Dear Senator Sample and Representative Branscum:

Per Act 59 of the 89th General Assembly, Fiscal Session, 2014, Section 48, the Arkansas Forestry Commission (AFC) is to report monthly fiscal and agency activities to the Arkansas Legislative Council. Please find attached the report for October, 2016.

The AFC hosted the annual Rural Fire Show in Greenbrier, AR this month. This event is hosted as a "thank you" to firefighters across Arkansas that work all year to make communities safer.

The AFC accepts donations from many vendors as well as partners to offer a large supply of information, equipment and food for those who attend. This year, 380 Fire fighters, 110 Fire Departments, 18 Vendors with 42 representatives and 41 State employees attended the event for a total of 463 in attendance. 31 fire departments won door prizes such as a chainsaw and various tools and equipment to emphasize our appreciation of their hard work.

The AFC continues to work with our firefighting partners in the state to provide Arkansans with quality protection from wildfires and many other concerns.

ARKANSAS FORESTRY COMMISSION October 2016 Activity and Fiscal Report

FIRE PROTECTION

Wildfires: During October a total of 129 wildfires were suppressed for a total of 883 acres burned. Ten year average for the month of October is 111 wildfires for 1340 acres burned.

Search and Rescue Assistance: Seven AFC personnel assisted in a search and rescue for a 68 year old lady. She had been tracking a deer away from her property in the southern part of Madison County and got lost in the woods. She was found safe.

An AFC crew from Newton County was dispatched to an area along the Buffalo River to help carry out a lady that had fallen.

Rural Fire Protection: Rural Fire Protection (RFP) assists rural volunteer fire departments with organization, training and equipment. RFP provides interest-free loans and administers federal grants to assist approximately 1,000 volunteer rural fire departments. The RFP shop provides maintenance to AFC equipment.

In October 2016, 37 rural fire departments (110 firefighters) were provided wildland fire training. RFP received 7 Freightliners (valued at \$781,997.00) from Department of Defense (DOD). There were 11 Department of Defense (DOD) vehicles and equipment issued to VFDs including 5 Freightliners, 5 Generators and 1 GMC Pickup (Valued at \$780,203.08). 249 DOD Recycling Control Point (RCP) items were received for redistribution to VFD's (Valued at \$7,639.71) including: flash lights and strap/rescue cutters.

Rural Fire provided 1 interest free loan via the Rural Fire Revolving Loan Fund in October 2016.

The RFP shop completed maintenance on 21 AFC vehicles and equipment.

Firewise: Firewise staff and district personnel work with fire departments and civic organizations to make communities safer from the threat of wildfire through mitigation projects and community education initiatives. Arkansas leads the nation with 157 active Firewise communities. Recognized communities display Firewise signs at the city limits.

In October Firewise achieved the following:

- Taught three Risk Assessment Trainings.
- Conducted three initial presentations.
- Visited 20 county and district offices and three offices of emergency management.
- Worked at the Hot Spring County Flu Clinic and Ecofest.

Attended the annual Burn School, and the annual Fire Show.

Law Enforcement: AFC has the authority to enforce the laws of the State of Arkansas, but focuses primarily on unlawful dumping, timber theft, forest fires, and forestry equipment theft and vandalism. AFC aggressively seeks prosecution of violators to deter such crimes. In October, AFC Investigators and district law enforcement officers opened 5 dumping, 2 equipment theft/vandalism, 17 fires, and 4 timber cases.

Investigators attended 2 District Meetings and the Smith Tree Farm tour in Izard County presented by the Arkansas Forestry Association.

Breath alcohol tests were completed in Districts 6, 7 and 8.

All of the Law Enforcement Investigators took and passed the annual walk test.

FOREST MANAGEMENT

Forest Stewardship/Rural Forestry Assistance Programs: AFC works with a diverse group of partners and professionals to conserve, protect, and enhance Arkansas's forests. The Forest Stewardship Program (FSP) is an opportunity for non-industrial private forest landowners who are interested in managing their property for wildlife, recreation, soil and water conservation, agro-forestry and/or for timber production to get a comprehensive multiple use forest management plan that is prepared by private consulting or AFC foresters, private consulting or AGFC private lands wildlife biologists, and USDA Natural Resource Conservation Service soil and water professionals. Arkansas has 4,897 landowners owning 895,116 acres that are enrolled in FSP. Landowners that implement practices under their FSP management plans become Forest Stewards. Arkansas has 1,311 Forest Stewards owning 284,420 acres.

For October, 11 FSP plans were prepared on 1,410 acres. In addition, AFC personnel provide technical assistance through the rural forestry program to landowners that are enrolled in USDA tree planting and forest management programs such as the Conservation Reserve Program, Environmental Quality Incentives Program, Wetland Reserve Program, and AFC Southern Pine Beetle Prevention and Restoration Program. AFC foresters prepared 37 rural forestry management plans on 2,612 acres. AFC personnel conducted 21 prescribed burns on 1,039 acres.

Urban Forestry Assistance: Urban Forestry Program staff provides assistance and training to communities, educational institutions, non-profit organizations, developers and homeowners on urban tree care, inventory and management.

