal year 2014-2015, after removing professional development funding for state-wide programs, school districts were provided \$26.67 per prior-year three-quarter Average Daily Membership.

#### **PUBLIC SCHOOL EMPLOYEE INSURANCE**

This program paid the Employee Benefits Division (EBD) of the Department of Finance and Administration the monthly health insurance contribution rate of \$150 per employee, as established by Ark. Code Ann. § 6-17-1117, for employees of education service cooperatives, vocational centers, and the school operated by the Department of Correction. (The required contributions for employees of school districts were paid to EBD by the school districts.)

#### **RESIDENTIAL CENTERS/JUVENILE DETENTION**

Funds were disbursed to school districts for educational costs of school-age students without disabilities and students with disabilities ages 3 through 21 in approved residential psychiatric and drug/alcohol treatment facilities or juvenile detention centers. Reimbursement for juvenile detention centers was calculated at the rate of foundation funding multiplied by the number of approved beds. Reimbursement for residential facilities was made at a daily rate (\$60) established by ADE. When reimbursement requests exceeded funds available, reimbursements were prorated.

#### **SCHOOL FACILITY JOINT USE SUPPORT**

The School Facility Joint Use Support program was created as a part of the Health Care Initiative of 2009. Funding was provided by General Revenue generated by a cigarette tax increase enacted during the Regular Session of the 87<sup>th</sup> General Assembly. The intent of the program was to encourage schools to allow their facilities, both indoor and outdoor, to be used by the public and the community as accessible and safe environments for community and family activity.

#### **SCHOOL FOOD SERVICES**

This program, combined with the Surplus Commodities program, provided the state match for the total school food program in local schools. These grants were paid to school districts at a rate based on the number of lunches served.

#### **SCHOOL RECOGNITION PROGRAM**

This program provided financial awards to public schools that experienced high student performance and those with high student academic growth.

#### **SERIOUS OFFENDER PROGRAM**

The Department of Education provided funds to the Department of Human Services through a Memorandum of Understanding with the Division of Youth Services. The current program has been in effect since 1996 for the purpose of generating educational funds for the Juvenile Treatment Centers Program. School districts were provided state funds based on the number of JTC participants in their districts. In turn, districts paid the JTC providers in their districts.



### **SMART START/SMART STEP**

The Smart Start program focuses on improving student academic achievement in grades K through 4 in the areas of reading and mathematics. Since its inception in 2000, this program has been expanded to include Smart Step and Smart Future, which cover grades 5 through 12. These programs were administered through a network of literacy, mathematics, and science specialists who assisted schools with professional development through on-site technical support, regional workshops, statewide conferences, and the internet. Funds also provided support for New Tech High Schools, which are part of the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) Initiative. The Office of Intensive Support and the Kuder career assessment tool were also funded through this appropriation.

### **SPECIAL EDUCATION – CATASTROPHIC OCCURRENCES**

This program assisted school districts with special education students who required extraordinary support services such as full-time registered nurses or elaborate assistive technology. The special education and related services these students required were unduly expensive, extraordinary, or beyond the routine costs associated with special education. Reimbursements from this program could be sought only after eligible costs for the child equaled or exceeded \$30,000 and Medicaid, federal Title VI-B, and available third-party funds were applied to the catastrophic occurrence.

### **SPECIAL EDUCATION SERVICES**

This program provided (1) funding to support the provision of Extended School Year (ESY) services to eligible students with disabilities in need of such services, (2) special education services to children with disabilities who were wards of the State placed by the Department of Human Services in out-of-state therapeutic treatment programs, and (3) funding to support the payment of salaries to special education supervisors. For the 2014-2015 school year, funding was provided to school districts to support the salaries of special education supervisors based on the Average Daily Membership of the first three quarters of the previous year. In addition, funding was provided to school districts and education service cooperatives for ESY services.

### **SPECIAL NEEDS ISOLATED FUNDING**

This program provided additional funding to school districts that contained isolated school areas and school districts that met criteria for small school district funding. As stipulated in Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-604, school districts containing isolated school areas had to meet certain eligibility requirements, including involvement in a consolidation or annexation, low student density ratios, and certain Average Daily Membership levels. Pursuant to Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-604(h), any funds appropriated for isolated funding and/or special needs isolated funding that remained after the initial distributions were equally divided and distributed among districts that received isolated special needs funding other than small school district funding to be used for transportation costs of isolated school areas.

