Re: Arkansas Forestry Commission monthly activity report for September 2015

Dear Senator Sample and Representative Branscum:

Per Act 890 of the 90th General Assembly, Regular Session, 2015, Section 47, the Arkansas Forestry Commission (AFC) is to report monthly fiscal and agency activities to the Arkansas Legislative Council. Please find attached the report for September, 2015.

In September, Arkansas, especially south Arkansas, experienced drought conditions which continue today. Currently, County Judges have placed 37 counties under burn bans. AFC has noted this fact on our website and that 30 counties are placed in the high wildfire danger category. While in high wildfire danger any open burning is strongly discouraged. We are encouraged that many Arkansas news outlets have picked up our wildfire danger message and are reporting it regularly. Because our good citizens are aware of these conditions, wildfire occurrences in these dry times remain low.

The Arkansas Forestry Commission is ready to act when wildfires occur and are working every day to prevent wildfires!

ARKANSAS FORESTRY COMMISSION September 2015 Activity and Fiscal Report

FIRE PROTECTION

Wildfires: During September a total of 160 wildfires were suppressed for a total of 865 acres burned. Ten year average for the month of September is 131 wildfires for 1909 acres burned.

Rural Fire Protection: Rural Fire Protection (RFP) assists rural volunteer fire departments with organization, training and equipment. RFP provides interest-free loans and administers federal grants to assist approximately 1,000 volunteer rural fire departments. The RFP shop provides maintenance to AFC equipment.

In September 2015, 74 rural fire departments (164 firefighters) were provided wildland fire training. RFP received 4 Freightliners from Department of Defense (DOD) (valued at \$664,892.00). There were 5 Department of Defense (DOD) vehicles (valued at \$406,440.88) issued to VFDs.

Rural Fire provided 1 interest free loan via the Rural Fire Revolving Loan Fund in September 2015. Ratcliff VFD – Logan Co (D6) - \$12,086.76 – tank and pump.

The RFP shop completed maintenance on ten AFC vehicles and equipment.

Firewise: Firewise staff and district personnel work with fire departments and civic organizations to make communities safer from the threat of wildfire through mitigation projects and community education initiatives. Arkansas leads the nation with 151 active Firewise communities. Recognized communities display Firewise signs at the city limits.

In September, Firewise staff assisted 75 communities with renewal efforts, conducted two initial presentations and conducted two risk assessment trainings.

Firewise staff helped with the AFC annual Prescribed Fire Workshop, set up display booths at the Perry County Fair and the Friends of Felsenthal event.

Firewise staff conducted one 8hr Wildland Fire training course and worked with Girl Scout programs in Lowell and in Newton County.

Firewise staff worked as a Public Information Officer on a western fire detail in Washington State. While on the detail, a Firewise YouTube video was created.

Firewise staff visited with 48 fire chiefs and 4 Office of Emergency Services Coordinators and learned of their efforts concerning Firewise; provided materials for 20 public events and visited 16 county and district offices to assist with Firewise efforts. Staff answered two media calls and created two media releases.

Law Enforcement: AFC has the authority to enforce the laws of the State of Arkansas, but focuses primarily on unlawful dumping, timber theft, forest fires, and forestry equipment theft and vandalism. AFC aggressively seeks prosecution of violators to deter such crimes.

In September, AFC Investigators and district law enforcement officers opened 3 timber, 17 fire, and 3 dumping cases.

The AFC law enforcement investigators attended the Arson Task Force Meeting at Jekyll Island, Georgia.

FOREST MANAGEMENT

Forest Stewardship/Rural Forestry Assistance Programs: AFC works with a diverse group of partners and professionals to conserve, protect, and enhance Arkansas's forests. The Forest Stewardship Program (FSP) is an opportunity for non-industrial private forest landowners who are interested in managing their property for wildlife, recreation, soil and water conservation, agro-forestry and\or for timber production to get a comprehensive multiple use forest management plan that is prepared by private consulting or AFC foresters, private consulting or AGFC private lands wildlife biologists, and USDA Natural Resource Conservation Service soil and water professionals. Arkansas has 4,786 landowners owning 879,643 acres that are enrolled in FSP. Landowners that implement practices under their FSP management plans become Forest Stewards. Arkansas has 1,301 Forest Stewards owning 281,410 acres.

For September, 12 FSP plans were prepared on 1,552 acres. In addition, AFC personnel provided technical assistance through the rural forestry program to landowners that are enrolled in USDA tree planting and forest management programs such as the Conservation Reserve Program, Environmental Quality Incentives Program, Wetland Reserve Program, and AFC Southern Pine Beetle Prevention and Restoration Program. AFC foresters prepared 131 rural forestry management plans on 7,765 acres. AFC personnel conducted 11 prescribed burns on 327 acres.

Urban Forestry Assistance: Urban Forestry Program staff provides assistance and training to communities, educational institutions, non-profit organizations, developers and homeowners on urban tree care, inventory and management.

AFC personnel have been assisting communities with developing tree management plans for their parks by performing tree inventories to determine what type of conservation efforts are needed to improve the health of the urban forests. The Martin Luther King Park in Pine Bluff, the Walnut Ridge City Park and the Scranton City Park are three that were recently accessed.

The inventory for Scranton found that forty percent of the trees in the park are post oak. Recommendations were made to include additional species as they continue to plant new trees. In addition, it was determined that the city park trees reduce storm water runoff by 598 cubic feet per year. This information signifies the importance of keeping a healthy tree canopy to improve water quality and reduce potential flooding during rain events.

Forest Health: The Forest Health Specialist assists AFC personnel statewide in efforts to maintain healthy, productive forest ecosystems by preventing, detecting, monitoring, and suppressing damaging insects and diseases. AFC offers technical assistance to landowners who encounter forest health issues.

