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28	BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:
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30	SECTION 1. Arkansas Code § 6-60-1001 is amended to read as follows:
31	6-60-1001. Title.
32	This subchapter shall be known and may be cited as the "Forming Open
33	and Robust University Minds (FORUM) Act" "Free Thought in Higher Education
34	Act".
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36	SECTION 2 Arkanese Code & 6-60-1002(3)-(7) concerning the

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- l  $\,$  legislative intent of the Forming Open and Robust University Minds (FORUM)
- 2 Act, is amended to read as follows:
- 3 (3) The exercise of First Amendment rights on the campuses of
- 4 state-supported institutions of higher education in this state is a critical
- 5 component of the education experience for students and requires that each
- 6 state-supported institution of higher education in this state ensure free,
- 7 robust, and uninhibited debate and deliberation by students, whether on or
- 8 off campus;
- 9 (4) The First Amendment is the floor of free speech protection,
- 10 and a commitment to the free exchange of ideas gives members of campus
- ll communities in this state the ability to engage in free, robust, and
- 12 <u>uninhibited debate and deliberation</u>, whether on or off campus, beyond those
- 13 guaranteed by the First Amendment;
- 14  $\frac{(4)(5)}{(5)}$  State-supported institutions of higher education in this
- 15 state and elsewhere should provide adequate safeguards for the First
- 16 Amendment rights of their students rights to free speech of members of campus
- 17 <u>communities</u> to avoid a stifling of expression on campus;
- 18 (5)(6) The United States Supreme Court has warned that if state-
- 19 supported institutions of higher education stifle student speech and prevent
- 20 the open exchange of ideas on campus, "our civilization will stagnate and
- 21 die", Sweezy vs. New Hampshire, 354 U.S. 234, 250 (1957);
- (6)(7) A significant amount of taxpayer dollars is appropriated
- 23 to state-supported institutions of higher education each year, and the
- 24 General Assembly must ensure that all state-supported institutions of higher
- 25 education receiving state funds recognize freedom of speech as a fundamental
- 26 right for all; and
- 27 (7)(8) State-supported institutions of higher education should
- 28 strive to ensure the fullest degree of intellectual and academic freedom and
- 29 free expression, and it is not the proper role of state-supported
- 30 institutions of higher education to shield individuals from speech that  $\frac{1}{100}$
- 31 protected by the First Amendment to the United States Constitution, including
- 32 without limitation ideas and opinions the individuals may find unwelcome,
- 33 uncollegial, disagreeable, or even deeply offensive.

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- 35 SECTION 3. Arkansas Code § 6-60-1003(6)(B), concerning definitions
- 36 under the Forming Open and Robust University Minds (FORUM) Act, is amended to

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                       (B) "Materially and substantially disrupts" does not
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     include conduct that is protected under the First Amendment to the United
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     States Constitution or Arkansas Constitution, Article 2, §§ 4, 6, and 24, or
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     is otherwise protected under this subchapter or in another state statute,
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     which includes without limitation:
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                             (i) Lawful protests in an outdoor any area of campus
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     that is generally accessible to members of the campus community, except
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     during times when the area has been reserved in advance for another event; or
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                             (ii) Minor, brief, or fleeting nonviolent
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     disruptions of events that are isolated and short in duration;
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           SECTION 4. Arkansas Code § 6-60-1004 is amended to read as follows:
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           6-60-1004. Protected expressive activities.
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           (a) Expressive activities protected under this subchapter consist of
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     speech and other expressive conduct protected by the First Amendment to the
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     United States Constitution, including without limitation:
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                      Communicating through any lawful verbal, written, or
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     electronic means;
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                 (2) Participating in peaceful assembly;
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                 (3) Protesting;
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                 (4)
                     Making speeches, including without limitation those of guest
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     speakers;
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                 (5) Distributing literature;
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                 (6) Making comments to the media;
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                 (7) Carrying signs; and
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                      Circulating petitions.

