3	REQUESTING THAT THE ARKANSAS LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL PROCLAIM JANUARY
4	16, 2024, TO BE RELIGIOUS FREEDOM DAY.
5	
6	
7	WHEREAS, our country's democracy is rooted in the fundamental truth
8	that all people are created equal and endowed with certain unalienable
9	rights, including life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness; and
10	
11	WHEREAS, the freedom of conscience was highly valued by the individuals
12	seeking religious freedom who settled in the American colonies early; the
13	founders of the United States; and Thomas Jefferson, who wrote in his letter
14	to the Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church at New London, Connecticut,
15	dated February 4, 1809: "No provision in our constitution ought to be dearer
16	to man, than that which protects the rights of conscience against the
17	enterprizes of the civil authority"; and
18	
19	WHEREAS, the Virginia Statute for Religious Freedom was drafted by
20	Thomas Jefferson, who considered the Virginia Statute for Religious Freedom
21	to be one of his greatest achievements, enacted on January 16, 1786, and the
22	forerunner to the Free Exercise Clause of the First Amendment to the United
23	States Constitution; and
24	
25	WHEREAS, the First Amendment to the United States Constitution protects
26	the right of individuals to freely express their religious beliefs and to act
27	peacefully on those religious beliefs and also protects individuals from
28	coercion to profess or act on a religious belief to which they do not adhere;
29	and
30	
31	WHEREAS, Thomas Jefferson wrote in 1798 that each right encompassed in
32	the First Amendment to the United States Constitution is independent of the
33	other rights described in that amendment, "thereby guarding in the same
34	sentence and under the same words, the freedom of religion, of speech, and of

the press; insomuch that whatever violates either throws down the sanctuary

1 WHEREAS, in 1822, Thomas Jefferson wrote that the constitutional 2 freedom of religion is "the most inalienable and sacred of all human rights"; 3 4 5 WHEREAS, individuals who have studied United States democracy from an 6 international perspective, including Alexis de Tocqueville, have noted that 7 religion plays a central role in preserving the United States Government 8 because religion provides the moral base required for democracy to succeed; 9 10 WHEREAS, after quoting George Mason's statement from the Virginia 11 12 Declaration of Rights that "all men are equally entitled to the free exercise 13 of religion according to the dictates of conscience", President Franklin D. 14 Roosevelt went on to state in a 1935 speech delivered at the University of Notre Dame, "in the conflict of policies and of political systems which the 15 16 world today witnesses, the United States has held for its own guidance and 17 for the guidance of other Nations if they will accept it, this great torch of 18 liberty of human thought, liberty of human conscience. We will never lower 19 it"; and 20 21 WHEREAS, religious freedom "has been integral to the preservation and 22 development of the United States", and "the free exercise of religion goes 23 hand in hand with the preservation of our other rights", as expressed by 24 President George H.W. Bush in his Presidential Proclamation on Religious 25 Freedom Day in 1993; and 26 27 WHEREAS, "our laws and institutions should not impede or hinder but 28 rather should protect and preserve fundamental religious liberties", as 29 expressed by President William Jefferson Clinton in his remarks accompanying 30 the signing of the Religious Freedom Restoration Act of 1993; and 31

WHEREAS, "We must continue to proclaim the fundamental right of all peoples to believe and worship according to their own conscience, to affirm their beliefs openly and freely, and to practice their faith without fear or intimidation", as expressed by President Clinton in his Presidential Proclamation on Religious Freedom Day in 1998; and

1 2 WHEREAS, "Freedom of religion is a fundamental human right that must be 3 upheld by every nation and guaranteed by every government", as expressed by 4 President Clinton in his Presidential Proclamation on Religious Freedom Day 5 in 1999; and 6 7 WHEREAS, "Religious faith has inspired many of our fellow citizens to 8 help build a better Nation" in which "people of faith continue to wage a 9 determined campaign to meet needs and fight suffering", as expressed by 10 President George W. Bush in his Presidential Proclamation on Religious 11 Freedom Day in 2003; and 12 WHEREAS, the principle of religious freedom "has guided our Nation 13 14 forward" and "is a universal human right to be protected here at home and 15 across the globe," as expressed by President Barack Obama in his presidential 16 proclamations on Religious Freedom Day in 2011 and 2013, respectively; and 17 18 WHEREAS, in Town of Greece v. Galloway, 572 U.S. 565 (2014), Justice 19 Anthony M. Kennedy stated that "people of many faiths may be united in a 20 community of tolerance and devotion"; and 21 22 WHEREAS, for many people in the United States, faith is an integral 23 part of every aspect of daily life and is not limited to their homes, houses 24 of worship, or doctrinal creeds; and 25 26 WHEREAS, the role of religion in the society and public life of the 27 United States has a long and robust tradition, 28 29 NOW THEREFORE, 30 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE ARKANSAS LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL OF THE NINETY-FOURTH 31 GENERAL ASSEMBLY: 32 33 THAT the Arkansas Legislative Council proclaim January 16, 2024, as 34 "Religious Freedom Day", honor the anniversary of the enactment of the Virginia Statute for Religious Freedom, and affirm that religious freedom is 35 36 a fundamental human right.
