2	in existence of the grossly overcrowded vessel and its doomed passengers;		
3	(5)(A) At 2:00 a.m. on April 27, 1865, the Sultana's boiler		
4	system erupted in a massive explosion just seven (7) miles north of Memphis,		
5	Tennessee, causing a conflagration of fire and flying shrapnel and the		
6	venting of deadly steam that resulted in over two thousand (2,000)		
7	casualties, of which more than one thousand two hundred (1,200) died from the		
8	explosion itself.		
9	(B) Nearly seven hundred (700) more individuals were		
10	dragged to safety over several hours and taken to five (5) Memphis hospitals,		
11	with many perishing later from injuries, burns, and exposure to the frigid		
12	<u>Mississippi River floodwaters;</u>		
13	(6) Several Crittenden County, Arkansas, citizens were		
14	officially credited with saving dozens of lives that night by wading into the		
15	flooded Mississippi River to retrieve victims of the tragedy as they floated

17	(7) The event was made all the more tragic by evidence of greed,		
18	corruption, malfeasance in office, and dereliction of officer duty, as noted		
19	by a following United States Army investigation into the disaster;		
20	(8) The event occurred in the Mound City, Arkansas, and Marion,		
21	Arkansas, areas of the Mississippi River, places where the remains of the		
22	Sultana and its lost souls still rest today and where Arkansas citizens were		
23	the saviors of many survivors that night;		
24	(9) The United States House of Representatives passed a		
25	resolution in 2009 acknowledging the explosion of the SS Sultana as the		
26	greatest maritime disaster in United States history; and		
27	(10) The lives and service of all the soldiers, passengers, and		
28	local citizens involved in the tragedy are currently honored and recognized		
29	with a temporary exhibit of Sultana artifacts in Marion, Arkansas, with plans		
30	<u>for a permanent Sultana Disaster Museum by 2020 in Marion, Arkansas.</u>		
31	(b) April 27 each year shall be known as "Sultana Disaster Remembrance		
32	Day" to commemorate Arkansas's role in the greatest maritime disaster in		
33	United States history.		
34	(c) Sultana Disaster Remembrance Day is not a legal holiday but is a		
35	memorial day to be commemorated by the issuance of an appropriate