### **STATE FOUNDATION FUNDING AID**

For the 2014-2015 school year, State Foundation Funding Aid was computed as the difference between the foundation funding amount per student of \$6,521, established by the General Assembly pursuant to Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-2305(a)(2), multiplied by the school district's Average Daily Membership (ADM) for the previous school year, and the sum of 98% of the Uniform Rate of Tax multiplied by the property assessment of the district plus the calculated average miscellaneous funds of the district. The funding for charter schools used the same amount of per student foundation funding but used the ADM of the prior or current school year as required by law. A total of \$1,929,707,193 was distributed as state foundation funding to school districts, and \$55,995,832 in state foundation funding was distributed to open-enrollment charter schools.

ADM is the total number of days of school attended plus the total number of days absent by students in grades K through 12 during the first three quarters of each school year divided by the number of school days actually taught in the district during that time period rounded up to the nearest hundredth.

### **98% UNIFORM RATE OF TAX ACTUAL COLLECTION ADJUSTMENT**

For a school district that received state foundation funding aid and whose net revenues were less than the sum of 98% of the Uniform Rate of Tax (URT) multiplied by the property assessment of the district, the Department of Education (ADE) distributed to the district the difference between the district's net revenues and the sum of 98% of the URT multiplied by the district's property assessment.

For a district whose net revenues were more than the sum of 98% of the URT multiplied by the property assessment of the district, the ADE recouped from the district the difference between the district's net revenues and the sum of 98% of the URT multiplied by the district's property assessment. Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-2305(a)(4) enabled ADE to collect excess distributions by withholding funds from disbursements to the district in the following year.

### **STUDENT GROWTH**

This program provided supplemental funding to school districts with growth in student enrollment over the previous school year. School districts cannot receive both declining enrollment and student growth funding, so the higher category of funding is disbursed. Student growth funding was calculated as the sum of one-quarter of the per student foundation funding for the district multiplied by the increase (excluding any increase resulting solely from consolidation or annexation), if any, of each of the following:

- (A) The district's quarterly Average Daily Membership (ADM) for the first quarter of the current school year over the ADM of the previous school year.
- (B) The district's quarterly ADM for the second quarter of the current year over the ADM of the previous school year.
- (C) The district's quarterly ADM for the third quarter of the current school year over the ADM of the previous school year.
- (D) The district's quarterly ADM for the fourth quarter of the current school year over the ADM of the previous school year.

### **SUPPLEMENTAL MILLAGE INCENTIVE FUNDING**

These funds were distributed in accordance with Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-2503(f), as amended by Act 1 of the First Extraordinary Session of 2013. Beginning in fiscal year 2005-2006, school districts that elected to receive Supplemental Millage Incentive Funding received the funding amount that exceeded the amount the district would have received under Debt Service Funding Supplement and General Facilities Funding in fiscal year 2004-2005. After fiscal year 2005-2006, this funding began to be phased out by reducing the amount received by a district by one-tenth of the 2005-2006 amount each year over a 10-year period, with the savings distributed to the Employee Benefits Division of the Department of Finance and Administration for the exclusive benefit of public school employees participating in the State and Public School Life and Health Insurance Program. Fiscal year 2014-2015 was the final year for the distribution of Supplemental Millage Incentive Funding to school districts.

### **SURPLUS COMMODITIES**

The Department of Human Services (DHS) administers the Surplus Commodities Program. Under an agreement with DHS, the Department of Education reimbursed transportation costs for the delivery of surplus commodities to school districts.

### **TEACHER LICENSURE/MENTORING**

This program funded the Arkansas Teacher Induction Program and Administrator Induction Program, which provided Pathwise mentoring for support, retention, and professional growth of new teachers and administrators. Under the Pathwise system, first-year teachers and administrators were paired with trained mentors, who helped them through their first one to three years, traditionally the most difficult. Teach for America was funded through this appropriation, as well as TESS (Teacher Evaluation and Support System), Teacher Cadets, and superintendent evaluation.

Districts received funding for each new teacher and new administrator participating in the program. Districts then distributed a portion of the funding to the new teacher's or administrator's mentor. The remaining amount was disbursed to the new teacher for materials, supplies, or professional training. Likewise, the portion remaining for the new administrators was used for professional development. Funds were also distributed to school districts, institutions of higher education, and education service cooperatives to provide training to mentors.

