## ACT 786 Report

In 2019, the Task Force to Advance the State of Law Enforcement recommended that law enforcement agencies in the State of Arkansas seek and apply for federal, state, and local funding to aid in the implementation of state-of-the-art body cameras, as well as adequate server storage to aid in better surveillance for agencies. In response to the recommendation, the Arkansas General Assembly established the Public Safety Equipment Grant (Act 786) to be administered by the Secretary of the Arkansas Department of Public Safety. Specifically, the Public Safety Equipment Grant is designed to assist agencies in obtaining equipment that aids in improving trust and relationships between law enforcement agencies, detention centers, and corrections agencies, and the communities they serve.

This report is to provide an update on the progress, development, and activities pertaining to the Public Safety Equipment Grant established by Act 786 of October 1<sup>st</sup>, 2022. The Department of Public Safety (DPS) administers the grant through the Public Safety Equipment Grant Program (the "grant program"). The grant program assists agencies in achieving meaningful and measurable improvement in community trust and relationships by assisting with improvements in equipment and training. This report serves as an overview of the development of the grant program. The grant is awarded to assist with funding for equipment, training, or accreditation including without limitation:

- Body cameras with auto-activation capabilities;
- In-car cameras with auto-activation capabilities;
- Cloud-based storage devices; On premises server hardware and storage to accommodate on-premises installations;
- Conduct electrical devise and related training programs;
- Virtual reality training;
- Agency accreditation programs;
- Bulletproof vests; Pepper spray; Rubber bullets; and
- Other equipment as deemed necessary by the Secretary

## ALLOCATED FUNDING

In March 2021, the Arkansas General Assembly passed Act 995, a portion of which established a \$40 million appropriation for the grant program. On September 1, 2021, Arkansas Attorney General (AG) Rutledge invested \$500,000 in the grant fund, allowing for an initial allocation of grant funding to Arkansas agencies.

Following the FY 2022 allocation and distribution of \$500,000 in funding awards for the DPS Public Safety Equipment Grant Program (i.e., awardees announced on December 10<sup>th</sup>, 2021), on

March 8<sup>th</sup>, 2022, Governor Hutchinson signed Senate Bill 101, establishing a transfer of \$10 million dollars from the Governors Restricted Reserve funding into the DPS Public Safety Equipment Grant fund for the FY 2023 Grant Cycle. Subsequently, on July 22<sup>nd</sup>, 2022, the Arkansas Department of Finance and Administration (DFA) implemented the official transfer of the allocated \$10 million dollars from the Governors Restricted Reserve fund into DPS Public Safety Equipment Grant Program fund.

## PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT

Following the enactment of Acts 786 and 995, the Department of Public Safety began working with subject matter experts to develop guidelines for the grant program consisting of program parameters, application design and evaluation construction, anticipated statistical methodologies for measuring program deliverables, advertisement of funding, grant committee recruitment, and a feasible timeline of activities.

- A. Development and Review of Grant Program Process
  - i. On July 20<sup>th</sup>, 2021, DPS held its first meeting regarding Act 786. The meeting included subject matter experts, law enforcement representatives, and Arkansas stakeholders to discuss the following elements:
    - a. Secretary Cook selected Arkansas State Police LTC Shawn Garner to serve as the administrator for the grant program. LTC Garner served as the lead contact for grant development. LTC Garner was also asked to provide recommendations of individuals to serve on the grant committee.
    - b. Secretary Cook and LTC Garner, along with subject matter experts, law enforcement representatives, and Arkansas stakeholders met to determine the selection process and establishment of the DPS Public Safety Equipment Grant Committee and reviewed the proposed grant program description and application instructions, anticipated award selection process, application evaluation, timeline of events, DPS Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), and statistical analysis for program deliverables and provided insight and recommendations.
    - c. Secretary Cook and LTC Garner, along with subject matter experts, law enforcement representatives, and Arkansas stakeholders determined that the DPS Public Safety Equipment Grant would consist of 15 representatives from the following entities:

- On April 20<sup>th</sup>, 2022, the DPS Public Safety Equipment Grant Committee reconvened to discuss and identify any necessary adjustments for the FY 2023 Grant Cycle. The Grant Committee voted on the following changes:
  - a. The Grant Committee voted to transition the DPS Public Safety Equipment Grant Application process to an online portal format to provide an ease of services to applicants.
  - b. The Grant Committee voted to adjust the Grant Application timeline and to implement a \$100,000.00 dollar funding award cap to provide consistency in award funding for the upcoming FY 2023 Grant Cycle.
- iii. On April 21<sup>st</sup>, the DPS Research and Planning Unit collaborated with the DPS IT division to begin the development of the DPS Public Safety Equipment Grant Online Application Portal. Following the development of the online application, the DPS Research and Planning division distributed the newly developed online application portal to the Grant Committee on May 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2022, to garner feedback for application changes.
- iv. On June 16<sup>th</sup>, 2022, the DPS Public Safety Equipment Grant Committee met to finalize the Grant Application online portal and Grant Timeline for the official opening date for application submissions on July 1<sup>st</sup>, 2022.

