Re: Arkansas Forestry Commission monthly activity report for September 2020

Dear Senator Bledsoe and Representative Wardlaw:

Per Section 33 of Act 544 of the 2019 General Session, the Arkansas Forestry Commission (AFC) is to report monthly fiscal and agency activities to the Arkansas Legislative Council. Please find attached the report for September 2020.

September started with rain and high winds. Forestry crews responded to debris removal calls on September 1st and September 9th. Fire danger in Arkansas has been low due to frequent rainfall and Forestry crews were available to answer assistance calls from other states.

On September 15, 2020 the Arkansas Razorback Crew, a twenty-person wildfire crew, left the state to assist Oregon on the Thielsen fire, a 10,000-acre wildfire. The crew assisted on the Thielsen fire until returning home on October 3, 2020.

Work detail assignments allow Arkansas firefighters to gain knowledge, experience and team building skills that are brought back to Arkansas. This experience and knowledge will be used on Arkansas wildfires and to train other Arkansas firefighters.

Hats off to the Razorback Crew for keeping Arkansas on the front lines of fire suppression, even when out of state.

Arkansas Department of Agriculture Forestry Division September 2020 Activity and Fiscal Report

EMERGENCY SERVICES

Wildfires: During September a total of 11 wildfires were suppressed for a total of 23 acres burned. Ten-year average for the month of September is 92 wildfires with 1,321 acres burned.

Storm Damage Assistance: ADA - Forestry Division crews in Faulkner, Cleburne Counties assisted in storm damage clean up in the Wooster and Wildflower Road area on September 1st, Newton County crews assisted in the Buffalo Tower area on Sept 9th.

Rural Fire Protection: Rural Fire Protection (RFP) assists fire departments (FDs) with organization, training and equipment. RFP provides interest-free loans, secures firefighting and emergency service equipment from the federal government and administers a federal grant to assist approximately 925 fire departments. The RFP shop provides maintenance and refurbishment to federal property destined for FDs and repairs Department of Agriculture equipment as well.

September 2020

- Two tankers, six brush trucks, two service trucks and one boat/motor/trailer were issued this month (original acquisition cost (o.a.c. \$519,319.06).
- RFP received 280 items from the Department of Defense (DOD) Recycling Control Point (RCP) to include tool kits, tarps, flags, masks, ladders, plasma cutters and other firefighting equipment (o.a.c. \$104,032.95).
- RFP received two brush trucks (o.a.c. \$281,054.00), three boats with trailers & motors (o.a.c. \$15,037.00), one freightliner (o.a.c. \$110,910.00), five generator sets (o.a.c. \$130,059.00) and three miscellaneous items to include a tent, a decontamination trailer and a Compressed Air Foam (CAF) fire system (o.a.c. \$131,473.54).
- The RFP shop completed maintenance on four Forestry vehicles/equipment and four FD vehicles (labor savings of \$13,675.00).
- RFP provided four interest-free loans via the Rural Fire Revolving Loan Fund:
 - Arkansas City (D1, Desha Co.) \$6,750.00 to purchase Self Contained Breathing Apparatuses (SCBA) packs, masks & cylinders.
 - o Pleasant View FD (D6, Franklin Co.) \$8,841.75 to purchase a 2009 Ford F-250 pickup w/maintenance bed, lights, siren, speaker and pump & engine.

- Southwest Rural VFD (D5, Hot Spring Co.) \$15,000.00 to purchase a 2000 International 4900 Pumper.
- O'Kean FD (D8, Randolph Co.) \$15,000.00 to purchase a 1997 Freightliner FL112 Pumper.
- FY20 Federal Inventory has been cleared by the United States Forest Service (USFS). FY21 Federal Inventory is ongoing- cleared for thirty-eight counties plus, Aviation and Baucum.
- Attended the quarterly Fire Protection Services Board meeting on 9/9/20.
- Made several in-state trips along with several out-of-state trips to include Norfolk, VA; Fort Hood, TX; Colorado Springs, CO and Arnold AFB, TN.

Firewise: Firewise staff and district personnel work with fire departments and civic organizations to make communities safer from the threat of wildfire through mitigation projects and community education initiatives. Arkansas is one of the top states with 103 active Firewise communities. Recognized communities display Firewise signs at the city limits.

Firewise achieved the following in September:

- Delivered Smokey Materials to District 7 (Greenbrier) and Little Rock Headquarters.
- Delivered two initial program presentations to interested departments and one county fire chief's meeting.
- Delivered recognition signage and trophy to one new community, as well as 15-year recognition signage to three communities.
- Ordered masks with Forestry Division and Firewise USA logos to be delivered to districts and utilized by Forestry personnel and active Firewise departments/communities.
- Firewise efforts by personnel across the state include: one Landowner Assist, two Fire Department Meetings Attended, 26 Fire Chief Visits, two Project Assists, one Paperwork Assist and four Literature Distributions.

Law Enforcement: The Department has the authority to enforce the laws of the State of Arkansas, but primarily focuses on unlawful dumping, timber theft, forest fires, and forestry equipment theft and vandalism. The Department aggressively seeks prosecution of violators to deter such crimes. The Department Investigators and district law enforcement officers opened six Timber Theft Cases, one Dumping Case and one Fire Case. They closed one Timber Theft Case, one Dumping Case and one Property Case.

