1 INTERIM STUDY PROPOSAL 2019-176 2 REQUESTING THAT THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC HEALTH, WELFARE, 3 AND LABOR STUDY REMOVAL OF THE COLLABORATIVE PRACTICE AGREEMENT 4 5 REQUIREMENT OF ADVANCED PRACTICE REGISTERED NURSES AND GRANTING 6 ADVANCED PRACTICE REGISTERED NURSES FULL PRACTICE AUTHORITY 7 INCLUDING FULL PRESCRIPTIVE AUTHORITY. 8 9 WHEREAS, advanced practice registered nurses are nurses with advanced 10 education and clinical competencies who provide care to diverse populations 11 in a variety of settings; and 12 13 WHEREAS, advanced practice registered nurses are licensed or certified and practice in all fifty (50) states; and 14 15 16 WHEREAS, there are over three thousand (3,000) advanced practice 17 registered nurses in Arkansas; and 18 19 WHEREAS, advanced practice registered nurses: 20 (1) Treat acute and chronic health conditions: 21 (2) Focus on health promotion, disease prevention, health 22 education, and health-related counseling; 23 (3) Guide patients to make better-informed health and lifestyle 24 choices; and 25 (4) Help eliminate unnecessary barriers to access to care for many citizens of this state; and 26 27 28 WHEREAS, nurses, including advanced practice registered nurses, have 29 been and continue to be part of the front line of defense during the 30 coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic; and 31 32 WHEREAS, the removal of collaborative practice agreements and granting 33 advanced practice registered nurses full practice authority, including full 34 prescriptive authority, will allow advanced practice registered nurses to 35 provide needed healthcare services to their communities, especially for the 36 most vulnerable citizens in those communities; and

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1 2 WHEREAS, advanced practice registered nurses should practice to the 3 fullest extent of their licensure, accreditation, certification, and 4 education for the health and safety of the public; and 5 6 WHEREAS, The United States Secretary of the Health and Human Services, 7 Alex Azar, has recommended relaxing the scope of practice requirements for 8 healthcare providers, including allowing healthcare professionals to practice 9 in all settings of care in the Secretary's March 24, 2020, letter to state 10 governors; and 11 12 WHEREAS, advanced practice registered nurses in the State of Arkansas 13 are required to obtain a collaborative practice agreement with a physician in 14 order to have prescriptive authority under § 17-87-310; and 15 16 WHEREAS, a collaborative practice agreement is a written plan that 17 identifies a physician who agrees to collaborate with an advanced practice 18 registered nurse in the joint management of the health care provided to the 19 patients of the advanced practice registered nurse and that outlines 20 procedures for consultation with or referral to the collaborating physician 21 or other healthcare professional as indicated by a patient's healthcare 22 needs; and 23 24 WHEREAS, twenty-two (22) states authorize advanced practice registered 25 nurses to have full practice authority that includes full prescriptive authority without supervision, taking into account the various methods of 26 27 transitioning to full practice authority as utilized in other states; and 28 29 WHEREAS, more than forty (40) years of research consistently support the high quality care provided by advanced practice registered nurses and 30 31 cost-effectiveness of using advanced practice registered nurses; and 32 33 WHEREAS, according to AARP, Inc., "no study establishes a basis for requiring that physicians supervise" advanced practice registered nurses; and 34 35

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WHEREAS, studies since the 1960s have found no difference in health
 outcomes, including patient health status, number of prescriptions written,
 return visits requested, or referral to other providers, in comparisons
 between the health care delivered by advanced practice registered nurses and
 the health care delivered by physicians; and

7 WHEREAS, collaborative practice agreements between advanced practice
8 registered nurses and physicians do not increase patient safety or bring
9 added value to the healthcare system, but can add to the cost of care for the
10 patient; and

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12 WHEREAS, negative impacts of mandatory collaborative practice 13 agreements include without limitation:

14 (1) Potential interruption in health care provision or the
15 closing of a clinic operated by advanced practice registered nurses due to
16 the loss of a collaborative practice agreement physician;

17 (2) Significant added cost to the overheads of a clinic operated
18 by an advanced practice registered nurse due to higher fees charged by many
19 collaborative practice agreement physicians;

20 (3) Decreased health care access for patients by adding a
21 barrier for advanced practice registered nurses who would like to establish a
22 new clinic;

(4) Inhibitions to the establishment of new health care accesspoints in rural and medically underserved areas of the state; and

25 (5) Disincentives for new graduates of Arkansas advanced
26 practice registered nursing programs to remain in the state; and
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WHEREAS, often, the collaborative practice agreement physician is not onsite or even within close vicinity of advanced practice registered nurses who are practicing in a rural community; and

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WHEREAS, a report by the National Governors Association states that most studies found health care provided by an advanced practice registered nurse "is comparable" to health care provided by a physician "on several process and outcome measures" and that advanced practice registered nurses "may provide [patients] improved access to care"; and

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1 2 WHEREAS, a report by the Federal Trade Commission found that, 3 "additional scope of practice restrictions, such as physician supervision 4 requirements ... may hamper" the ability of advanced practice registered 5 nurses to provide primary care services that are within the scope of their 6 education and training; and 7 8 WHEREAS, several national groups and organizations support more 9 autonomy for advanced practice registered nurses; and 10 11 WHEREAS, to increase patient access to health care, reduce healthcare 12 costs, and promote efficient and timely health care in the State of Arkansas, the General Assembly should modernize the scope of practice laws for advanced 13 14 practice registered nurses by removing the mandatory collaborative practice 15 agreements for advanced practice registered nurses and granting advanced 16 practice registered nurses full practice authority, including full 17 prescriptive authority, 18 19 NOW THEREFORE, 20 BE IT PROPOSED BY THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC HEALTH, WELFARE, AND LABOR 21 OF THE NINETY-SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS: 22 23 THAT the Senate Committee on Public Health, Welfare, and Labor study 24 the removal of the collaborative practice agreement requirement of advanced 25 practice registered nurses and allow full practice authority of advanced 26 practice registered nurses without a collaborative practice agreement, 27 including full prescriptive authority. 28 29 30 Respectfully submitted, 31 32 33 34 Senator Kim Hammer 35 District 33 36

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
