23	BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:

25	SECTION 1. <u>Title.</u>
26	This act shall be known and may be cited as the "Fresh Start Act of
27	<u>2021".</u>
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29	SECTION 2. Arkansas Code § 17-3-102 is amended to read as follows:
30	17-3-102. Licensing restrictions based on criminal records.
31	(a) An individual is not eligible to receive or hold a license issued
32	by a licensing entity if that individual has pleaded guilty or nolo
33	contendere to or been found guilty of any of the following offenses by any
34	court in the State of Arkansas or of any similar offense by a court in
35	another state or of any similar offense by a federal court, unless the
36	conviction was lawfully scaled under the Comprehensive Criminal Record

     or revocation of a license based on the conviction if a request for a waiver

     is made by:

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1	(2) A basis upon which a waiver may be granted includes without
2	limitation:
3	(A) The age at which the offense was committed;
4	(B) The circumstances surrounding the offense;
5	(C) The length of time since the offense was committed;
6	(D) Subsequent work history since the offense was
7	committed;
8	(E) Employment references since the offense was committed;
9	(F) Character references since the offense was committed;
10	(G) Relevance of the offense to the occupational license;
11	and
12	(H) Other evidence demonstrating that licensure of the
13	applicant does not pose a threat to the health or safety of the public.
14	(c) If an individual has a valid criminal conviction for an offense
15	that could disqualify the individual from receiving a license, the
16	disqualification shall not be considered for more than five (5) years from
17	the date of conviction or incarceration or on which probation ends, whichever
18	date is the latest, if the individual:
19	(A) Was not convicted for committing a violent or sexual
20	offense; and
21	(B) Has not been convicted of any other offense during the five-
22	year disqualification period.
23	(a) An individual shall not be disqualified from pursuing, practicing,
24	or engaging in any occupation or profession for which licensure is required
25	solely or in part because of a prior conviction of a crime, unless the crime
26	for which the individual was convicted directly relates to the duties and
27	responsibilities of the occupation or profession.
28	$\frac{(d)(b)}{(b)}$ A licensing entity shall not, as a basis upon which a license
29	may be granted or denied:
30	(1) Use vague or generic terms, including without limitation the
31	phrases "moral turpitude" and "good character"; or
32	(2) Consider arrests without a subsequent conviction.
33	(e) Due to the serious nature of the offenses, the following shall
34	result in permanent disqualification for licensure:

           (c)(1) On or before one hundred twenty (120) days after the effective

     date of this chapter, a licensing entity shall revise existing rules
21
     concerning licensure to explicitly list the specific criminal convictions

     that could disqualify an applicant from receiving licensure for a particular

     occupation or profession.

                 (2) In its rulemaking, a licensing entity shall list only
     disqualifying criminal convictions that are specifically and directly related
25

     to the duties and responsibilities for the occupation or profession.
           (d)(l) A licensing entity shall use the preponderance of the evidence
27
     standard of proof in examining the factors to determine whether an applicant

    with a disqualifying criminal conviction will be denied licensure.

                 (2) A licensing entity shall make a determination under
31
     subdivision (d)(1) of this section based on the following factors:

                       (A) The nature and seriousness of the offense for which
33
     the individual was convicted;