### **TEACHER OF THE YEAR**

In submitting an application for Arkansas Teacher of the Year, a school district agreed that, if its teacher candidate were selected, the district would place the teacher on paid administrative leave for the school year immediately following his or her selection, as provided in Ark. Code Ann. § 6-17-2504. During the school year in which the Arkansas Teacher of the Year was on paid administrative leave from the district, the Department of Education reimbursed the district for the salary and benefits of the Teacher of the Year, as provided in Ark. Code Ann. § 6-17-2505. During this time, the Teacher of the Year served in an advisory position as a non-voting member of the State Board of Education.

### **TEACHER RETIREMENT MATCHING**

These payments consisted of employer matching payments for employees of the education service cooperatives, vocational centers, Easter Seals, and the school operated by the Department of Correction. The matching rate was 14% of salaries for all employees.

**TECHNOLOGY GRANTS**

This program provided technology to education service cooperatives and school districts for programs such as the EAST Initiative and Explor-Net. The EAST Initiative gave students the experience of using technology to solve real-life school or community problems. The Center for Quality Teaching and Learning trained facilitators from other states as well as Arkansas teachers and students. Explor-Net teaches students computer repair in a hands-on environment and teams teachers and administrative personnel with technology integration. This program also supported EAST Core as part of the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) Initiative. EAST Core incorporates best practices of the EAST model into core classes.

**TECHNOLOGY IMPROVEMENT GRANTS**

This program provided improvements used to update the technology hardware and software available to educational service cooperatives and local school districts. The funds are also used to make educational technology resources available through statewide projects, such as APSCN and joint efforts with the state library system. The technology improvement grants and resources provided through this appropriation affect virtually every district in the State.

**WORKERS' COMPENSATION**

These funds were paid to the Public Employees Claims Division of the Arkansas Insurance Department to cover the costs of workers' compensation claims by public school employees during the 2014-2015 school year. Claims and administrative expenses are paid by a fund transfer to the Miscellaneous Revolving Fund based on the previous year's claims. This appropriation is for claims made before 1994-95, when districts were required by Act 862 of 1993 to provide their own workers' compensation coverage.

**YOUTH SHELTERS**

This program partially reimbursed school districts for additional costs of providing educational services to students who were placed in emergency youth shelters by the Department of Human Services. For the 2014-2015 school year, funds were distributed to applicable districts with youth shelters using a calculation of the appropriated amount divided by the number of available beds in designated youth shelters.

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#### **ACADEMIC FACILITIES CATASTROPHIC**

This program authorized the Department of Education to distribute state assistance to school districts for catastrophic facility projects resulting from an act of God or violence. The law defines a "catastrophic project" as "repair and new construction for the purpose of supplementing insurance or other public or private emergency assistance received by or payable to the school district." The law requires that any state assistance under this program be used to pay the cost of only the portion of a catastrophic project that is not covered by insurance or other public or private emergency assistance received by or payable to the district. Any damage to classroom facilities caused by age or lack of timely maintenance does not qualify for this program.

#### **ACADEMIC FACILITIES PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM**

The Academic Facilities Partnership Program was promulgated pursuant to Acts 1426 and 2206 of 2005, codified as Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-2507. This program provided state financial assistance in the form of cash payments to school districts for eligible new construction projects. A new construction project included any improvement to an academic facility and, if necessary, related areas (such as the physical plant and grounds) that made the condition or efficiency of the academic facility better than its original condition of completeness or efficiency. New construction included additions to existing academic facilities, construction of new academic facilities, and projects that corrected deficiencies through new construction to maintain a safe, dry, and healthy facility. Funding for this program may be carried forward each fiscal year until project completion.

#### **ADVANCED PLACEMENT TRAINING AND INCENTIVE GRANTS**

The Advanced Placement Training and Initiative program, also referred to as the National Math and Science Initiative program, provided funding for operations, teacher professional development, incentives for teachers and students, student study sessions, school equipment, and teacher stipends.

#### **ARKANSAS LEADERSHIP ACADEMY**

The Arkansas Leadership Academy was formed in 1991 to provide leadership for education reform in Arkansas. The Academy brought together partners from business, higher education, professional associations, educational cooperatives, and governmental agencies and provided a variety of leadership development programs for principals, teachers, partners, and other leaders, including year-long residential programs.

#### **COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENT PROJECT**

As stated in Act 231 of 2014, the General Assembly identified a vendor to receive funds for grants to school districts and for grants for after-school, literacy, and nutrition services for at-risk children and youth.

