## Subtitle

14 AN ACT TO REPEAL ARKANSAS CODE 20-76-107  
15 CONCERNING THE INDEPENDENT EVALUATOR FOR  
16 THE TEMPORARY ASSISTANCE FOR NEEDY

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21 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:  
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23 SECTION 1. Arkansas Code § 20-76-107 is repealed.

25 ~~(a)(1) By September 1, 2007, the Department of Workforce Services~~

14 ~~(iv) Impact on housing conditions, family living~~

16 ~~(v) Impact on the health care coverage and the~~

28 ~~(xi) Educational and skill attainment;~~

29 ~~(F) Effectiveness of training received by program~~

31 ~~(G) How effectively transitional employment assistance~~  
 32 ~~supportive services are being delivered and the extent to which they meet~~  
 33 ~~client needs in making the transition from welfare to work and achieving~~  
 34 ~~long-term economic self-sufficiency;~~

35 ~~(H) Transitional employment assistance client usage of~~  
 36 ~~other forms of public assistance, including, at least, food stamps, Medicaid~~

1 and ARKids First, and usage of nongovernmental forms of community services;

2           (I) Any other information deemed by the independent  
3 evaluator or the board to be helpful in assisting the Governor and the  
4 General Assembly in evaluating the impact and effectiveness of the program;  
5 and

6           (J) To the extent allowed by available funds, the  
7 evaluation shall include separate analyses for the following groups:

8                   (i) Cases closed because of noncompliance;

9                   (ii) Cases closed because of earnings and  
10 employment; and

11                   (iii) Cases closed because of reaching the twenty-  
12 four-month lifetime limit on cash assistance.

13       (b) All agencies of the state and local government providing program  
14 services shall work cooperatively with and provide any necessary assistance  
15 to the independent evaluator and shall furnish in a timely manner complete  
16 and accurate information to the independent evaluator upon request.

17       (c)(1) The independent evaluation shall include a survey of families  
18 that have left the program to examine their work experience, their sources of  
19 financial support, the barriers that affect their ability to work, the well-  
20 being of families and children, including whether adults face hardships in  
21 providing food, shelter, or other basic necessities for their families, and  
22 their perceptions of the program and their life after welfare.

23       (2) The study shall utilize professionally recognized techniques  
24 for research on families leaving welfare, including statistical sampling and  
25 telephone and in-person surveys with rigorous follow-up to ensure adequate  
26 response rates.

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
