Definitions. 25 As used in this act: 26 (1) "After school enrichment program" means a program conducted after 27 regular school hours to provide additional assistance for at risk high school 28 students requiring tutorial or mentoring assistance with character building, 29 communication skills, conflict resolution skills and career or other life 30 skills. (2) "At risk students" means high school students who are in danger of 31 32 dropping out as measured by academic performance, attendance, discipline 33 problems, and other factors affecting school performance, including at least, 34 teenage pregnancy or parenting, alcohol or other illegal drugs, residence in 35 an unstable or temporary living arrangement, or child abuse or neglect, poor communication skills, character building, conflict resolution skills, career 36

1	or other life skills.
2	(3) "At risk school district" means a school district in which a middle
3	school, junior high or high school has high drop-out rates, low grade-
4	retention rates, or high rates of suspensions, detention referrals, violent
5	behavior or other disruptive student behavior.
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7	SECTION 2. (a) There is created the Arkansas After-School Enrichment
8	Program.
9	(b) The purpose of the Arkansas After-School Enrichment Program is to
10	provide grants to at risk school districts for locally designed programs
11	based on criteria developed through research-based prevention programs deemed
12	effective by the Department of Education that target at risk students in
13	middle school, junior high, high school or any combination of the three by:
14	(1) Enhancing educational attainment through coordinated
15	services to respond to the needs of students who are at risk of school
16	failure and at risk of failure in their lives and careers following their
17	<pre>school years;</pre>
18	(2) Providing financial assistance for at risk students to those
19	at risk school districts that by definition are identified to have the
20	greatest need; and
21	(3) Providing for a safe and secure learning environment.
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23	SECTION 3. (a) The Department of Health shall be the agency
24	designated to serve as the administrative and fiscal agent for the Arkansas
25	After-School Enrichment Program.
26	(b) Funds appropriated for the Arkansas After-School Enrichment
27	Program may only be used for activities in support of the program which
28	comply with the stated legislative purpose as contained in this act.
29	(c) The Department of Health shall have the following authority and
30	responsibilities in acting as fiscal agent for the Arkansas After-School
31	Enrichment Program within the Common Ground Program:
32	(1) To disburse the After-School Enrichment Program grant
33	funds to qualifying entities at a minimum of forty percent (40%) of the
34	allocation of Common Ground Program funds, as directed by the Common Ground
35	Program Committee;
36	(2) To solicit proposals from at risk school districts with high

1	percentages of at-risk high schools for after-school enrichment programs;
2	(3) To ensure that applications include evidence of a district-
3	wide needs assessment and planning processes, program objectives and
4	activities, anticipated results, and evaluation plan, and proposed linkages
5	with community health and human service agencies and existing school
6	programs;
7	(4) To provide technical assistance to at risk school districts,
8	including information about effective research-based prevention programs and
9	agency services, provide for program review and evaluation and, in
10	consultation with other state agencies, including the Department of
11	Education, develop program guidelines for coordinated service delivery and
12	shall establish standards against which programs may be judged for efficiency
13	and effectiveness;
14	(5) To submit applications on behalf of Common Ground Program
15	Committee for funds which may become available from public and private
16	funding sources which would be used to implement the activities of the
17	Arkansas After-School Enrichment Program; and
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19	SECTION 4. (a) All agencies of the state and local governments,
20	including departments of social services, health departments, local mental
21	health, mental retardation, and substance abuse authorities, court personnel,
22	law enforcement agencies, state-supported institutions of higher learning,
23	the community college system, and cities and counties, shall cooperate with
24	the Common Ground Program and the Common Ground Program Committee, and with
25	at risk school districts that receive grants, in coordinating the Arkansas
26	After-School Enrichment Program at the state level and in implementing the
27	program at the local level.
28	(b) The Department of Health, in consultation with the Director of the
29	Department of Education and the Director of the Department of Human Services
30	shall develop a plan for ensuring the cooperation of state agencies and local
31	agencies and encouraging the cooperation of private entities, especially
32	those receiving state funds, in the coordination and implementation of the
33	program.
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35	SECTION 5. Arkansas Code 9-33-204 is amended to read as follows:

"9-33-204. Common Ground Committee - Powers and duties.

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1	The Common Ground Program Committee shall have responsibility to:
2	(1) Collaborate with the Governor's Partnership Council for Children
3	and Families, youth commissions, including but not limited to the Governor's
4	Youth Commission, and any other organization or entity that will provide
5	information or support in developing and implementing the Common Ground
6	Program;
7	(2) (1) Periodically review grants using committee members and/or a
8	peer review process and make recommendations as needed to the Governor's
9	Office and to the General Assembly regarding the performance of grantees;
10	(3) (2) Develop criteria and priorities for a grant program to be based
11	on the recommendations from the Governor's Youth Summit on Violence
12	Prevention that was held in December 1994, the regional summits held in 1996-
13	1997, and from regional summits, public hearings, and surveys thereafter;
14	(4) (3) Award grants using the criteria and priorities established by
15	the Common Ground Program Committee and report the awards to the Governor's
16	office;
17	(5) (4) Develop information about the Common Ground Program that the
18	Governor's office, the legislature, and others can use to disseminate
19	information to the general public; and
20	(6) (5) Report the results of the program annually to the Governor and
21	the General Assembly+; and
22	(6) Administer the Arkansas After-School Enrichment Program, including
23	at least, developing criteria and priorities for a grant program, awarding
24	grants, developing information about the Arkansas After-School Enrichment
25	Program that the Governor's office, the General Assembly, and others can use
26	to disseminate information to the general public and reporting the results of
27	the program annually to the Governor and the Speaker of the House of
28	Representatives and the President Pro-Tem of the Senate."
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30	SECTION 6. All provisions of this act of a general and permanent
31	nature are amendatory to the Arkansas Code of 1987 Annotated and the Arkansas
32	Code Revision Commission shall incorporate the same in the Code.
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34	SECTION 7. If any provision of this act or the application thereof to
35	any person or circumstance is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect
36	other provisions or applications of the act which can be given effect without

1	the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this
2	act are declared to be severable.
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4	SECTION 8. All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this act are
5	hereby repealed.
