1 INTERIM STUDY PROPOSAL 2017-020 2 REQUESTING THAT THE HOUSE COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC HEALTH, WELFARE, 3 4 AND LABOR STUDY THE IMPACT OF FETAL ALCOHOL SPECTRUM DISORDERS ON THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM AND MORE EFFECTIVE METHODS TO 5 6 REHABILITATE INDIVIDUALS WITH FETAL ALCOHOL SPECTRUM DISORDERS. 7 8 WHEREAS, fetal alcohol spectrum disorders are the leading preventable 9 causes of intellectual disabilities in the United States, but fetal alcohol 10 spectrum disorders are seldom diagnosed; and 11 WHEREAS, individuals with fetal alcohol spectrum disorders are much 12 more likely to be incarcerated than the general public with estimates ranging 13 from forty to fifty percent (40-50%) of individuals with fetal alcohol 14 15 spectrum disorders having been incarcerated at some point in their lives; and 16 17 WHEREAS, estimates of the number of people with fetal alcohol spectrum disorders are as high as four and eight-tenths percent (4.8%) of the 18 19 population, which means that the number of people in Arkansas with fetal 20 alcohol spectrum disorders could be more than one hundred thousand (100,000); 21 and 22 23 WHEREAS, fetal alcohol spectrum disorders may result from prenatal 24 exposure to alcohol and present as an array of cognitive, behavioral, and 25 physical problems; and 26 27 WHEREAS, the behavioral profile of an individual with fetal alcohol 28 spectrum disorders may include: 29 (1) Impulsivity that may be exhibited in the form of 30 shoplifting; 31 (2) Stealing due to a lack of understanding of personal 32 ownership; 33 (3) Fighting as a result of an overreaction; 34 (4) Running from the police, responding violently when 35 overwhelmed, or other behaviors motivated by fear; and

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1 (5) Becoming an accomplice when a primary criminal manipulates 2 an individual with fetal alcohol spectrum disorders into committing a crime; 3 and 4 5 WHEREAS, offenders with fetal alcohol spectrum disorders often commit 6 unreasonable crimes with a high risk for little reward, engage in minor 7 offenses with little to no escalation, and commit crimes with little to no 8 planning; and 9 10 WHEREAS, offenders with fetal alcohol spectrum disorders struggle to 11 follow parole and may have trouble linking unlawful behavior to the 12 punishment, resulting in general continuation of the unlawful behavior despite imprisonment, fines, or other punishments; and 13 14 15 WHEREAS, due to their trusting nature, individuals with fetal alcohol 16 spectrum disorders are also at a greater risk of becoming victims of crime; 17 and 18 19 WHEREAS, the impact of fetal alcohol spectrum disorders on the criminal justice system is significant, because individuals with fetal alcohol 20 21 spectrum disorders are at high risk of both becoming victims of crimes and 22 committing crimes themselves; and 23 24 WHEREAS, the State of Arkansas should study ways to reduce the impact 25 of fetal alcohol spectrum disorders on the criminal justice system as well as 26 more effective methods to rehabilitate individuals with fetal alcohol 27 spectrum disorders, 28 29 NOW THEREFORE, 30 BE IT PROPOSED BY THE HOUSE COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC HEALTH, WELFARE, AND LABOR OF 31 THE NINETY-FIRST GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS: 32 33 THAT the House Committee on Public Health, Welfare, and Labor study the impact of fetal alcohol spectrum disorders on the criminal justice system and 34 more effective methods to rehabilitate individuals with fetal alcohol 35 36 spectrum disorders.
