Re: Arkansas Forestry Commission monthly activity report for January 2016

Dear Senator Sample and Representative Branscum:

Per Act 890 of the 90th General Assembly, Regular Session, 2015, Section 47, the Arkansas Forestry Commission (AFC) is to report monthly fiscal and agency activities to the Arkansas Legislative Council. Please find attached the report for January 2016.

AFC continues to upgrade communications and technical equipment capabilities. This fiscal year, the AFC has upgraded 40 of 52 radio repeaters, 3 in January alone. These upgraded repeaters extend the useful area of our radio communication and allow fire crews to communicate safely and without issues.

In January, the AFC issued 20 new GPS units to field personnel to aid in fire suppression and management services. These units are huge improvements to aid tasks like fire mapping, timber cruising, and setting seedling monitoring plots.

The AFC strives to update services to keep AFC crews and Arkansans safe using current high tech opportunities. And, in this case, using federal grants to supplement the purchases.

ARKANSAS FORESTRY COMMISSION January 2016 Activity and Fiscal Report

FOREST PROTECTION

Wildfires: During January a total of 74 wildfires were suppressed for a total of 789 acres burned. The ten year average for the month of January is 127 wildfires for 1,700 acres burned.

Storm Damage Assistance: Rotating AFC crews, each made up of seven men, from District 1 patrolled the Mississippi River levee in Chicot and Desha Counties for ten days.

Search and Rescue Assistance: An AFC crew from Searcy County assisted in a search for an injured hiker at the Richard Creek Camp Grounds.

Rural Fire Protection: Rural Fire Protection (RFP) assists rural volunteer fire departments with organization, training and equipment. RFP provides interest-free loans and administers federal grants to assist approximately 1,000 volunteer rural fire departments. The RFP shop provides maintenance to AFC equipment.

In January 2016, 139 firefighters were provided wildland fire training at 45 rural fire departments.

The RFP shop completed maintenance on five AFC vehicles and equipment.

Firewise: Firewise staff and district personnel work with fire departments and civic organizations to make communities safer from the threat of wildfire through mitigation projects and community education initiatives. Arkansas leads the nation with 154 active Firewise communities. Recognized communities display Firewise signs at the city limits.

In January, Firewise Staff:

- Assisted 10 Communities with Firewise program renewal efforts
- Assisted 12 communities with Community Wildfire Protection Plans
- Conducted 6 initial presentations
- Assisted with the Arkansas Fallen Firefighters Memorial
- Assisted with the Arkansas Fire Boat School Committee

- Visited 45 AFC Employees
- Met with 23 Fire Chiefs about Firewise efforts
- Met with 4 Office of Emergency Management County Coordinators
- Provided 15 educational events
- Assisted with 3 media releases and updated the Firewise Facebook site

Law Enforcement: AFC has the authority to enforce the laws of the State of Arkansas, but focuses primarily on unlawful dumping, timber theft, forest fires, and forestry equipment theft and vandalism. AFC aggressively seeks prosecution of violators to deter such crimes. In January, AFC Investigators and district law enforcement officers opened 9 timber, 1 equipment theft/vandalism, 5 dumping, and 4 fire cases.

FOREST MANAGEMENT

Forest Stewardship/Rural Forestry Assistance Programs: AFC works with a diverse group of partners and professionals to conserve, protect, and enhance Arkansas's forests. The Forest Stewardship Program (FSP) is an opportunity for non-industrial private forest landowners who are interested in managing their property for wildlife, recreation, soil and water conservation, agro-forestry and\or for timber production to get a comprehensive multiple use forest management plan that is prepared by private consulting or AFC foresters, private consulting or Arkansas Game & Fish Commission private lands wildlife biologists, and USDA Natural Resource Conservation Service soil and water professionals. Arkansas has 4,822 landowners owning 885,606 acres that are enrolled in FSP. Landowners that implement practices under their FSP management plans become Forest Stewards. Arkansas has 1,307 Forest Stewards owning 282,756 acres.

For January, 17 FSP plans were prepared on 1,986 acres. In addition, AFC personnel provide technical assistance through the rural forestry program to landowners that are enrolled in USDA tree planting and forest management programs such as the Conservation Reserve Program, Environmental Quality Incentives Program, Wetland Reserve Program, and the AFC's Southern Pine Beetle Prevention and Restoration Program. AFC foresters prepared 106 rural forestry management plans on 7,134 acres. AFC personnel conducted 11 prescribed burns on 426 acres.

Urban Forestry Assistance: Urban Forestry Program staff provides assistance and training to communities, educational institutions, non-profit organizations, developers and homeowners on urban tree care, inventory and management.

A Community Forest Storm Mitigation Planning Workbook and template have been developed as tools for Arkansas communities to use in assessing their community forest storm readiness, mitigating tree risk and reducing tree-related storm damage. The template serves as a basic framework for developing community forest mitigation storm plans. As the template is filled in, gaps in storm readiness, tree risk mitigation and community forest management will be identified by communities.

A community forest storm mitigation plan is an essential part of hazard mitigation and emergency management plans and systems. The plan will focus specifically on ways to avoid or mitigate the damage trees can cause during a storm or other catastrophic events as well as provide tools to avoid the loss of trees and tree canopy across a community.