On March 23<sup>rd</sup>, 2022, DPS Secretary Cook appointed Lieutenant Jeff Whitlock to serve as co-chair of the FY 2023 DPS Public Safety Equipment Committee and to replace the FY 2022 DPS Public Safety Equipment Chair, retired LTC Shawn Garner on July 31<sup>st</sup>, 2022. Following Chair LTC Shawn Garner's retirement on July 31<sup>st</sup>, 2022, the DPS Public Safety Equipment Grant Committee was overseen by Chair Jeff Whitlock, with no changes to the Grant Committee representatives.
- C. Program Implementation
  - i. On September 15<sup>th</sup>, 2021, the DPS Public Safety Equipment Grant Committee convened to review and approve the grant program and discuss the notification protocol for agencies through various DPS communication platforms. The following components were addressed:
    - a. The Grant Committee selected October 1<sup>st</sup>, 2021, as the opening of the FY 2022 Grant Application Process and finalized the DPS Public Safety Grant Equipment Timeline. The official timeline of events regarding the DPS Public Safety Equipment Grant application process and distribution of funding for law enforcement agencies is detailed below:

- On October 1<sup>st</sup>, 2021, an official announcement from the DPS Secretary, Jami Cook, was made detailing the opening of the DPS Public Safety Equipment Grant Program consisting of:
  - a. The approved and published DPS Public Safety Equipment Grant Instructions Guide for all applicable agencies.
  - b. Selection of the Grant Program Instruction Webinar series, held by Dr. Mary Hughes, Director of DPS Research and Planning Unit were established. Each Grant Program Instruction webinar was recorded to assist law enforcement agencies unable to attend the online webinar series. Subsequently, the DPS Research and Planning Unit placed the recorded presentations on the DPS Public Safety Equipment Grant Program webpage as a resource for eligible law enforcement agency applicants. The grant webinars were conducted on the following dates:

    - Webinar Two: Thursday, November 4, 2021
  - c. Formalized FY 2022 Grant Application Timeline detailing all necessary grant programmatic dates.
- iii. The Grant Committee held a total of two (2) application submission review process meetings between November 30<sup>th</sup> and December 10<sup>th</sup> of 2021. On November 30<sup>th</sup>, 2021, the DPS Public Safety Equipment Grant Committee Grant Committee held its first meeting to begin the review process of eligible application submissions. The submissions consisted of the following:
  - a. The FY 2022 DPS Public Safety Equipment Grant Program received a total of 161 application submissions, with a total of \$5,314,558.74 in grant funding requests. Of the submitted applications a total of 151 (93.79%) completed the requirements for eligibility, with 6 (3.73%) identified as *late* submissions and 4 (2.48%) of applications identified as *incomplete*. As a result, only 151 (97.79%) of applications were sent to

the Grant Committee for review. The total request amount of funding for the 151 (93.79%) eligible applications was \$4,973,271.75.

- b. For the FY 2022 DPS Public Safety Equipment Grant Program, the Grant Committee received a total of 96 (63.58%) of eligible applications requesting body camera equipment. Of the remaining eligible application submissions, 32 (21.19%) of applications requested items including in-car cameras, cloud-based storage, on-premises server hardware and storage equipment, conducted electrical devise & programs, virtual reality training equipment, and ballistic vests; and 23 (15.23%) of applications requested items "as deemed necessary by the DPS Secretary."
- c. Given the high volume of applications (i.e., 151 total eligible applications) for the FY 2022 Public Safety Equipment Grant Program and limited grant fund of \$500,000.00, per lines 28 36 of Act 786, (i.e., "*The Task Force to Advance the State of Law Enforcement in Arkansas specifically recommended that law enforcement agencies in the State of Arkansas seek and apply for federal, state, and local funding opportunities to aid in the implementation of state-of-the-art body cameras, as well as adequate server storage to aid in better surveillance for all agencies. The task force advocated for funding legislation that helps to ensure that all front-line duty officers will be wearing state-of-the-art body cameras by 2026") the Grant Committee voted to <i>only* review applications (i.e., 96 eligible applications) requesting body camera equipment.
- d. Following the initial grant review meeting, the DPS Public Safety Equipment Grant Committee Grant Committee held a second and concluding meeting on December 6<sup>th</sup>, 2021, to finalize the selection of Grant Awardees. Awarded applications consisted of both *full* and *partial* funding awards (i.e., partial awards are defined as less than the applicants initial funding request).

iv. On December 6<sup>th</sup>, 2021, the DPS Public Safety Equipment Grant Committee selected a total of 31 applications to be awarded funding, which consisted of the distribution of the total \$500,000.00 grant fund allocated for the grant program. The following eligible applicants were awarded:

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2	SECTION 4. EMERGENCY CLAUSE. It is found and determined by the
3	General Assembly of the State of Arkansas that nonlethal equipment can save
4	lives and improve transparency between law enforcement and the communities
5	that they serve; and that this act provides for the nonlethal equipment
6	necessary to save lives and improve transparency. Therefore, an emergency is
7	declared to exist, and this act being immediately necessary for the
8	improvement of transparency between law enforcement and the communities that
9	they serve shall become effective on:
10	(1) The date of its approval by the Governor;
11	(2) If the bill is neither approved nor vetoed by the Governor,
12	the expiration of the period of time during which the Governor may veto the
13	bill; or
14	(3) If the bill is vetoed by the Governor and the veto is
15	overridden, the date the last house overrides the veto.
