Per Act 434 of the 89<sup>th</sup> General Assembly, Section 48, the Arkansas Forestry Commission is to report monthly fiscal and agency activities to the Arkansas Legislative Council. Please find attached the report for June 2014.

AFC rangers and foresters work with schools to educate students and teachers on the environmental and economic importance of trees and Arkansas's forests. Since January, AFC personnel have made 430 presentations to schools. In June, AFC Public Information Coordinator Adriane Barnes and I made a presentation at the Arkansas Forestry Association's Teacher Conservation workshop being held near Russellville providing information on Arkansas's forests for teachers to take back to the classroom.

Whether working with Future Farmers of America forestry teams, Boys State, or schools, educating the next generation of decision makers is important in AFC's strategic plan.

# ARKANSAS FORESTRY COMMISSION June 2014 Activity and Fiscal Report

#### **FIRE PROTECTION**

Wildfires: During June, a total of 14 wildfires were suppressed for a total of 27 acres burned. Ten year average for the month of June is 97 wildfires for 995 acres burned.

**Rural Fire Protection:** Rural Fire Protection (RFP) assists rural volunteer fire departments with organization, training and equipment. RFP provides interest-free loans and administers federal grants to assist approximately 1,000 volunteer rural fire departments. The RFP shop provides maintenance to AFC equipment.

In June, 34 rural fire departments (102 firefighters) were provided wildland fire training. Ten Department of Defense (DOD) trucks (valued at \$308,043.34) were picked up from military posts that will be refurbished and provided to fire departments for use as fire trucks, brush trucks, or tankers. 3,475 DOD Recycling Control Point (RCP) items (valued at \$746,395.46) were received for redistribution to VFD's such as tires, flashlights, boots, and cooling vests.

The RFP shop completed maintenance on four AFC vehicles and dozers.

**Firewise:** Firewise staff and district personnel work with fire departments and civic organizations to make communities safer from the threat of wildfire through mitigation projects and community education initiatives. Arkansas leads the nation with 131 active Firewise communities in 2013. Recognized communities display Firewise signs at the city limits.

In June, Firewise staff assisted eight communities/fire departments with Firewise renewal efforts, assisted one community with a Community Wildfire Protection Plan, and conducted seven presentations about the Firewise program. Firewise staff worked on a mitigation project in Adona (Perry County). Firewise staff conducted two risk assessment trainings.

Firewise staff visited 14 AFC county and district offices to discuss Firewise programs in their area and met with 42 fire chiefs to provide information on Firewise. Firewise staff talked with eight county Office of Emergency Management coordinators about Firewise. Firewise staff provided educational material for eight Firewise events and attended the Holland (Faulkner County) Education Day.

Firewise staff assisted with three media releases, responded to three media calls about fire prevention and fire danger and the Firewise plan, and updated Facebook site and <a href="www.arkansasfirewise.com">www.arkansasfirewise.com</a>. Firewise staff did a radio interview in Searcy.

Firewise staff assisted with the Fire Boat School and the ADEM Capstone 14 disaster exercise. Firewise staff collaborated with five other organizations including the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts on Firewise and AFC programs. Firewise staff attended the Joint Convention of Arkansas Fire Chiefs in Hot Springs.

Law Enforcement: AFC has the authority to enforce the laws of the State of Arkansas, but focuses primarily on unlawful dumping, timber theft, forest fires, and forestry equipment theft and vandalism. AFC aggressively seeks prosecution of violators to deter such crimes. In June, AFC Investigators and district law enforcement officers opened 4 dumping, 2 fire related and 4 timber theft cases.

#### FOREST MANAGEMENT

Forest Stewardship/Rural Forestry Assistance Programs: Forestry Commission works with a diverse group of partners and professionals to conserve, protect, and enhance Arkansas's forests. The Forest Stewardship Program (FSP) is an opportunity for non-industrial private forest landowners who are interested in managing their property for wildlife, recreation, soil and water conservation, agro-forestry and/or for timber production to get a comprehensive multiple use forest management plan that is prepared by private consulting or AFC foresters, private consulting or AGFC private lands wildlife biologists, and USDA Natural Resource Conservation Service soil and water professionals. Arkansas has 4,598 landowners owning 848,805 acres that are enrolled in FSP. Landowners that implement practices under their FSP management plans become Forest Stewards. Arkansas has 1,309 Forest Stewards owning 282,113 acres.

For June, 28 FSP plans were prepared on 3,367 acres. In addition, AFC personnel provide technical assistance through the rural forestry program to landowners that are enrolled in USDA tree planting and forest management programs such as the Conservation Reserve Program, Environmental Quality Incentives Program, Wetland Reserve Program, and AFC Southern Pine Beetle Prevention and Restoration Program. AFC foresters prepared 52 rural forestry management plans on 4,308 acres. AFC personnel constructed 17,840 feet of fire lane.