#### **FISCAL DISTRESS GRANTS**

As stated in Act 231 of 2014, the General Assembly identified a vendor to receive funds for a grant for educational purposes.

#### **READING RECOVERY/EARLY LITERACY**

Reading Recovery, a research-based approach to reading intervention, has been implemented in elementary schools across the State, in connection with the University of Arkansas at Little Rock (UALR). The Department of Education (ADE) provided schools the opportunity to train Reading Recovery teachers and/or a school-based employee to become a Reading Recovery Teacher Leader. Through the training center at UALR, ADE funded training expenses and support materials of \$100,000 for the 2014-2015 school year.

**ADOLESCENT HIV/STD HEALTH (CFDA# 93.079)**

The actual name for this program is “Cooperative Agreements to Promote Adolescent Health through School-Based HIV/STD Prevention and School-Based Surveillance.” The primary purpose of this funding is to build the capacity of districts and schools to effectively contribute to the reduction of HIV infection and other STDs among adolescents; the reduction of disparities in HIV infection and other STDs experienced by specific adolescent sub-populations; and the conducting of school-based surveillance through Youth Risk Behavior Surveys and School Health Profiles. Program activities are expected to reinforce efforts to reduce teen pregnancy rates, due to the shared risk factors for, and intervention activities to address, HIV infection, other STDs, and teen pregnancy.

**CHARTER SCHOOLS (CFDA# 84.282)**

These funds were used to support the planning, development, and initial implementation of charter schools.

**CHILD NUTRITION DISCRETIONARY GRANTS LIMITED AVAILABILITY (CFDA# 10.579)**

This program provided equipment grants for certain equipment purchases at eligible school food authorities.

**EDUCATION FOR HOMELESS CHILDREN AND YOUTH (CFDA# 84.196)**

This program provided funds to schools for supportive services and activities that facilitate the educational success of homeless children and youth.

**ENGLISH LANGUAGE ACQUISITION GRANTS (CFDA# 84.365)**

This program provided grants to schools to ensure that limited English-proficient children and youth, including immigrant children and youth, obtain English proficiency and meet state academic standards.

**FRESH FRUIT AND VEGETABLE PROGRAM (CFDA# 10.582)**

The purpose of the Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program is three-fold: (1) to provide access to fresh fruits and vegetables for students in low income public schools at times other than regular meal periods, (2) to assist local farmers by expanding local markets for locally grown fresh fruits and vegetables, and (3) to create local partnerships between schools and the state agriculture industry.

**IMPROVING TEACHER QUALITY STATE GRANTS (CFDA# 84.367)**

This program provided grants to school districts to assist with effectively recruiting and retaining highly-qualified teachers and to provide professional development activities.

**MATHEMATICS AND SCIENCE PARTNERSHIPS (CFDA# 84.366)**

These funds were distributed to various local educational agencies, including school districts, education service cooperatives, and institutions of higher education. The purpose of the grants was to improve students' academic achievement in mathematics and science through projects that promote strong teaching skills for elementary and secondary school teachers and integrate teaching methods based on scientifically-based research and technology.

**MIGRANT EDUCATION – COORDINATION PROGRAM (CFDA# 84.144)**

The purpose of these funds was to provide incentive grants to state educational agencies that participated in high-quality consortia with another state educational agency or other appropriate entity to improve service delivery to migrant children whose education was interrupted by addressing these children's key needs.

**MIGRANT EDUCATION – STATE GRANT PROGRAM (CFDA# 84.011)**

These funds supported high-quality education programs for migratory children and helped ensure that migratory children who moved among states were not penalized in any manner by disparities among states in curriculum, graduation requirements, state academic content, and/or student academic achievement standards. Funds also ensured that migratory children not only were provided appropriate education services (including supportive services) that addressed their special needs but also received full and appropriate opportunities to meet the same challenging state academic content and student academic achievement standards that all children were expected to meet.

**NATIONAL SCHOOL BREAKFAST AND LUNCH PROGRAMS (CFDA# 10.553 & 10.555)**

These programs assisted schools in making school breakfasts, lunches, and snacks available to all school children and to encourage the domestic consumption of nutritious agricultural commodities.

