Fraud Referrals and Prosecutions

A. Arkansas Attorney General's Medicaid Fraud Control Unit

According to Ark. Code Ann. § 20-77-2506, the Medicaid Inspector General shall work with the Medicaid Fraud Control Unit (MFCU) of the Office of the Arkansas Attorney General, prosecuting attorneys, and law enforcement agencies. OMIG makes referrals to MFCU when there is a credible allegation of fraud. *See* 42 CFR § 455.23.

From January 1, 2024, to March 31, 2024, one Medicaid provider investigation was referred to MFCU.

B. Other Fraud Referrals

In addition to referrals of suspected fraud to the Arkansas Attorney General's Office, OMIG shall also make referrals and coordinate efforts with other federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies. *See* Ark. Code Ann. § 20-77-2506(2).

From January 1, 2024, to March 31, 2024, four Medicaid recipients have been referred to the Labor Board, DHS, and local law enforcement for further investigation.
