Stricken language would be deleted from and underlined language would be added to the law as it existed prior to this session of the General Assembly.

34 25	SECTION 1. <u>Purpose and Findings.</u>
35	(a) The purpose of this act is to increase literacy from preschool
36	through adulthood, ensuring that the parent as the child's first teacher is



1 <u>literate and successful as a teaching parent.</u>

2	(b) Home Instruction for Parents of Preschool Youngsters (HIPPY) is an
3	international parent involvement program for preschool parents and has a
4	proven track record of improving the literacy of parents and their children.
5	(c) Children who have parental support at home are more successful in
6	school, and are less likely to dropout and engage in at-risk behaviors.
7	(d) Children who start school without the basic skills needed in first
8	grade are more likely to experience academic, social and emotional problems.
9	(e) Alternative education, special education, and supplemental
10	services programs have an increased number of referrals due in part to a lack
11	of parental involvement and poor student academic performance. Discipline
12	problems and prison populations have increased, and parent involvement in
13	schools has decreased.
14	(f) Teaching parents how to help their children before they start
15	school establishes a pattern of parental support for education and increases
16	the probability that the parents will follow that pattern as long as the
17	<u>child is in school.</u>
18	(g) Many parents have improved their literacy skills, gone back to
19	school, and entered the work force.
20	(h) Higher education needs to provide more remediation and tutorial
21	programs due to the lack of preparedness of college students.
22	(i) The federal No Child Left Behind Act (NCLBA) provides for parent
23	involvement for school programs, and the addition of preschool programs
24	during this reauthorization period for NCLBA would be a wonderful advancement
25	for the state of Arkansas as the leader of this new educational concept.
26	(j) The Department of Workforce Education and the Department of Health
27	and Human Services shall be a part of this initiative because a number of
28	their clients will benefit from the effort.
29	(k) The economic growth of the state is dependent upon the academic
30	level and the employable skills of the workforce. This assurance must start
31	with preschool parents and their children.

33	SECTION 2. Arkansas Code Title 6, Chapter 16, Subchapter 3 is amended
34	to add an additional section read as follows:
35	<u>6-16-314. Parental involvement.</u>
36	(a) Each early childhood program in this state that receives federal
