- (b) As used in this section, "four-day school week" means an educational program in which all students attend school for four (4) days a week but no fewer than the total number of hours required by the Standards for Accreditation of Arkansas Public Schools and School Districts in a five-day school week.
- (c) $\underline{(1)}$  The board of directors of <u>any a public</u> school district is <u>authorized to may</u> initiate and maintain a four-day school week in any or all of the public schools in the public school district.
- (2) The state board and the Department of Education shall not have the authority to approve or deny the decision of a public school district board of directors to initiate and maintain a four-day school week in any or all of its public schools under subdivision (c)(1) of this section.
- (d)(1) The State Board of Education state board shall establish appropriate standards, guidelines, and rules for only the following:
- (A)(i) The determination of average daily membership of school districts and for the distribution of state aid to each local <u>public</u> school district that elects to operate any or all of the public schools of its school district on a four-day school-week basis, to provide the <u>public</u> school district with an equitable share of <u>state</u> aid funds.
- (d)(1)(A)(i) of this section that are designated to equate a four-day school-week operation by the school district to ensure the educational opportunities provided by a public school district offering a four-day school week are equivalent to the educational opportunities provided by a public school district offering a five-day school week or a public school that follows a traditional calendar;

30	school week for any or all of its public schools that are in addition to the		
31	requirements under this subsection (d).		
32	(4) A public school district that initiates and maintains a		
33	four-day school week for any or all of its public schools under this section		
34	shall:		
35	(A) Demonstrate compliance with the requirements under		
36	subdivision (d)(1) of this section through a state-approved electronic

2	(B) Not be required to submit additional reports or		
3	demonstrations of compliance with the requirements under subdivision (d)(1)

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6	SECTION 2. EMERGENCY CLAUSE. It is found and determined by the		
7	General Assembly of the State of Arkansas that school districts must		
8	determine and publish their school calendars in advance of the upcoming 2025		
9	2026 school year; that school districts must have their school calendars		
10	established in order to prepare appropriate staffing, operational, and		
11	financial needs; that parents, students, staff members, and others associated		
12	with school districts must know in advance of the upcoming school year what		
13	the school calendar will be in order to make necessary arrangements; and that		
14	this act is immediately necessary to ensure school districts have the		
15	required information to arrange for and provide constitutionally mandated		
16	education to enrolled students. Therefore, an emergency is declared to exist		
17	and this act being immediately necessary for the preservation of the public		
18	peace, health, and safety shall become effective on:		
19	(1) The date of its approval by the Governor;		
20	(2) If the bill is neither approved nor vetoed by the Governor,		
21	the expiration of the period of time during which the Governor may veto the		
22	bill; or		
23	(3) If the bill is vetoed by the Governor and the veto is		
24	overridden, the date the last house overrides the veto.
