Dear Senator Sample and Representative Branscum:

Per Act 59 of the 89<sup>th</sup> General Assembly, Fiscal Session, 2014, Section 48, the Arkansas Forestry Commission (AFC) is to report monthly fiscal and agency activities to the Arkansas Legislative Council. Please find attached the report for November, 2016.

In the month of November, all eyes were turned to the eastern U.S. watching news of the devastating wildfires, especially the wildfire that burned through Gatlinburg, TN.

Even with drought conditions, high wildfire danger and an abnormally high wildfire occurrence in Arkansas, the AFC was able to send four firefighters to help our neighbors. Three were sent to North Carolina and one was sent to Tennessee.

Here in Arkansas, fire fighters responded to 183 wildfires that burned 3,194 acres. The largest occurred in the Charleston community area and burned 1,001 acres before being contained. The suppression of the wildfire was a joint effort between AFC, US Forest Service and local Fire Departments.

As you can see, AFC strives to keep Arkansans safe from wildfires by helping our neighbors protect their lives and property.

# **ARKANSAS FORESTRY COMMISSION November 2016 Activity and Fiscal Report**

# FIRE PROTECTION

**Wildfires:** During November a total of 183 wildfires were suppressed for a total of 3194 acres burned. Ten year average for the month of November is 82 wildfires for 1310 acres burned.

**Rural Fire Protection:** Rural Fire Protection (RFP) assists rural volunteer fire departments (VFDs) with organization, training and equipment. RFP provides interest-free loans and administers federal grants to assist approximately 1,000 volunteer rural fire departments. The RFP shop provides maintenance to AFC equipment.

In November 2016, 53 rural fire departments (110 firefighters) were provided wildland fire training. RFP received 4 Freightliners (valued at \$283,328.00) from Department of Defense (DOD). There were 3 Department of Defense (DOD) vehicles and equipment issued to VFDs including 1 Freightliner, 1 Generator and 1 Chevy Pickup (Valued at \$210,399.00).

34 DOD Recycling Control Point (RCP) items were received for redistribution to VFD's (Valued at

34 DOD Recycling Control Point (RCP) items were received for redistribution to VFD's (Valued at \$11,764.70) including: Spotlights and 1.5" fire nozzles.

The RFP shop completed maintenance on 12 AFC vehicles and equipment.

**Firewise:** Firewise staff and district personnel work with fire departments and civic organizations to make communities safer from the threat of wildfire through mitigation projects and community education initiatives. Arkansas leads the nation with 160 active Firewise communities. Recognized communities display Firewise signs at the city limits.

In November Firewise achieved the following:

- Conducted two Initial Presentations
- Worked with 25 Chiefs and visited 10 communities to help with renewal paperwork
- Worked on 40 Firewise renewals
- Have renewed 160 active Firewise communities
- Ordered and delivered Firewise Stickers for VFD's with designated Firewise Vehicles

**Law Enforcement:** AFC has the authority to enforce the laws of the State of Arkansas, but focuses primarily on unlawful dumping, timber theft, forest fires, and forestry equipment theft and vandalism. AFC aggressively seeks prosecution of violators to deter such crimes.

In November, AFC Investigators and district law enforcement officers opened 5 dumping, 1 equipment theft/vandalism, 13 fires, and 5 timber cases.

An AFC Law Enforcement Investigator attended the Arkansas Agricultural Department board meeting.

AFC Law Enforcement Investigators patrolled the Poison Springs State Forest during deer season.

## FOREST MANAGEMENT

Forest Stewardship/Rural Forestry Assistance Programs: AFC works with a diverse group of partners and professionals to conserve, protect, and enhance Arkansas's forests. The Forest Stewardship Program (FSP) is an opportunity for non-industrial private forest landowners who are interested in managing their property for wildlife, recreation, soil and water conservation, agro-forestry and\or for timber production to get a comprehensive multiple use forest management plan that is prepared by private consulting or AFC foresters, private consulting or AGFC private lands wildlife biologists, and USDA Natural Resource Conservation Service soil and water professionals. Arkansas has 4,907 landowners owning 897,661 acres that are enrolled in FSP. Landowners that implement practices under their FSP management plans become Forest Stewards. Arkansas has 1,312 Forest Stewards owning 284,460 acres.

For November, 10 FSP plans were prepared on 738 acres. In addition, AFC personnel provide technical assistance through the rural forestry program to landowners that are enrolled in USDA tree planting and forest management programs such as the Conservation Reserve Program, Environmental Quality Incentives Program, Wetland Reserve Program, and AFC Southern Pine Beetle Prevention and Restoration Program. AFC foresters prepared 40 rural forestry management plans on 4,219 acres. AFC personnel conducted 7 prescribed burns on 238 acres.

**Urban Forestry Assistance:** Urban Forestry Program staff provides assistance and training to communities, educational institutions, non-profit organizations, developers and homeowners on urban tree care, inventory and management.

The Northwest Arkansas Land Trust recently completed their urban forestry grant project which was funded through a grant from the USDA Forest Service. The funding was used to build the Kessler Mountain Outdoor Classroom & Nature Center which involved hiring staff, developing an outdoor classroom trailhead and trail and creating a nature center. The outdoor classroom consists of a trailhead with a kiosk, a native plant garden, an arboretum, a picnic area, and a gazebo. The trail is composed of a ½ mile interpretive loop with bridges, stairs, and interpretive signage about the trees at learning stations. The grant funded a variety of exhibits and displays in the nature center. The displays include "Tools of the Trade" for geologists, wildlife biologists, botanists, foresters and entomologists. Another exhibit is the "Window to the Woods" which is a display featuring pictures of wildlife on Kessler Mountain, taken by game cameras that are placed on the mountain. A tree identification display uses bark segments and pressed leaves to teach how to identify native trees. To date over 700 students from 8 schools have visited the center.