**PROMISE (PROMOTING READINESS OF MINORS IN SUPPLEMENTAL SECURITY INCOME) GRANTS – (CFDA# 84.418)**

This program provided grants to foster improved health, education, and post-secondary outcomes for children ages 14 through 16 (at the time they begin to receive services) who receive Supplemental Security Income (SSI), as well as their families, by supporting improved coordination of various services, such as those available through the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, the Vocational Rehabilitation State Grants program, Medicaid health and home and community-based services, Job Corps, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), and Workforce Investment Act programs. PROMISE also sought to facilitate the increased use of such services, ensuring that families are tied into programs for which they might be eligible but are not yet participating.

**RURAL EDUCATION (CFDA# 84.358)**

This program provided grants to rural schools to help improve the quality of teaching and learning in those schools.

**SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT GRANTS (CFDA# 84.377)**

The purpose of this program was to assist states in carrying out their program improvement responsibilities required under Sections 1116 and 1117 of Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act by (1) building state capacity to provide leadership in implementing effective school improvement strategies for local educational agencies (LEAs) and schools that have been identified for improvement, are in corrective action, and are in the restructuring process and (2) providing resources to LEAs to support school improvement activities, including development and implementation of effective restructuring plans.

**SPECIAL EDUCATION – GRANTS TO STATES (CFDA# 84.027)**

This program provided grants to school districts to assist in providing a free public education to all eligible children with disabilities.

**SPECIAL EDUCATION – PRESCHOOL GRANTS (CFDA# 84.173)**

This program provided supplemental grants to school districts and education service cooperatives to assist in providing a free public education to children with disabilities who are ages 3 through 5.

**SPECIAL EDUCATION – STATE PERSONNEL DEVELOPMENT (CFDA# 84.323)**

This program assisted state educational agencies in reforming and improving their systems for personnel preparation and professional development of individuals providing early intervention, educational, and transition services to improve results for children with disabilities.

**TITLE I GRANTS TO LOCAL EDUCATIONAL AGENCIES (CFDA# 84.010)**

This program was designed to help schools improve the teaching and learning environments of children failing or most at-risk of failing.

**TITLE I NEGLECTED AND DELINQUENT CHILDREN AND YOUTH (CFDA# 84.013)**

The purpose of this program was to help provide educational continuity for neglected and delinquent children and youth in State-run institutions for juveniles and in adult correctional institutions so that these youth can make successful transitions to school or employment once they are released.

**TWENTY-FIRST CENTURY COMMUNITY LEARNING CENTERS (CFDA# 84.287)**

This program provided grants to local educational agencies, faith-based organizations, and community-based entities to create community learning centers providing academic enrichment opportunities for students attending high-poverty and low-performing schools.

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**ALTERNATIVE CERTIFICATION PROGRAM**

Non-traditional licensure teachers were assigned to one of seven sites across Arkansas to complete instructional requirements for the Arkansas Professional Pathway to Educator Licensure (APPEL), formerly known as the Non-Traditional Licensure Program. Grants from the registration fees remitted by the teachers seeking licensure were provided to the non-traditional licensure sites to conduct training.

**ARKANSAS MEDICAID ADMINISTRATION CLAIMING**

The Arkansas Department of Education (ADE) Special Education Unit, along with the Department of Human Services (DHS) - Division of Medical Services, received federal approval from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services to coordinate and manage a statewide Medicaid administrative claiming program referred to as Arkansas Medicaid Administrative Claiming (ARMAC). ARMAC allowed school districts to receive reimbursement for costs associated with certain administrative activities that directly supported the Arkansas Medicaid program from DHS through ADE.

**FISH AND WILDLIFE CONSERVATION PROGRAM**

These funds were generated from fines and fees collected by the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission arising out of convictions of persons violating state laws protecting game, fish, and wildlife. The funds were distributed by the Department of Education back to the counties where the offenses occurred to support school education programs for fish and wildlife conservation.

**PROFESSIONAL LICENSURE STANDARDS BOARD**

The Professional Licensure Standards Board (PLSB) was created by Act 846 of 2007. Pursuant to Ark. Code Ann. § 6-17-422, the Professional Licensure Standards Board develops minimum college-level preparatory and grade point average requirements for all teachers. Grant funds were provided for the edTPA (Education Teacher Performance Assessment) program, a performance-based assessment and support system for teachers and teacher candidates.

**TEACHER OF THE YEAR AWARD**

This program distributed awards to teachers who were recognized as regional Teacher of the Year winners. These regional winners were selected at the state level from teachers nominated by their local school districts. One teacher from each region was selected to receive a \$1,000 cash award. The Arkansas Teacher of the Year winner received an additional \$14,000. These funds were received from the Walton Family Foundation.
