15	TO AMEND THE LAW CONCERNING THE HEALTH
16	AND SAFETY OF PUBLIC SCHOOL STUDENTS.
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19	BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:
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21	SECTION 1. Arkansas Code § 6-18-711(a), concerning the administration
22	of medication for diabetes in public schools, is amended to read as follows:
23	(a) Upon written request of a parent or guardian of a student with
24	adrenal insufficiency or diabetes and authorization by the treating physician
25	of the student, a student in the classroom, in another area designated at the
26	school, on school grounds, or at a school-related activity may:
27	(1) Perform blood glucose checks;
28	(2) Administer insulin through the insulin delivery system the
29 30	student uses; (3) Treat hypoglycemia and hyperglycemia; and
31	<ul><li>(3) Treat hypoglycemia and hyperglycemia; and</li><li>(4) Possess on his or her person the necessary supplies and</li></ul>
32	equipment to perform <u>adrenal insufficiency or</u> diabetes monitoring and
33	treatment functions;
34	(5) Administer medication for adrenal insufficiency; and
35	(6) Treat low cortisol symptoms.
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           SECTION 2. Arkansas Code § 17-87-103(11)(A)-(C), concerning the
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     exceptions to prohibited nursing practices, are amended to read as follows:
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                 (11)(A) The administration of hydrocortisone, glucagon, or
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     insulin, or both separately or together, to a student who is diagnosed with
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     adrenal insufficiency or diabetes by trained volunteer school personnel
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     designated as care providers in a health plan that covers adrenal
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     insufficiency or diabetes management and is based on the orders of a treating
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     physician, who have been trained by a licensed registered nurse employed by a
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     school district or other healthcare professional to administer
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     hydrocortisone, glucagon or insulin, or both separately or together, to a
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     child with adrenal insufficiency or diabetes in an emergency situation.
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                       (B)(i) A licensed registered nurse employed by a school
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     district or other healthcare professional shall annually train volunteer
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     school personnel designated as care providers in a health plan of a student
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     submitted under subdivision (11)(A) of this section to administer
     hydrocortisone, glucagon, or insulin, or both separately or together, to a
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     student with adrenal insufficiency or diabetes.
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                             (ii) If a parent or guardian of a student with
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     adrenal insufficiency or diabetes chooses to have care provided by a care
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     provider, the parent or guardian of a student with adrenal insufficiency or
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     diabetes shall sign an authorization to allow the administration of
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     hydrocortisone, glucagon, or insulin, or both separately or together, to the
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     student by volunteer school personnel designated as care providers who shall
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     be incorporated into the health plan of a student submitted under subdivision
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     (11)(A) of this section.
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                             (iii) The school district shall maintain a copy of
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     the health plan provided under subdivision (11)(A) of this section, a list of
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     volunteer school personnel who are designated as care providers and trained
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     to administer hydrocortisone, glucagon, or insulin, or both separately or
     together, and a copy of the parent's or guardian's signed authorization.
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                       (C)(i) A school district shall strive to achieve the
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     following staffing ratios for students with adrenal insufficiency or diabetes
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     at each public school, at least:
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                                   (a) One (1) care provider for a public school
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     with one (1) full-time licensed registered nurse; and
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                                   (b) Three (3) care providers for a public
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     school without one (1) full-time licensed registered nurse.
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                             (ii) The school district may recruit and identify
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     public school personnel to serve as care providers to administer
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     hydrocortisone, glucagon, or insulin, or both separately or together, when a
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     licensed registered nurse is not available.
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                             (iii) A school district shall not require or
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     pressure a parent or guardian of a student with <u>adrenal insufficiency or</u>
     diabetes to provide adrenal insufficiency or diabetes care at school or a
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     school-related activity.
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