**Forest Health:** The Forest Health Specialist, Chandler Barton, assists AFC personnel statewide in efforts to maintain healthy, productive forest ecosystems by preventing, detecting, monitoring, and suppressing damaging insects and diseases. AFC offers technical assistance to landowners who encounter forest health issues.

- The Forest Health Specialist gave a presentation titled "Plant Disorder Diagnosis and Treatment" at the certified arborist exam prep. He also assisted in an emerald ash borer training for University of Arkansas county extension agents.
- Emerald ash borer was confirmed in Hempstead and Lafayette Counties (now 14 total counties in AR). The beetle continues to be found by observant landowners and forest health specialists in new areas outside of the known infestation.
- The forest health specialist participated in an Arkansas working group dedicated to restoring monarch and pollinator habitat. The group is sparking discussion between state agencies to address concerns over pollinator habitat loss in the state. Pollinators, such as the monarch

butterfly, are ecologically important, and their conservation should receive more attention when we manage our properties. As stewards of sustainable land management, foresters will learn how pollinator habitat can be incorporated with the objectives of forest landowners.

**Baucum Nursery:** AFC's Baucum Nursery produces hardwood and pine seedlings for reforestation and afforestation efforts.

Seedling sales began on July 15. Through December 2nd, there were 389 on line seedling orders. Seedling sales through December 2nd resulted in 2,284,700 pine compared with 974,125 this time last year; and 4,706,225 hardwood compared to 2,611,200 this time last year.

During the month of November, Baucum Nursery staff harvested seed from improved cherrybark oak and improved nuttall oak orchards. The Nursery received the following seed for planting FY18 crop: 1559 lbs. of white oak, 7345 lbs. of swamp chestnut oak, 400 lbs. nuttall oak from Mid-South Forest Seed; 878 lbs. of Overcup oak, 2720 lbs. of water hickory and 50 lbs. of persimmon from M&C Forest Seeds; 1500 lbs. of Shumard oak from Barron's Inc. The Nursery ordered seed for blackgum, cedar elm, dogwood, hackberry, mayhaw, redbud, sugarberry, sweetgum, sycamore, water tupelo, mulberry and red maple for FY18 crop and planted 4,000 lbs. of black walnut, 5,500 lbs. of white oak, 2,900 lbs. of sawtooth oak, 500 lbs. of Chinkapin oak, and 2,750 lbs. of water hickory. Implementation of the new system of seed germination testing of all stored pine seed began with collection of samples from all lots of pine seed and sending to the US Forest Service Seed Testing Lab.

**Tree Improvement:** AFC's tree improvement program strives to provide landowners with the highest possible genetic gain in pine and hardwood seed. One method AFC employs to achieve this objective is by establishing the highest genetic gain material in our newest pine and hardwood seed orchards. AFC Baucum Nursery then makes available to landowners the improved varieties of pine and hardwood, which are the net result of the tree improvement program.

During the month of November the Tree Improvement staff moved trees out of the greenhouse to harden them off for planting, weeded all pots and trays outside, repaired irrigation lines, treated seed orchards for gopher prevention, began pruning top grafts, continued to pick up roots from removal of old seed orchards and began wiring the new shop. Site prep was completed for a new loblolly pine test near Rosston and the hardwood growth and yield test at the Dr. Parkes site near Dover.

Reforestation Manager attended the Southern Forest Nursery Management Cooperative Advisory Meeting at Auburn University. The purpose of this meeting is to review accomplishments by the research staff during the previous year and to approve, deny, modify and make recommendations for research projects for the upcoming year.

**Best Management Practices:** Forestry Commission provides BMP training to loggers and timber companies, conducts courtesy exams prior or during timber harvest operations and addresses logging complaints.

The BMP Coordinator conducted two courtesy exams. One was conducted in Van Buren County with 3 participants consisting of two Landowners and the AFC's BMP coordinator. The second exam was in Garland County with 3 participants consisting of two Industry Foresters and the AFC's BMP coordinator.

The exams addressed the Arkansas Forestry Commission's BMP Program. The BMP Coordinator provided copies of Arkansas' BMP Implementation Reports, AFC's manual "BMPs for Water Quality Protection", the water quality complaint process and MOU with ADEQ. The BMP coordinator provided an overview of the entire program and offered technical assistance and training to help with their SFI program and audits.

The BMP Coordinator conducted one technical logger training session for Foresters, Loggers and Contractors. The training was held in conjunction with the Arkansas Timber Producers Association (ATPA) and was held in Crossett, AR., attended by 48 participants.

The BMP coordinator participated in the second of five Unpaved Roads Program Trainings/workshops. The training was led by The Nature Conservancy for County Judges, County Highway Department Road Superintendents, and other Agencies. The training was well attended with approximately 40 participants.

**Forest Inventory and Analysis:** AFC in cooperation with the USDA Forest Service Southern Research Station is responsible for collecting scientific data from permanently established plots located all over the state. The plots, each representing 5,937 acres, are strategically located on a three-mile by three-mile grid. The inventory plots have been generating data since they were established in the 1950's. Natural resource managers use the data to make management decisions and follow Arkansas' natural resource trends through time.

The FIA crew completed 34 plots for the month of November.