The City of Fayetteville recently completed their urban forestry grant project which was funded through a grant from the USDA Forest Service. The funding was used to place sod with native plants between trees in medians along College Avenue and Garland Avenue.

There are several benefits to this type of project. First and foremost, the trees will be much healthier growing in a more natural setting without the competition of grass and the protection from weed eaters and lawn mowers. The City did a cost comparison of using sod verses native plantings. Over a ten year period the City will save over \$18,000 in maintenance fees and it will be much safer for employees who will not have to mow. The plants selected beautify the medians and are a source of food for pollinators. An article and pictures are available on the City's website at http://www.fayetteville-ar.gov/339/Urban-Forestry.

Another grant project involving street trees was with the City of Morrilton. In the past, the City had planted a selection of crape myrtles that had become a problem for parking and walking in the downtown area. The new species selected for the pedestrian areas will grow more upright and provide more shade. In addition some flowering species were selected to add more color in the spring. A total of 30 new trees are now growing in the downtown area. The trees were planted for the City's Arbor Day celebration. This was a joint effort between the AFC, the Tree City Board and Main Street Morrilton.

Forest Health: The Forest Health Specialist, Chandler Barton, assists AFC personnel statewide in efforts to maintain healthy, productive forest ecosystems by preventing, detecting, monitoring, and suppressing damaging insects and diseases. AFC offers technical assistance to landowners who encounter forest health issues.

- During the first week of October, Chandler visited the Homochitto National Forest in Mississippi to view their ongoing control efforts of the southern pine beetle. This is the westernmost outbreak of SPB in recent history (the beetle has not caused outbreaks west of the Mississippi River for nearly two decades). The efforts in MS are a prime example for how Arkansas will respond to SPB if (or when) it returns as a damaging pest in our pine forests.
- The AFC Southern Pine Beetle Prevention Program provides cost-share incentives for landowners that need to thin their young, dense pine forests. Thinning pine stands can prevent forest health issues like bark beetles and ensure a higher return on investment when the stand matures. However, when pine pulpwood markets are less than ideal, landowners may be tempted to wait to thin. This program encourages thinning at the most appropriate time. In 2016, the program provided over \$115,000 of incentives for projects on over 1,500 acres.

Baucum Nursery: AFC's Baucum Nursery produces hardwood and pine seedlings for reforestation and afforestation efforts.

Seedling sales began on July 15. Through October 28, there were 282 on line seedling orders. Seedling sales through October 28 resulted in 2,200,850 pine compared with 650,050 this time last year and 4,261,275 hardwoods compared to 1,891,600 this time last year.

During the month of October Baucum Nursery staff:

- Harvested seed from Sawtooth Oak and Chinese chestnut
- Constructed netting for collection of Improved Cherrybark Oak acorns
- Removed irrigation pipe from the fields and transferred to areas that were prepared for Methyl bromide treatment.
- Bush hogged around cherrybark oak progeny test.

Tree Improvement: AFC's tree improvement program strives to provide landowners with the highest possible genetic gain in pine and hardwood seed. One method AFC employs to achieve this objective is by establishing the highest genetic gain material in our newest pine and hardwood seed orchards. AFC Baucum Nursery then makes available to landowners the improved varieties of pine and hardwood, which are the net result of the tree improvement program.

During the month of October Bluff City Tree Improvement staff:

- Completed cone harvest.
- Moved progeny test trees from greenhouse to shade house to harden off for planting this fall/winter.
- Did additional site prep at Dr. Parkes' hardwood test site.

Best Management Practices: Forestry Commission provides BMP training to loggers and timber companies, conducts courtesy exams prior or during timber harvest operations and addresses logging complaints.

The BMP Coordinator conducted one courtesy exam in Columbia County with 5 participants. Participants consisted of, one Consultant Forester, one AFC County Forester, and AFC's BMP coordinator. The BMP Coordinator provided copies of Arkansas' BMP Implementation Reports, AFC's manual "BMPs for Water Quality Protection", and a technical assistance summary report of recommendations to the participants.

The BMP Coordinator received a timber harvesting complaint through the Arkansas Department of Environmental Quality. The complaint site was located in Columbia County and found valid. The BMP Coordinator conducted a field visit which included a landowner representative, a Consultant Forester, two ADEQ Field Inspectors, and the AFC County Forester. Recommendations and a date for the close out inspection where given to mitigate the water quality impairments.

The BMP coordinator participated in one of five Unpaved Roads Program Trainings. The trainings are led by The Nature Conservancy for County Judges, County Highway Department Road Superintendents, and other Agencies. The training was well attended with approximately 50 participants.

Forest Inventory and Analysis: AFC in cooperation with the USDA Forest Service Southern Research Station is responsible for collecting scientific data from permanently established plots located all over the state. The plots, each representing 5,937 acres, are strategically located on a three-mile by three-mile grid. The inventory plots have been generating data since they were established in the 1950's. Natural resource managers use the data to make management decisions and follow Arkansas' natural resource trends through time.

The FIA crew completed 44 plots during the month of October.