FOREST MANAGEMENT

Forest Stewardship/Rural Forestry Assistance Programs: The Forestry Division works with a diverse group of partners and professionals to conserve, protect, and enhance Arkansas's forests. The Forest Stewardship Program (FSP) is an opportunity for non-industrial private forest landowners who are interested in managing their property for wildlife, recreation, soil and water conservation, agro-forestry and/or for timber production to get a comprehensive multiple use forest management plan that is prepared by private consulting or Division foresters, private consulting or Arkansas Game and Fish Commission (AGFC) private lands wildlife biologists, and United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) soil and water professionals. Arkansas has 396,704 acres of private land actively

enrolled in the Forest Stewardship Program. Landowners that implement practices under their FSP management plans become Certified Forest Stewards. There are 1,267 Forest Stewards owning 285,565 acres in the State.

During the month of September, nine Forest Stewardship management plans were prepared for 2,854 acres. In addition, Forestry Division personnel provide technical assistance through the rural forestry program to landowners that are enrolled in USDA tree planting and forest management programs such as the Conservation Reserve Program, Environmental Quality Incentives Program, Wetland Reserve Program, and the Southern Pine Beetle Prevention and Restoration Program. Forestry Division personnel prepared 110 forest management practice plans on 7,803 acres and conducted four prescribed burns on 350 acres.

Urban & Community Forestry Assistance: Urban & Community Forestry Program staff provide assistance and training to communities, educational institutions, non-profit organizations, developers, and homeowners on urban tree care, inventory and management.

Urban staff completed:

- Five Urban & Community Forestry Grants were awarded to the following communities/entities: City of Pine Bluff (tree improvement/tree planting project at multiple parks), City of Trumann (park improvement project), Conway Tree Board (interstate exit beautification project), Crooked Creek Conservation District (park improvement project) and University of Arkansas Little Rock Public Radio (urban forestry/tree planting radio campaign).
- A total of 28 applications were received from schools across the state seeking assistance from the Shade Trees on Playgrounds (STOP) program. Selected schools will be notified on October 9th.
- Harold Fisher, Urban Forestry Partnership Coordinator, and Lori Scott-Nakai, Marketing, collaborated on a project adding information about whether each species on the Arkansas Champion Tree page is native or non-native to Arkansas.
- Five trees were donated from stock at Bluff City to be planted on the courthouse lawn in Lewisville. The Lafayette County field staff from Forestry Division delivered and planted the trees, which were replacing older trees lost in recent storms.
- Urban Forestry Representative Kenny Smothers (D8) assisted the city of Melbourne with their Arbor Day ceremony, planting a 25-gallon northern red oak.

Reforestation: The Forestry Division's tree improvement program strives to provide landowners with the highest possible genetic gain in pine and hardwood seed. One method The Forestry Division employs to achieve this objective is by establishing the highest genetic gain material in our newest pine and hardwood seed orchards. The Forestry Division's Baucum Nursery then makes available to landowners the improved varieties of pine and hardwood, which are the net result of the tree improvement program.

Baucum Nursery: Division's Baucum Nursery produces hardwood and pine seedlings for reforestation and afforestation efforts.

Regular season seedling sales began on July 16. Year to date through September 30, there were 298 online orders and 63 paper orders. Total sales of 940,075 pine and 4,812,375 hardwood. Comparatively, during the same period in FY20, there were 185 online orders and 88 paper orders. Total sales of 609,075 pine and 5,923,550 hardwood

During the month of September, Baucum Nursery staff completed the following:

- Removed the old seed freezer unit compressor and condenser.
- Cleaned hardwood packing shed.
- Repaired the entry road with grader and land plane.
- Spread new gravel on entry road.
- Continued field inventory of all seedlings.
- Continued preparing fields for fall methyl bromide treatment.
- The following cultural practices were completed for growing of the FY21 crop:
 - o Top pruned all crops on a weekly basis as needed.
 - o Applied urea fertilizer on a weekly basis as needed.
 - o Plowed between beds in all planted fields to aerate soil and stabilize beds on a weekly basis as needed.

Tree Improvement: Division's tree improvement program provides landowners with the highest possible genetic gain in pine and hardwood seed.

During the month of September, the Bluff City Tree Improvement staff completed the following:

- Completed monthly fertilizer application.
- About 20 downed or broken trees in orchards caused by the tropical storm were removed.
- Cleaned and disked new urban orchard site.
- Inventoried production orchards for cone harvest.
- Floated cones for ripeness to determine start of harvest.

Best Management Practices (BMP): The Forestry Division provides BMP training to loggers and timber companies, conducts courtesy exams prior or during timber harvest operations and addresses logging complaints.

BMP achieved the following in September:

- Made plans with Central Arkansas Water and Forestry Division for work on demonstration road in Pulaski County.
- Examined two post-harvest tracts for Green Bay Packaging and reported results to company for Sustainable Forestry Initiative (S.F.I.) audit.
- Examined two tracts for Saline River Conservation Association in Saline County.
- Attended webinar hosted by Georgia Forestry Commission on BMP methods for erosion control.

- Visited older complaint site in Garland County for removal of decked logs and close-out worked preformed.
- Training provided to AGFC on Fireline construction with 23 employees in attendance. Assisted by Forestry Division crew.
- Examination in Ouachita County on NRCS landowner tract for water bar construction.

Forest Inventory and Analysis (FIA): Forestry Division in cooperation with the USDA Forest Service Southern Research Station is responsible for collecting scientific data from permanently established plots located all over the state. The plots, each representing 5,937 acres, are strategically located on a three-mile by three-mile grid. The inventory plots have been generating data since they were established in the 1950's. Natural resource managers use the data to make management decisions and follow Arkansas's natural resource trends through time.

FIA completed 84 plots for the month of September. We are now 75% complete with 2020 survey.
