Re: Arkansas Forestry Commission monthly activity report for June 2013

Dear Senator Bookout and Representative Edwards:

Per Act 434 of the 2013 General Session, Section 48, the Arkansas Forestry Commission is to report monthly fiscal and agency activities to the Arkansas Legislative Council. Please find attached the report for June 2013.

Arkansas has experienced a low wildfire occurrence since January 2013 as compared to the wildfire occurrence Arkansas experienced for the same time period in 2012. January through June 2012, Arkansas had 1,078 fires that burned 16,264 acres. January through June 2013, Arkansas has had 391 fires that have burned 5,128 acres.

Our traditional summer wildfire season in Arkansas is generally July through September. Today, Arkansas has 7 counties under burn bans. Summer fire season is starting as usual.

ARKANSAS FORESTRY COMMISSION June 2013 Activity and Fiscal Report

FIRE PROTECTION

Wildfires: During June, a total of 29 wildfires were suppressed for a total of 189 acres burned. Ten year average for the month of June is 96 fires for 996 acres burned.

Search and Rescue Assistance: AFC crews assisted in 2 search and rescue operations in Johnson and Washington Counties.

Rural Fire Protection: Rural Fire Protection (RFP) assists rural volunteer fire departments with organization, training and equipment. RFP provides interest-free loans and administers federal grants to assist approximately 1,000 volunteer rural fire departments. The RFP shop provides maintenance to AFC equipment.

In June, forty-four rural fire departments (117 firefighters) were provided wildland fire training. Seventeen Department of Defense (DOD) trucks were picked up from military posts that will be refurbished and provided to fire departments for use as fire trucks, brush trucks, or tankers. 4,695 DOD Recycling Control Point (RCP) firefighter equipment items were issued to rural fire departments such flashlights, safety glasses, gloves, emergency revolving lights, and boots. RFP provided two rural fire department loans through the Revolving Fund for a total of \$27,485.00 (Genoa- Miller County and St. Vincent- Conway County).

The RFP shop completed maintenance on six AFC vehicles and dozers.

Firewise: Firewise staff and district personnel work with fire departments and civic organizations to make communities safer from the threat of wildfire through mitigation projects and community education initiatives. Arkansas leads the nation with 115 active Firewise communities in 2012. Recognized communities display Firewise signs at the city limits.

In June, Firewise staff assisted six communities/fire departments with renewal efforts, conducted two initial presentations about the Firewise program, one risk assessment training, and conducted three Firewise recognition ceremonies. Staff attended the Hilltop Firewise Day and provided materials for three additional Firewise Day events. Firewise staff taught one 8-hour Wildland Firefighting class.

Firewise staff visited 11 AFC county and district offices to discuss Firewise programs in their area and met with 23 fire chiefs to provide information on Firewise. Firewise staff provided information to 250 communities who have participated in Firewise. Staff talked with four county Office of Emergency Management coordinators about Firewise. Staff conducted routine inspections of equipment bought with Firewise grants.

Firewise staff attended the Fire Fighters Memorial Board Committee meeting and the Fire Boat School Committee meeting and worked at 2013 Fire Boat School.

National Firewise advisors attended the opening event at the 2013 Fire Boat School and recognized former Arkansas Firewise Coordinator Matt Simpson. Staff attended the Arkansas State Firefighters Association and Arkansas Fire Chiefs Convention, visiting with participants and handing out eleven packets to fire chiefs interested in the Firewise program.

Firewise staff prepared three media releases and responded to eight media calls about fire prevention, and updated the Firewise Website and Facebook Page.

Law Enforcement: Forestry Commission has the authority to enforce the State's laws pertaining to unlawful dumping, timber theft, forest fires, and equipment theft and vandalism. Forestry Commission aggressively seeks prosecution of violators to deter such crimes. In June, AFC Investigators and district law enforcement officers worked 2 fire related, 3 unlawful dumping, 3 equipment related and 8 timber theft cases.

FOREST MANAGEMENT

Forest Stewardship/Rural Forestry Assistance Programs: The AFC works with a diverse group of partners and professionals to conserve, protect, and enhance Arkansas's forests. The Forest Stewardship Program (FSP) is an opportunity for a non-industrial private forest landowner interested in managing their property for wildlife, recreation, soil and water conservation, agro-forestry, aesthetics, and/or timber production to have a comprehensive multiple use forest management plan prepared. Private consulting or AFC foresters working in conjunction with private consulting or AGFC private lands wildlife biologists, and USDA Natural Resource Conservation Service soil and water professionals collaboratively develop the multi-resource management plan for the landowner.

Arkansas has 4,596 landowners owning 846,184 acres enrolled in the FSP. For June, 46 FSP plans were prepared on 6,320 acres. Landowners that implement practices under their FSP management plans become certified Forest Stewards. In June, 27 landowners owning 5,424 acres were certified as Forest Stewards. Arkansas has 1,257 Forest Stewards owning 283,528 acres.