**Urban Forestry Assistance:** Urban Forestry Program staff provides assistance and training to communities, educational institutions, non-profit organizations, developers and homeowners on urban tree care, inventory and management.

The University of Central Arkansas recently completed a low impact development (LID) garden and parking area on the campus. A portion of this project was funded through an urban and community forestry grant. The LID project was designed by the U of A Community Design Center. The demonstration landscape features a storm water runoff treatment network that cleans the water before it goes back into the ground. The role of trees on the site demonstrates how storm water runoff can be managed and kept on site for water quality and runoff volume compared to conventional solutions. A variety of native trees were planted on the site.

Baucum Nursery: AFC's Baucum Nursery produces hardwood and pine seedlings for reforestation and afforestation efforts.

The new precession sower has been delivered. The sower will be used for pine and small seeded hardwood crops. The new precession sower will be used next year since tree crops have already been planted.

Baucum Nursery crew has been providing necessary cultural practices to the pine and hardwood crops. The increased rainfall during June increased the need for fungicide applications and provided a perfect environment for weeds to grow. In addition to fungicide applications; weed control and fertilization have been the other major cultural practices. Many of the tree species are approaching a size that will require top pruning in the very near future.

**Tree Improvement:** AFC's tree improvement program provides landowners with the highest possible genetic gain in pine and hardwood seed. One of AFC's objectives in tree improvement is establishing the highest genetic gain material in our newest pine and hardwood seed orchards. AFC Baucum Nursery makes available to landowners the improved varieties of pine and hardwood, which is the result of the tree improvement program.

During June, construction of the concrete pad for a new shop at Bluff City was completed and the metal building was received. AFC labor will erect the building after the concrete has had sufficient time to cure.

The primary function of the crew during June was installing water lines for the new breeding and preservation orchards as well as the new shortleaf production orchard. The potted grafts will be planted as soon as the installation of all the water lines is complete.

Best Management Practices: AFC provides BMP training to loggers and timber companies, conducts courtesy exams prior or during timber harvest operations and addresses logging complaints.

The BMP Coordinator conducted one courtesy exam. Participants consisted of an Arkansas Game and Fish Commission forester and private landowners.

The BMP coordinator responded to two logger complaints in Van Buren County and in Stone County. Only the complaint in Stone County was valid and acted upon by the BMP Coordinator. The BMP coordinator is working with the ADEQ hazard waste field inspector. The complaint involved hydraulic fluid on the ground.

The BMP Coordinator conducted two technical "in-house trainings" for 22 AFC foresters and rangers. The training consisted of a half day indoor session and a half day field session followed by a proficiency test.

The BMP coordinator attended and participated in the third Conway Lake Point Remove watershed meeting. The meeting's focus was to organize a leadership structure and mission statement for a watershed plan. The watershed group is requesting assistance through an EPA 319 grant.

The AFC received a grant to purchase two portable bridges. The bridges will be on loan through the AFC BMP program. The bridges will be used by loggers to cross creeks. Already companies are requesting to use the portable bridges.

Forest Inventory and Analysis: AFC in cooperation with the USDA Forest Service Southern Research Station is responsible for collecting scientific data from permanently established plots located all over the state. The plots, each representing 5,937 acres, are strategically located on a three-mile by three-mile grid. The inventory plots have been generating data since they were established in the 1950's. Natural resource managers use the data to make management decisions and follow Arkansas' natural resource trends through time.

For June, FIA personnel have measured and submitted data on 92 plots.

#### **COMMUNICATIONS**

Public Information Coordinator (PIC) represented AFC at the ADEM Capstone Exercise at Camp Robinson.

PIC served as conference speaker alongside State Forester at Arkansas Forestry Association's Teacher Conservation workshop near Russellville.

PIC created roll-out plan for SouthWRAP (Southern Wildire Risk Assessment Portal) – on behalf of Arkansas, in partnership with the Southern Group of State Foresters. In addition, PIC attended SouthWRAP training webinars, provided training to AFC staff for SouthWRAP application, and designed presentation material for SouthWRAP and began delivery at the Joint Convention of Arkansas Fire Chiefs.

PIC served as Conference Speaker at Joint Convention of Arkansas Fire Chiefs and attended banquet with family and represented agency at the Banquet and Ceremony honoring AFC Fallen Firefighter, Jake Harrell.

PIC completed final edits for final draft of updated/color version of the Trees of Arkansas book – due out in July, 2014.

AFC districts reported participating in 1 radio/television interview, 10 news articles, 75 presentations to school and civic groups, 1 community tree/Arbor Day planting event, and 10 festivals or event exhibits.
