## SENATE MEMORIAL RESOLUTION

11 TO REMEMBER PAUL GREENBERG AND HIS CONTRIBUTIONS TO  
12 THE STATE OF ARKANSAS.

15 TO REMEMBER PAUL GREENBERG AND HIS  
16 CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE STATE OF ARKANSAS.

20 WHEREAS, as Bill Bowden wrote in the Arkansas Democrat-Gazette, Mr.  
21 Paul Greenberg "chronicled Arkansas politics and culture, with a sharp pen  
22 and a literary mind", for more than half a century; and

23

24 WHEREAS, Mr. Greenberg was born in Shreveport, Louisiana, on January  
25 21, 1937, the son of Ben and Sarah Greenberg, and worked on the high school  
26 newspaper in Shreveport, saying, "I grew up on the editorials in The  
27 Shreveport Times. I think that's one of the reasons I take seriously the job  
28 of an editorial writer."; and

30 WHEREAS, Mr. Greenberg attended Centenary College in Shreveport for two  
31 (2) years before going to the University of Missouri, where he earned a  
32 bachelor's degree in journalism in 1958 and a master's degree in history the  
33 next year, before doing some postgraduate work in American history at  
34 Columbia University in New York City; and

36 WHEREAS, although he had taught history at Hunter College while in



1 graduate school, he said his first job after college was with the Pine Bluff  
2 Commercial, where he was hired in 1962 at twenty-five (25) years of age, and  
3 it was a job that gave him the chance to move back to the South, which he  
4 loved as much as his hometown of Shreveport; and

5  
6 WHEREAS, Mr. Greenberg stayed at the Pine Bluff Commercial for nearly  
7 thirty (30) years and served as the editorial page editor, during which time  
8 he won the Pulitzer Prize in 1969 for editorials written in 1968 about civil  
9 rights; and when discussing his award of the highest honor in the profession  
10 of journalism, he said, "Most of the editorials dealt with the integration of  
11 Pine Bluff schools and society. It was pro-integration, pro-civil rights,  
12 anti-[presidential candidate George] Wallace, against massive resistance,  
13 against the Southern Manifesto."; and

14  
15 WHEREAS, Edmond Freeman of Little Rock, who was the publisher of the  
16 Pine Bluff Commercial at the time of Mr. Greenberg's tenure, would edit the  
17 editorials that Mr. Greenberg wrote and said that besides being a gifted  
18 writer, Mr. Greenberg had a strong work ethic, continuing to work even while  
19 on vacation; and because of his efforts, Mr. Greenberg went on to be a  
20 finalist for the Pulitzer Prize again in 1978 and in 1986; and

21  
22 WHEREAS, in 1992 Mr. Greenberg was hired by the Arkansas Democrat-  
23 Gazette to be its editorial page editor and to write a column; he stepped  
24 down as editorial page editor at the end of July 2015 but continued to write  
25 columns and editorials for the paper; under his leadership, the editorial  
26 page of the Arkansas Democrat-Gazette won several awards on state and  
27 national levels, including a first place win in 2013 for editorial writing in  
28 the seventy-ninth National Headliner Awards; Walter E. Hussmann Jr.,  
29 publisher of the Arkansas Democrat-Gazette and chairman of WEHCO Media, said  
30 Greenberg's death will reverberate beyond Arkansas's borders: "It's a  
31 tremendous loss, not just for the Democrat-Gazette but for the state of  
32 Arkansas and for journalism in America. Paul Greenberg was just unparalleled  
33 and unique as far as editorial writers go. He was one of the finest if not  
34 the finest in America. I've often told people the best part of my job is to  
35 review the editorials. I love to read beautiful writing, and he wrote  
36 beautifully."; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Greenberg said, "I would like to think that I would have enjoyed the study and teaching of history, but I can't really imagine anything as much fun as I have had writing editorials and writing columns", and along with spending his adult life doing that, he wrote three (3) books, liked to read books, and enjoyed listening to all types of music; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Greenberg's first wife, Carolyn Levy Greenberg, died in 1995, and they had two (2) children, Daniel and Ruth; in March 2015, Mr. Greenberg married Sarah Brooke Malloy of Little Rock; and Mr. Greenberg's son and former member of the House of Representatives, Daniel Greenberg, said, "I think that the world knew one kind of Paul Greenberg, who was occasionally something of a sharp critic of the powers that be and was sort of a skilled portraitist of many public officials and gave us fascinating perspectives of the values that under[lie] Arkansas politics and government. And there's also the private Paul Greenberg, who maybe not as many people knew about, and the private Paul Greenberg was a loving father who taught me many lessons about being a good family man and carrying out a life of ethics and principles.",

NOW THEREFORE,  
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:

THAT the Senate express sincere condolences to the family of Mr. Paul Greenberg and remember him and his contributions to the State of Arkansas.