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           (b)(1) Except as provided under subsection (c) of this section, a
     state-supported institution of higher education shall:
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                       (A) Ensure students and teachers the fullest degree of
     intellectual and academic freedom and free expression;
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                       (B) Not restrict speech that individuals may find
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     controversial, uncollegial, disagreeable, or offensive; and
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                       (C) Not restrict students and teachers from communicating
     with members of the public, whether members of the public are members of the
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     campus community or the public at large, on any matter except for a matter
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1	prohibited by state or federal law.
2	(2) Speech and expressive conduct permitted under subdivision
3	(b)(1) of this section shall not interfere with prohibitions against
4	harassment and discrimination.
5	(c) A state-supported institution of higher education may impose
6	reasonable restrictions regarding the time, place, or manner of carrying out
7	expressive activities.
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9	SECTION 5. Arkansas Code § 6-60-1005 is amended to read as follows:
10	6-60-1005. Public forums.
11	(a) An outdoor area The following areas of campus of a state-supported
12	institution of higher education shall be deemed a public forum for $\mathit{members}\ of$
13	the campus community <u>:</u>
14	(1) Outdoor areas; and
15	(2)(A) Indoor common areas generally open to all students and
16	teachers for the purpose of congregating for social interaction, as
17	designated by a state-supported institution of higher education.
18	(B) A state-supported institution of higher education
19	shall appropriately designate indoor common areas generally open to all
20	students and teachers for the purpose of congregating for social interaction.
21	(b) State-supported institutions of higher education:
22	(1) Shall not create free-speech zones or other designated
23	outdoor areas of campus outside of which expressive activities are
24	prohibited; and
25	(2)(A) May maintain and enforce reasonable time, place, and
26	manner restrictions regarding the time, place, or manner of carrying out
27	expressive activities for outdoor areas of campus that are narrowly tailored
28	to serve a significant institutional interest only when such restrictions:
29	(i) Employ clear, published, content-neutral and
30	viewpoint-neutral criteria; and
31	(ii) Provide for ample alternative means of
32	expression.
33	(B) Any restrictions under subdivision (b)(2)(A) of this
34	section shall allow for $\frac{members\ of\ the\ campus\ community}{members\ of\ the\ campus\ community}$
35	to spontaneously and contemporaneously assemble, speak, and distribute
36	literature.

- 1 (c) A member of the campus community student or teacher who wants to engage in noncommercial expressive activity in an outdoor any public area of 2 3 campus of a state-supported institution of higher education shall be 4 permitted to do so freely as provided under subsection (b) of this section if 5 the individual's conduct:
  - (1) Is not unlawful; and
- 7 (2) Does not materially and substantially disrupt, as defined 8 under § 6-60-1003, the functioning of the state-supported institution of 9 higher education.
  - This section shall not be interpreted as: (d)
- 11 (1) Limiting the right of campus community member student or 12 teacher expression elsewhere on campus;
- 13 (2) Preventing a state-supported institution of higher education 14 from prohibiting, limiting, or restricting expression that the First
- 15 Amendment to the United States Constitution does not implicate violates the 16
- 17 true threats and expression directed to provoke imminent lawless actions and

laws of this state or the Arkansas Constitution, including without limitation

- 18 likely to produce it, or prohibiting harassment as defined by § 6-60-1003; or
- 19 (3) Allowing an individual to engage in conduct that materially
- 20 and substantially disrupts, as defined under § 6-60-1003, another person's 21 expressive activity if the other person's activity is occurring in an area of
- 22 campus that is reserved for an activity under the exclusive use or control of
- 23 a particular group.

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- 25 SECTION 6. Arkansas Code § 6-60-1007 is amended to read as follows: 26 6-60-1007. Free expression policies.
- 27 State-supported institutions of higher education shall:
- 28 (1) Make public in their handbooks, on their websites, and 29 through their orientation programs for students the policies, regulations, 30 and expectations of students regarding free expression on campus consistent 31 with this subchapter; and
  - (2) Develop materials, programs, and procedures to ensure that those persons who have responsibility for discipline or education of students, such as administrators, campus police officers, residence life officials, and faculty, understand the policies, regulations, and duties of state-supported institutions of higher education regarding free expression on

1	campus consistent with this subchapter; and
2	(3) Not require students or teachers to take an oath other than
3	an oath required by law or an academic or professional accrediting body.