These tools will help a community consider: which officials to call for unique storm event (i.e. ice, wildfire, droughts, flooding, etc.); who to call when trees are damaged; who are the local foresters; is

there a local mitigation team in place; are there local volunteers to help; and, who are the certified arborists available to hire. Questions like these are compiled in the template, prompting the community to seek out contact information, and prepare ahead of a natural disaster event.

The workbook includes suggested activities for preparation, response and recovery and the template provides guidance for field personnel involved in storm preparation and response. Both are available as a PDF on the AFC website at

Forest Health: The Forest Health Specialist assists AFC personnel statewide in efforts to maintain healthy, productive forest ecosystems by preventing, detecting, monitoring, and suppressing damaging insects and diseases. AFC offers technical assistance to landowners who encounter forest health issues.

- The Forest Health Specialist attended the Southern Group of State Foresters Forest Health Committee Meeting. The group discussed current forest health issues and suggested ways to improve their states' programs in order to address these concerns.
- The Forest Health Specialist also attended the Aerial Survey Working Group Meeting, a national
 meeting of USDA Forest Service and state government representatives, to learn new techniques
 for forest health aerial surveys. In 2016, the AFC will be implementing a new aerial surveillance
 system, known as the Digital Mobile Sketch-Mapping System, which will detect insect and
 disease outbreaks more efficiently from fixed-wing aircraft.
- The invasive redbay ambrosia beetle, a beetle that transmits laurel wilt disease, was confirmed in Bradley Co. near Warren. This beetle and the disease that it transports is a serious threat to sassafras trees. Sassafras is an important tree species to Arkansas, despite not being commercially important to the timber industry. It has several cultural uses and is a vital component of natural forest succession in many parts of the state, particularly in the Ozark region.

Baucum Nursery: AFC's Baucum Nursery produces hardwood and pine seedlings for reforestation and afforestation efforts.

Seedling sales began on July 15. Through the end of January there were 558 online seedling orders. Seedling sales resulted in 1,905,700 pine compared with 1,389,775 last year during the same period. Last year at this time the total hardwoods sold were 2,533,275. This year we have sold 3,006,450 through the end of January. There was also an increase in hardwood seedlings sold on contract. Last year we contract grew 1,200,000 hardwood seedlings for one nursery from Leland MS. This year we have one nursery from Crowville LA that we are contract growing 1,200,000 hardwood seedlings and another nursery from Rayville LA contract 330,000 hardwood seedlings with AFC.

Tree Improvement: AFC's tree improvement program provides landowners with the highest possible genetic gain in pine and hardwood seed. One of AFC's objectives in tree improvement is establishing the highest genetic gain material in our newest pine and hardwood seed orchards. AFC Baucum Nursery makes available to landowners the improved varieties of pine and hardwood, which is the result of the tree improvement program.

The orchard establishment process begins with grafting the desired clone of a seedling onto potted rootstock in 3 gallon containers. In January, 423 of those grafts were planted in their designated positions of the seed orchard.

One of the primary components of tree improvement process is completing the desired crosses of known parents. This process involves isolation of the desired female flower and pollination with the desired male pollen. The result of these crosses are seed for progeny testing. During January the Tree Improvement crew processed control cross cones from 102 crosses which resulted in 1,290 cones and 8,584 seed. There were 15 of the 102 crosses that produced enough seed to be planted for field progeny testing. The balance of the 102 crosses will be bred again.

The Reforestation Manager attended the Western Gulf Forest Tree Improvement Program's Steering Committee meeting in Shreveport LA. The Steering Committee is an elected group, similar to a board of directors. The positions are elected by the Executive Committee of Coop

members. The Steering Committee makes recommendations for any changes in the structure and function of the coop. The most significant issues addressed at this meeting were the replacement of the Coop Director as he retires; recommendations for hiring a post Doctorate position (3 year timeline of research), for additional services requested by the Executive Committee, and hiring a permanent Master's level position to assist with field work of the Coop.

The Reforestation Manager along with the AFC crew from Dover visited the future site of a growth and yield test of nuttall oak vs improved nuttall oak and cherrybark oak vs improved cherrybark oak. The test will be on about 10 acres of land that is owned by Dr. Rob Parkes, Chairman of the AFC Board of Commissioners

Best Management Practices: AFC provides BMP training to loggers and timber companies, conducts courtesy exams prior or during timber harvest operations and addresses logging complaints.

The BMP Coordinator conducted one courtesy exam with 3 participants. The BMP Coordinator provided copies of Arkansas' BMP Implementation Reports, AFC's manual "BMPs for Water Quality Protection", and a technical assistance summary report of recommendation to the participants.

The BMP Coordinator responded to one timber harvesting complaint in Nevada County. The AFC determined that it was a non-valid complaint.

The BMP Coordinator conducted one technical logger training session for Foresters, Loggers and Contractors. The workshop was held in conjunction with the Arkansas Timber Producers Association. The training was held in Rison and was attended by 23 participants.

The BMP Coordinator represented AFC at the Arkansas Forestry Association Education Committee meeting. The meeting was to schedule upcoming and potential landowner workshops for 2016.

Forest Inventory and Analysis: AFC in cooperation with the USDA Forest Service Southern Research Station is responsible for collecting scientific data from permanently established plots located all over the state. The plots, each representing 5,937 acres, are strategically located on a three-mile by three-mile grid. The inventory plots have been generating data since they were established in the 1950's. Natural resource managers use the data to make management decisions and follow Arkansas' natural resource trends through time.

For January, FIA personnel have measured and submitted data on 40 plots.