- As a result of the recent drought conditions, sporadic *Ips* pine beetle damage was detected in loblolly pine plantations of Howard and Polk counties. These were the first damages reported since 2012. A couple young stands suffered 10 to 40% losses. Aerial surveys will be used in October to document and map the damages in that area.
- All gypsy moth traps placed in 2015 (>300 traps) have been checked and none were captured. This invasive moth poses a threat to hardwood forests.

- So far in 2015, no emerald ash borers were detected outside of the 26 county quarantine zone in the southern portion of the state. It has been detected in 10 AR counties, the most recent detection occurred in July. Ash trees killed by the beetle are noticeable along the Ouachita River, and detection in other areas remains difficult.
- Fall webworm was more prevalent than usual in the northwestern region of the state. This moth caterpillar causes unsightly webs that in rare cases may cover the entire crown. Tree death is very uncommon, and most trees flush normally the following spring.

Baucum Nursery: AFC's Baucum Nursery produces hardwood and pine seedlings for reforestation and afforestation efforts.

Seedling sales began on July 15. Through the end of September there were 163 on line seedling orders. Seedling sales through the end of September resulted in 537,925 pine compared with 441,100 last year during the same period. Last year at this time the total hardwoods sold were 655,225. This year we have sold 1,589,900 through the end of September. There was also an increase in hardwood seedlings sold on contract. Last year we contract grew 1,200,000 hardwood seedlings for one nursery from Leland MS. This year we have one nursery from Crowville LA contract 1,200,000 and another nursery from Rayville LA contract 330,000 hardwood seedlings with AFC.

Reforestation Manager, Nursery Manager and Reforestation Foreman met with the architect in September to review survey results for construction of new pine seedling packing house at Baucum. Staff removed an old well that was in the construction area for the new building; made 2 fertilizer applications on both hardwoods and pines and made all necessary chemical applications; continued to hand weed all species; spread wood chips to add organic matter to the soil; bush-hogged hardwood seed orchards for acorn collection and bush-hogged nursery grounds for weed control; collected Chinese Chestnut seed; and began field preparation for soil fumigation. Staff hired a new auto/diesel mechanic who began work on September 20.

All employees were first-aid certified.

Tree Improvement: AFC's tree improvement program strives to provide landowners with the highest possible genetic gain in pine and hardwood seed. One method AFC employs to achieve this objective is by establishing the highest genetic gain material in our newest pine and hardwood seed orchards. AFC Baucum Nursery then makes available to landowners the improved varieties of pine and hardwood, which are the net result of the tree improvement program.

Orchards were rogued to remove the lowest genetic gain performers. Two orchards were clear cut to further increase the genetic quality of the pollen that will be the source for future seed. All orchards were marked for cone harvest which will begin on October 5.

Reforestation Foreman completed the site prep for future progeny tests on the old shortleaf seed orchard buffer zone.

Reforestation Manager along with the help of the AFC crew from District 6 completed data collection for two, twenty year old loblolly pine tests. Height and diameter were recorded for all trees in each of the tests. The set of data will be very important to confirm the decisions that have been made about the 159 crosses that were represented in the two tests.

Reforestation Manager, Reforestation Foreman, Seed Orchard Technician and 4 tractor trailer drivers coordinated a nursery equipment transfer from Louisiana to Arkansas. The nursery and tree improvement programs were shut down in Louisiana last year. They had some equipment that was purchased with US Forest Service grants and is being transferred to Arkansas and Oklahoma in an effort to enhance the nursery and tree improvement operations in the western gulf region. Best Management Practices: AFC provides BMP training to loggers and timber companies, conducts courtesy exams prior or during timber harvest operations and addresses logging complaints.

The BMP Coordinator conducted one courtesy exam in Perry County with 3 participants; two Foresters and the AFC's BMP coordinator.

The BMP coordinator received no valid complaints this month.

The BMP coordinator attended and participated in the Conway Lake Point Remove watershed meeting. The committee discussed the next steps in writing an EPA watershed plan.

The BMP coordinator continues to work with the Arkansas Forests and Drinking Water Committee. The Committee met and the next steps are:

- 1. To create a formal Arkansas Forests and Drinking Water Council of 10 representatives from the core planning committee.
- 2. Plan one or two workshops for 2016 to focus on specific watersheds and identify collaboration opportunities and projects.
- 3. To plan a second Arkansas Forests and Drinking Water Forum to foster continued learning, sharing and networking on the issues (Next Forum in spring of 2017).

The BMP coordinator attended the Beaver Lake Watershed Symposium at Carroll Electric in Huntsville. The Symposium helped to educate attendees about the NW Arkansas region's drinking water issues that impact the supply, quality, and achievement of voluntary watershed protection.

The BMP coordinator continues to work with the Southern Group State Foresters Water Resources Committee about the concerns of potential impacts from the WOTUS rule.

The BMP coordinator is working on the logistics of hosting the SGSF water resource manager's bi-annual meeting to be held in Little Rock, Arkansas March 1-3 2016.

The BMP coordinator attended Arkansas Natural Resources Commission and the UA Division of Agriculture annual Nonpoint Source Pollution Stakeholder & Project Review Meeting at the Cooperative Extension building in Little Rock, Arkansas.

Forest Inventory and Analysis: AFC in cooperation with the USDA Forest Service Southern Research Station is responsible for collecting scientific data from permanently established plots located all over the state. The plots, each representing 5,937 acres, are strategically located on a three-mile by three-mile grid. The inventory plots have been generating data since they were established in the 1950's. Natural resource managers use the data to make management decisions and follow Arkansas' natural resource trends through time.

The Forest Inventory and Analysis crew has completed 75 plots for the month of September.
