16	MONITOR MEDICATIONS.		
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19	BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:		
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21	SECTION 1. DO NOT CODIFY. <u>Legislative findings and intent.</u>		
22	(a) The General Assembly finds that:		
23	(1) On October 12, 2017, through Executive Order 13813,		
24	President Trump directed, to the extent consistent with the law, the		
25	facilitation of the development and operation of a healthcare system that		
26	provides high-quality care at affordable prices for the American people by		
27	<pre>promoting choice and competition;</pre>		
28	(2) In response, the United States Department of Health and		
29	Human Series published a paper titled "Reforming America's Healthcare System		
30	Through Choice and Competition", which stated that healthcare markets could		
31	work more efficiently and Americans could receive more effective, high-value		
32	care if certain federal regulations and policies and state rules and policies		
33	that inhibit choice and competition were removed or revised;		
34	(3) Federal law allows pharmacists to work either autonomously		
35	or collaboratively to manage all facets of a patient's disease or condition,		
36	including without limitation to prescribe and monitor both legend and non-		

1	legend drug therapy;			
2	(4) Within the United States Department of Veterans Affairs,			
3	more than three thousand two hundred (3,200) pharmacists were credentialed			
4	and accounted for more than five million (5,000,000) patient encounters and			
5	prescribed over one million nine hundred thousand (1,900,000) prescriptions			
6	<u>in 2015;</u>			
7	(5) The United States Department of Veterans Affairs has			
8	authorized pharmacists to prescribe and provide direct patient care for more			
9	than twenty (20) years;			
10	(6) Pharmacists with the United States Indian Health Service may			
11	also practice at the top of their license under federal law;			
12	(7)(A) Pharmacists with the United States Indian Health Service			
13	fully apply their doctorate-level training and clinical knowledge and skills,			
14	which include prescribing and monitoring drug therapy.			
15	(B) Pharmacists with the United States Indian Health			
16	Service have pioneered innovative advanced patient management services for			
17	over thirty (30) years;			
18	(8)(A) Pharmacists in Arkansas have also been prescribing and			
19	monitoring drug therapy for the last thirty (30) years as authorized by			
20	various hospital pharmacies, therapeutic committees, executive committees,			
21	and other committees.			
22	(B) Hospital pharmacists often engage in the prescription			
23	of therapeutic substitutions, antibiotics for critically ill patients, renal			
24	drugs for patients with kidney disease, and insulin, and total parental			
25	nutrition management; and			
26	(9) State law should be amended to allow pharmacists to safely			
27	and effectively prescribe and monitor medications of patients.			
28	(b) It is the intent of this act to authorize pharmacists to prescribe			
29	and monitor medications.			
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31	SECTION 2. Arkansas Code § 17-92-101(17)(A)(i)(b), concerning the			
32	definition of "practice of pharmacy", is amended to read as follows:			
33	(b) Except as limited by rules adopted by the			
34	Arkansas State Board of Pharmacy, a pharmacist has the ability to administer,			
35	prescribe, and monitor medications.
