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20 21	INTEREAS the Endered Runney of Investigation has sugrended all formal
21	WHEREAS, the Federal Bureau of Investigation has suspended all formal contacts with the Council on American-Islamic Relations ("CAIR") due to
22	evidence demonstrating a relationship between CAIR and Hamas, a designated
24	foreign terrorist organization of the United States Department of State; and
25	Toreign certorist organization of the onriced states peparement of state, and
26	WHEREAS, in United States of America v. Holy Land Foundation for Relief
27	and Development, the largest successful prosecution of terrorism-financing in
28	our country's history, CAIR was identified as an associate of the Muslim
29	Brotherhood and was named an unindicted co-conspirator in the trial; and
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31	WHEREAS, CAIR opened its first office in Washington, D.C., with the
32	help of a grant from the Holy Land Foundation for Relief and Development, a
33	charitable organization that was closed by the United States Department of
34	the Treasury for funding jihadist terrorist organizations; and
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36	WHEREAS, United States ally, the United Arab Emirates, officially



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1 designated CAIR as a terrorist organization in 2014; and 2 WHEREAS, in March 2011, Muthanna al-Hanooti, a director within CAIR, 3 4 was sentenced to a year in federal prison for violating United States 5 sanctions against Iraq under Saddam Hussein; and 6 7 WHEREAS, in 2006, the co-founder of CAIR's parent organization, Islamic Association for Palestine ("IAP"), Sami Al-Arian, was sentenced to 57 months 8 9 in prison on terrorism charges for financing Palestinian Islamic Jihad, a 10 designated foreign terrorist organization; and 11 12 WHEREAS, in 2004, CAIR-Northern Virginia director Abdurahman Alamoudi 13 pled guilty to terrorism-related financial and conspiracy charges, which 14 resulted in a 23-year federal prison sentence; and 15 16 WHEREAS, in 2009, Ghassan Elashi, who was a leader of the Holy Land 17 Foundation for Relief and Development, was sentenced to a total of 65 years 18 in prison after being convicted of 10 counts of conspiracy to provide, and 19 the provision of, material support to a designated foreign terrorist 20 organization; ll counts of conspiracy to provide, and the provision of, 21 funds, goods and services to a Specially Designated Terrorist as determined 22 by the U.S. Secretary of the Treasury; 10 counts of conspiracy to commit, and 23 the commission of, money laundering; 1 count of conspiracy to impede and 24 impair the Internal Revenue Service; and 2 counts of filing a false tax 25 return; and 26 27 WHEREAS, Randall Todd (Ismail) Royer, who served as a communications

specialist and civil rights coordinator for CAIR and trained with and set up an internet-based newsletter for Lashkar-I-Taiba, an al Qaeda-tied Kashmir organization that is listed on the United States Department of State's international terror list, was also indicted on charges of conspiring to help al Qaeda in the Taliban battle American troops were fighting in Afghanistan and was sentenced to 20 years in prison on April 9, 2004; and

WHEREAS, in September 2003, CAIR's former community affairs director,
Bassem Khafagi, pleaded guilty to 3 federal counts of bank and visa fraud,

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and agreed to be deported to Egypt after he had funneled money to activities supporting terrorism and had published material advocating suicide attacks against the United States, illegal activities that took place while he was employed by CAIR; and WHEREAS, Rabih Haddad, the Ann Arbor, Michigan-based CAIR fundraiser, was arrested on terrorism-related charges and was deported from the United States due to his work as Executive Director of the Global Relief Foundation, which in October 2002 was closed by the United States Department of Treasury for financing al Qaeda and other terrorist organizations, NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS: THAT the Senate encourages law enforcement to suspend contact and outreach with the Council on American-Islamic Relations.