In addition to the FSP, AFC personnel provide technical assistance through the rural forestry program to landowners enrolled in USDA tree planting and forest management programs such as: the Conservation Reserve Program, Environmental Quality Incentives Program, and Wetland Reserve Program. For June, AFC foresters prepared 20 rural forestry program forest management plans on 1,723 acres. In addition, AFC personnel constructed 61,000 feet of fire lanes.

Forest Health: AFC offers cost-share incentives to landowners for thinning and restoration work in pine stands as part of a comprehensive federal Southern Pine Beetle (SPB) Prevention Program. This program is well-received by landowners. For June, 8 projects on 301 acres were completed.

Variable Oakleaf Caterpillar damage is being reported across the state. All species of oaks are attacked. These oak defoliators have 2 generations per year- late April and late July. Under normal conditions, little damage is done. However, when trees are under stress (last 3 years of drought conditions) the additional stress may trigger mortality. The public is being informed through news and other electronic media that lawn and other similar high value trees will need to be watered to reduce stress.

Concerns with dying or declining oak trees in northwest and north central Arkansas are being reported. Respective County Foresters are checking with the landowners to identify problems. The oak decline is due in part to the three drought years (2010-2012).

Urban forestry assistance: Urban Forestry Program staff provides assistance and training to communities, educational institutions, non-profit organizations, developers and homeowners on urban tree care, inventory and management.

The Urban Forest Strike Team Leader refresher training workshop was held in Raleigh, NC June 17-18, 2013 in which AFC personnel participated. UFST's are self-contained, professionally trained Certified Arborists or urban foresters from state forestry agencies, other state and municipal agencies, consulting and commercial arboricultural firms, the USDA Forest Service, and other federal agencies that are specifically trained to assess risk on storm-damaged trees. These teams are deployed to document trees that meet FEMA debris management criteria for Public Assistance reimbursement, assist communities with risk mitigation of storm-damaged trees, and retain as many viable trees as possible.

The objective of the UFST post-disaster rapid tree risk assessment is to identify the risk that storm-damaged trees pose to people and property on publicly managed land and to private property in areas designated by the controlling authority and to make professional recommendations to mitigate that risk. The risk assessment and other data collected are provided to assist the controlling authority with prioritization of the recommended mitigation.

Baucum Nursery: AFC's Baucum Nursery grows hardwood and pine seedlings for reforestation and afforestation efforts. For the 2013-2014 season the target number for pine is 4,105,000 seedlings and hardwood is 5,350,000 seedlings.

During this time of year Baucum Nursery personnel are busy keeping weeds out of the beds and providing all the necessary water, fertilizer and pesticides. Seedling height must be managed, so as seedlings grow top pruning will be added to the list of cultural practices.

Tree Improvement: AFC's tree improvement program provides landowners with the highest possible genetic gain in pine and hardwood seed. One of AFC's objectives in tree improvement is establishing the highest genetic gain material in our newest seed orchards. AFC Baucum Nursery makes available to landowners the improved varieties of pine and hardwood. Landowners can view what tree species are available for sale by the AFC and can purchase AFC seedlings through the AFC website.

Teachers on a tour with the Arkansas Forestry Association were hosted and provided information forest tree genetics by AFC Tree Improvement personnel.

Best Management Practices: AFC provides BMP training to loggers and timber companies, conducts courtesy exams prior or during timber harvest operations and addresses logging complaints.

During June, the BMP coordinator conducted provided one technical logger training session and one courtesy exam.

BMP Coordinator is working with the Arkansas Timber Producers Association planning committee for the Southwest Forest Products Expo to be held August 23-24, 2013 at Hot Springs.

BMP coordinator is providing onsite supervision for the Central Arkansas Water BMP fire break/roads project. BMP Coordinator continues to work on the USDA Forest Service competitive grant that will provide funds for AFC to design and implement a BMP demonstration area on the Poison Springs State Forest.

Forest Inventory and Analysis: AFC in cooperation with the USDA Forest Service Southern Research Station is responsible for collecting scientific data from permanently established plots located all over the state. The plots, each representing 5,937 acres, are strategically located on a three-mile by three-mile grid. The inventory plots have been generating data since they were established in the 1950's. Natural resource managers use the data to make management decisions and follow Arkansas' natural resource trends through time.

For June, FIA personnel have measured and submitted data on 97 plots.

CONSERVATION EDUCATION

Conservation Education programs include presentations to schools and civic organizations, news articles and other media programs. With the loss of Conservation Education staff, the State Forester and other staff conducted media and civic organization presentations that are not included in the district reporting. During June, the districts reported 14 news articles, 47 presentations to schools or civic organizations, 2 tree planting events with communities or schools and 3 exhibits at public events.
