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15	WHEREAS, a surgical assistant is an individual who provides aid in
16	exposure, homeostasis, closure, and other intraoperative technical functions
17	that assist a supervising physician in performing a safe operation with
18	optimal results for the patient; and
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20	WHEREAS, employment of surgical technologists and surgical assistants
21	is expected to grow between 2006 and 2016 as the volume of surgeries
22	increases with the aging population of the United States; and
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24	WHEREAS, Arkansas health facilities employ approximately one thousand
25	(1,000) surgical technologists and surgical assistants; and
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27	WHEREAS, eight (8) surgical technology programs in Arkansas have
28	received accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health
29	Education Programs, with an average of one hundred and twenty (120)
30	individuals graduating from these programs per year; and
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32	WHEREAS, the State of Arkansas does not have a registration,
33	certification, or licensure procedure for surgical technologists or surgical
34	assistants; and

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WHEREAS, the General Assembly should pursue effects to improve healthy medical outcomes by ensuring professional competency and professional discipline over a growing profession, NOW THEREFORE, BE IT PROPOSED BY THE HOUSE COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC HEALTH, WELFARE, AND LABOR OF THE EIGHTY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS: THAT the House Committee On Public Health, Welfare, and Labor study the feasibility and impact of requiring certification or licensure of surgical technologists and surgical assistants. BE IT FURTHER PROPOSED THAT, upon request, the Arkansas State Medical Board and other interested parties provide assistance to the House Committee on Public Health, Welfare, and Labor to perform the study.