                       (B) The passage of time since the commission of the

     offense;
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1	(C) The relationship of the offense to the ability,
2	capacity, and fitness required to perform the duties and discharge the
3	responsibilities of the occupation or profession; and
4	(D) Any evidence of rehabilitation or treatment undertaken
5	by the individual that might mitigate against a direct relationship between
6	an element of the offense for which an applicant was convicted and a
7	responsibility inherent to the particular occupation or profession.
8	(e)(l) Notwithstanding any other law, if an individual has a valid
9	criminal conviction for an offense that could disqualify the individual from
10	receiving licensure, the disqualification shall not be considered for more
11	than five (5) years from the date of the conviction if the individual:
12	(A) Was not convicted of an offense that was violent or
13	sexual in nature;
14	(B) Was not convicted more than one (1) time for any
15	felony offense and does not have a criminal background that gives reason to
16	believe that he or she might pose a grave, serious, or substantial risk
17	concerning public safety that gives cause for denying licensure; or
18	(C) Has not been convicted of any other offense during the
19	five-year disqualification period.
20	(2)(A) The potential disqualification period may last longer if
21	an applicant with a disqualifying criminal conviction was incarcerated for an
22	offense that was violent or sexual in nature at any time during the previous
23	five (5) years.
24	(B) If the disqualification period lasts longer than the
25	period specified under subdivision (e)(1) of this section, the
26	disqualification shall last no longer than five (5) years from the date that
27	the individual was released from incarceration.
28	(f) This section shall apply to any new occupational licensure created
29	after the effective date of this chapter.
30	(f)(g) This chapter does not preclude a licensing entity from taking
31	emergency action against a licensee as authorized under § 25-15-211 for the
32	sake of public health, safety, or welfare.
33	(g) The permanent disqualification for an offense listed in subsection
34	(e) of this section does not apply to an individual who holds a valid license
35	on July 24, 2019.

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(h) This section does not apply to licensure or certification:

1	(1) Of professions not governed by this title;
2	(2) Of polygraph examiners and voice stress analysis examiners
3	under § 17-39-101 et seq.; or
4	(3) Of private investigators and private security agencies under
5	the Private Security Agency, Private Investigator, and School Security
6	Licensing and Credentialing Act, § 17-40-101 et seq.
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8	SECTION 3. Arkansas Code Title 17, Chapter 3, Subchapter 1, is amended
9	to add an additional section to read as follows:
10	17-3-105. Petition for review of licensing entity decisions.
11	(a)(l) An individual with a criminal record may petition a licensing
12	entity at any time for a determination of whether the criminal record of the
13	individual will disqualify the individual from licensure.
14	(2) The petition shall include details on the criminal record of
15	the individual.
16	(3) The licensing entity shall inform the individual of his or
17	her standing within thirty (30) days of receiving the petition from the
18	applicant.
19	(4) The licensing entity may charge a fee to recoup costs
20	associated with the petition not to exceed twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) for
21	each petition.
22	(b) If a licensing entity denies an individual licensure solely or in
23	part because of a prior conviction of an offense by the individual, the
24	licensing entity shall notify the individual in writing of the following:
25	(1) The grounds and reasons for the denial or disqualification;
26	(2) The right of the individual to a hearing to challenge the
27	decision of the licensing entity;
28	(3) The earliest date that the individual may reapply for
29	licensure; and
30	(4) The fact that evidence of rehabilitation may be considered
31	upon reapplication.
32	(c) A licensing entity shall document a determination that a criminal
33	conviction of an applicant is specifically listed as a disqualifying
34	conviction and is directly related to the duties and responsibilities of the
35	occupation or profession in written findings for each of the factors listed

1	in § 17-3-102 by a preponderance of the evidence sufficient for a reviewing
2	court.
3	(d) In an administrative hearing or civil litigation, the licensing
4	entity shall carry the burden of proof regarding whether the criminal
5	conviction directly relates to the occupation or profession for which
6	licensure is sought.
7	
8	SECTION 4. DO NOT CODIFY. Rules.
9	(a) A licensing entity shall adopt necessary rules for the
10	implementation of this act.
11	(b)(l) When adopting the initial rules to implement this act, the
12	final rule shall be filed with the Secretary of State for adoption under \S
13	<u>25-15-204(f):</u>
14	(A) On or before January 1, 2022; or
15	(B) If approval under § 10-3-309 has not occurred by
16	January 1, 2022, as soon as practicable after approval under § 10-3-309.
17	(2) A licensing entity shall file the proposed rule with the
18	Legislative Council under § 10-3-309(c) sufficiently in advance of January 1,
19	2022, so that the Legislative Council may consider the rule for approval
20	before January 1, 2022.
