16 AN ACT CONCERNING PRESIDENTIAL
17 PREFERENTIAL PRIMARY ELECTIONS.

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20 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:

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22 SECTION 1. Arkansas Code § 7-8-201 is amended to read as follows:

23 7-8-201. Preferential elections required - Apportionment of delegates.

24 (a)(1) Each political party in the state desiring to select delegates
25 to attend a quadrennial national nominating convention of the party to select
26 a nominee for the office of President of the United States shall hold a
27 presidential preferential primary election in the state, and the delegates to
28 the national party convention shall be apportioned to the presidential
29 candidates whose names were on the ballot at the presidential preferential
30 primary or to "uncommitted" in the proportion that the votes cast for each
31 candidate or for "uncommitted" bear to the total votes cast at the election,
32 rounded to the closest whole number.

33 (2) Presidential preferential primary elections shall be held on
34 the first Tuesday in February of the year in which the convention is held.

35 (3)(A) Any person desiring to have his or her name printed on



1 the presidential preferential primary ballot as a candidate for his or her
2 party's nomination shall file a party certificate with the Secretary of State
3 during regular office hours in the period beginning at 12:00 noon on the
4 first Monday in November and ending at 12:00 noon on the fourteenth day
5 thereafter before the presidential preferential primary election.

6 (B) Each political party shall:

7 (i) Be responsible for determining the
8 qualifications of candidates seeking to appear on the presidential
9 preferential primary ballot of each political party;

10 (ii) Provide necessary applications for candidacy;

11 (iii) Accept and process the applications; and

12 (iv) Determine the order that candidates shall
13 appear on the ballot.

14 (4) The cost of the presidential preferential primary election
15 shall be borne by the State of Arkansas and shall be paid from an
16 appropriation made to the State Board of Election Commissioners for that
17 purpose.

18 (5)(A) The State Board of Election Commissioners shall have the
19 primary responsibility for conducting presidential preferential primary
20 elections.

21 (B) Within each county, the presidential preferential
22 primary election shall be conducted by the county board of election
23 commissioners under the direction of the State Board of Election
24 Commissioners.

25 (C) The State Board of Election Commissioners shall have
26 authority to adopt rules for the administration of presidential preferential
27 primary elections consistent with the election laws of this state.

28 (D) The State Board of Election Commissioners may withhold
29 reimbursement of funds to counties for state-funded presidential preferential
30 primary elections for failure to comply with the rules developed by the State
31 Board of Election Commissioners for the administration of primary elections
32 or applicable state election laws until all requirements are met to the
33 satisfaction of the State Board of Election Commissioners.

34 (b)(1) Presidential preferential primary election procedures not
35 addressed in this section shall be governed by the general election laws of
36 this state, including, but not limited to, laws governing primary elections.

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
