6	SUSTAINABILITY.

8	WHEREAS, data demonstrates that a focus on primary care can improve
9	patient health through cost effectiveness and that there is a strong fiscal
10	and business case for preventative care; and
11	
12	WHEREAS, investing early in preventative care can reduce the need for
13	future complex and expensive treatments, saving money in the healthcare
14	system in the long run; and
15	
16	WHEREAS, studies show that one (1) or more primary care visits per year
17	is associated with increased likelihood of specific evidence-based preventive
18	care interventions that improve longitudinal health outcomes and decrease
19	healthcare costs, and that increasing efforts to track and increase the
20	number of primary care visits by clinics and healthcare systems may improve
21	patient compliance with select preventive measures; and
22	
23	WHEREAS, further studies show associations between primary care and
24	high-value care among both healthcare systems and Medicare fee-for-service
25	populations that lead to higher continuity of care, lower costs, and lower
26	hospitalization rates; and
27	
28	WHEREAS, spending on primary care remains, as a proportion of all
29	healthcare spending, significantly below desired rates in the United States;
30	and
31	
32	WHEREAS, Arkansas does not have state-specific healthcare spending
33	information to ensure the long term sustainability and efficacy of healthcare
34	in Arkansas through primary care investment,

36	NOW THEREFORE,

BE IT PROPOSED BY THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC HEALTH, WELFARE, AND LABOR OF THE NINETY-FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS: THAT the Senate Committee on Public Health, Welfare, and Labor study the amount of healthcare money expended on primary care providers and on primary care services across the state through data maintained in the Arkansas Healthcare Transparency Initiative's All-Payer Claims Database, as governed by the State Insurance Department and determine how to best support primary care physicians in Arkansas to reduce overall costs and improve the health of all Arkansans.
